Appendicitis Death Rate May Be Cut By Pre-Operative Care

Austin, Sept. 15 — During the past year 786 persons died of appendicitis in Texas, according to Vital Statistics compilations of the State Department of Health. Many of these deaths might have been prevented had the patient been more aware of the disease and its symptoms.

There are two forms of appendicitis, acute and chronic. The form that appears suddenly, with great pain and sickness is acute. Chronic appendicitis may extend over a long period of time and consist of slight attacks at intervals, but, at some time, there will usually occur an attack worse than any before and the disease may then become serious.

"In the presence of abdominal pain give nothing by mouth. Never give laxatives. Apply an ice pack. Call your family physician. Abdominal pain which persists over a period of six hours is usually serious," advises State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox.

Hospital records show that the above advice has reduced appendicitis deaths 75 per cent. When otherwise healthy people are operated upon soon after the beginning of the "pain in the stomach" caused by appendicitis, little danger is experienced, but the surgeon's work is made more difficult and the patient's chance of recovery considerably lessened when there is a long delay in seeking

medical help, and especially if a cathartic has been given.

How to prevent appendicitis? Keep the body in perfect health as long as possible. Watch your teeth, your tonsils, any place where an infection may occur. Get plenty of good food, plenty of sleep, plenty of exercise. Have a thorough medical examination at least once a year and have your teeth examined and cleaned by a dentist at least once every six months. This kind of watchfulness will not only help you to avoid appendicitis, it will help you to avoid many other illnesses as well.

Urges Observance Fire Prevention Week Oct. 3 To 9

Austin, Sept. 15—Urging statewide observance of the annual Fire Prevention Week, Marvin Hall, fire insurance commissioner, has written over 425 mayors of Texas cities and towns requesting their continued support of what he terms a "most profitable and worthwhile civic project." The week of October 3 to 9 has been chosen and appropriately named, Fire Prevention Week of 1937.

Adding impetus to the movement will be a proclamation issued by Governor Allred requesting cooperation and support from "every Texan interested in performing a distinct service to his State, to his community, and to himself."

"Fire uncontrolled is one of the most serious problems that confronts us today," Hall declared in his letter to Texas mayors. "For years it has taken too heavy a toll in life and property. May we suggest that you and your city officials, fire marshal, fire chief and his department begin making preparations at once for the proper observance of Fire Prevention Week this year."

Tersely expressing the theme of the Week's activities, Hall wrote: "The fire that never starts will never get out of control. Fires can be controlled, but not until every single Texas citizen accepts fire prevention as his individual responsibility."

Practical Cookery

Denton, Sept. 15—With the time approaching when a hot kitchen will be the most popular spot in the house, a few recipes for hot meals should be a welcome addition to all cooking libraries. Various experiments have been made in quickening the bread-making process, and the following ideas are proved most successful.

Emergency Biscuits

1 c. flour, 4 t. baking powder, 2 t. salt, 2 T. fat, 1 c. milk. Sift dry ingredients. Cut in fat. Add milk to make drop batter instead of dough to be rolled out. Drop by spoonfuls into muffin pans. Bake at hot oven 12 to 15 minutes.

Nut Bread

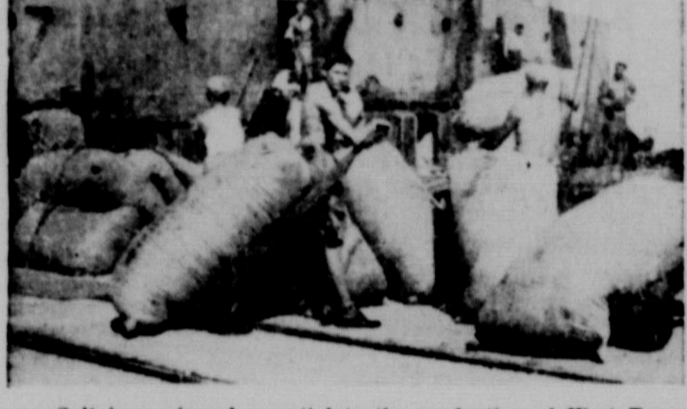
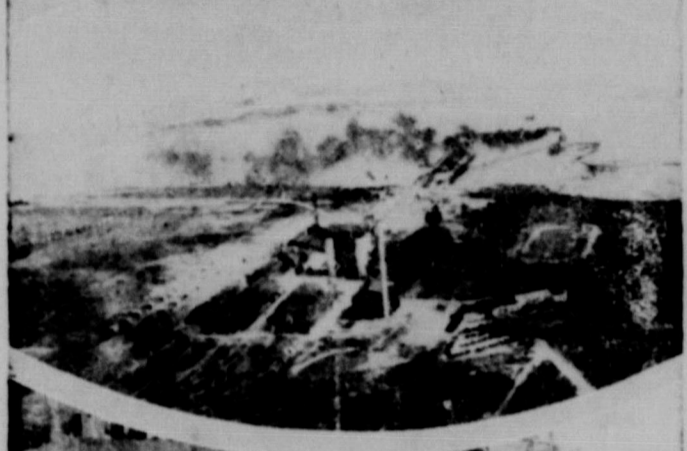
4 c. flour, 1 c. sugar, 1 t. salt, 2 t. baking powder, 2 c. milk, 3/4 c. walnuts, 1 egg. Sift all dry ingredients. Add chopped nut meats. Beat egg and add to milk. Stir into dry ingredients. Pour into greased pans. Let stand 20 minutes. Bake in moderate oven for about 1 hour.

Whole Wheat Prune Bread
1 c. prunes (wash, soak several hours, drain, stone and chop), 4 t. baking powder, 2 1/2 c. flour, 1/4 c. molasses, 1 T. melted fat, 1 t. salt, 1 1/2 c. milk. Sift dry ingredients together. Add molasses, melted fat, milk. Add prunes. Put into greased bread tins and allow to stand 30 minutes. Bake one hour in moderate oven.

Boston Brown Bread

1 c. sour milk, 1/2 c. molasses, 2 T. melted fat, 1 egg, 1 c. white flour, 1 t. soda, 1 t. salt, 1/2 c. sugar, 2 c. Graham flour. Mix Graham and white flour and all other dry ingredients except soda. Add milk and then molasses, into which soda has been put. Beat egg and add to mixture. Add melted fat. Put in greased baking dish and bake in moderate oven for 2 hours.

Salt for West Texas Wool

Tons of Honey

Denton, Sept. 15—First in size and second in sweetness—that's Texas' place since it ranks second in the United States in the production of honey. In the section around Uvalde from one to two million pounds of honey are brought to market annually. One reason for the successful production of honey in this state is the climate, with a long summer season, is particularly well adapted. Another factor is the abundance of cotton blossoms, which are better than any other flowers in making honey.

Good Brain—Good Bite

"Most active and intelligent flea in the world" is the title belonging to the West Texas sand flea. Trainers in circuses and side shows in the northern states send messengers all the way down here to get this particular kind of flea, because they say it takes a shorter time to teach them tricks and they are longer-lived. Those who have come in contact with the insect may wish to give it another title—the hardest biter.

Common Clay

Texas clays are used in everything from pottery-making to road building. Commercial refractory clays are sold for the manufacture of fibre brick, terra cotta, floor tiles and art pottery. Coarser clays yield the common red-pressed brick, drain tile and earthenware. Two other products are kaolin, utilized in the making of fine pottery, and earth for the deodorizing of oils. Many of the ordinary clays are used extensively for road building.

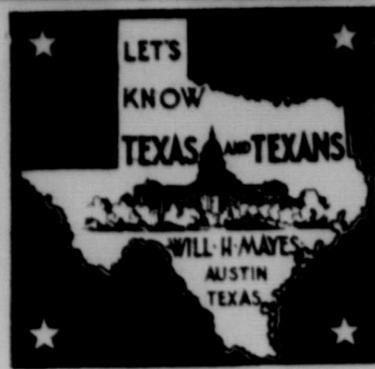

In this column answers will be given to inquiries as to Texas history and other matters pertaining to the State and its people. Address inquiries to Will H. Mayes, Austin, Texas.

Q. How many insurance companies of all kinds operate in Texas?

A. In 1936 there were 368 Texas companies and 487 out-of-state companies.

Q. When did Texas reach its peak in number of charters granted?

A. In 1929, when 2,630 charters were issued to corporations with capitalization of \$285,612,000. In 1928, 2,488 charters were filed and capitalization reached \$390,388,000.

Q. When was the Hidalgo Treaty between the United States and Mexico consummated?

A. It was signed at Guadalupe Hidalgo, Feb. 2, 1848, and later ratified by both countries, was proclaimed, July 4, 1848.

Q. What early missions in the Lower Rio Grande Valley have been memorialized by the Centennial Commission of Control?

A. Markers have been erected on the Lower Rio Grande for three missions in Mexico and one in this country as follows: Mission Joaquin del Norte, at Hidalgo and opposite Reynosa; Mission San Augustin de Laredo, west of Rio Grande City and opposite Camargo; Mission Mier, west of Roma and opposite Mier; Mission Dolores north of Zapata on approximately the original Texas site.

Q. How much land was included in a "caballeria," a "labor," and a "sitio" under the Spanish land grants in Texas?

A. A "caballeria" was 125 acres; a "labor" was 177.1 acres and a "sitio" was one square league of 4,428 acres.

Q. What is a "league" in Spanish and Mexican length measurements used in Texas?

A. The Spanish "league," used in Mexico and Texas land measurements, was 2.63 miles.

Q. What Europeans made the first attempt to explore the lower part of the Rio Grande River, and when?

A. Tradition credits Alonso de Pineda with having spent some 40 days on the river in 1519 and with having ascended it by boat for several miles. Pineda was a lieutenant of Francisco Garay, governor of Jamaica, the latter having accompanied Columbus on his second voyage to America. Garay planned to secure a grant and establish a fort near the mouth of the Rio Grande, but decided that the territory was unsuited for development.

Q. When was the first definite information as to the Lower Rio Grande Valley made known to the Spanish?

A. Little or nothing was known of the country along and north of the Rio Grande until Alonzo de Leon made a report on his search from 1686 to 1689 for La Salle's settlement.

Q. For whom was the village of Tow, recently moved from the Buchanan Lake site named?

A. For William and Willson Tow, brothers, who located there in 1854, in what soon came to be known as Tow Valley. The Tows conducted a general store there for a number of years, in which the postoffice was located.

Q. Who donated the money for the \$50,000 physical education building being erected at Baylor University?

A. Mr. and Mrs. Marrs McLean of San Antonio and Beaumont, financed the building as a tribute to his mother, Mrs. Rena Marrs McLean, for whom it is to be named.

Q. Where and under whose sponsorship was the Texas Woman's Press Association organized?

A. The organization meeting was held in the old Windsor Hotel, Dallas, May 10, 1893, at the call of Mrs. Aurelia H. Mohl of Houston, then vice-president of the National Woman's Press Association. Mrs. Mohl was elected temporary chairman, a constitution was adopted, 30 members were enrolled, permanent officers were elected and Fort Worth was selected as the next convention city.

Q. Who established the noted King Ranch in south Texas and when?

A. Capt. Richard King, in 1854.

Q. What is the appropriation for the State Planning Board for the 1938-39 biennium?

A. Fifty thousand dollars.

Q. What amounts have been appropriated for the Liquor Control Board and Old Age Assistance Commission for the next two years?

A. For the Liquor Control Board \$1,250,740; for the Old Age Assistance Commission, \$1,549,680.

Q. When, where and by whom

was the Bloys Camp Meeting established?

A. The Bloys Camp Meeting was started in 1889, in the Davis Mountains near Fort Davis, by Rev. W. B. Bloys, who was its leader until his death in 1917. The meeting is held annually on the grounds owned by the Camp Meeting Association, on which a monument has been erected as a memorial to the founder.

Q. When did Rev. W. B. Bloys locate at Fort Davis?

A. He was a Presbyterian minister who located at Fort Davis in 1888 and immediately began plans for an interdenominational camp meeting as a religious and social institution for that section of Texas. He died at Fort Davis in his 70th year. The annual gatherings draw large numbers from all parts of the state and partake somewhat of the nature of Chautauqua assemblies.

Q. To what extent has the net income of Texas railways increased in recent months?

A. The Railway Commission's last report reveals an increase in net railway income in Texas of \$4,929,303 for the first six months of 1937—96.35 per cent.

Q. When and where was the first brewery established in San Antonio?

A. In 1853 Charles P. Degen, who had come from Germany in 1850, and William Menger, founder of the Menger Hotel, began the manufacture of beer on the site of the present Menger Hotel—the first brewery in San Antonio and probably the first in Texas.

Q. Who constructed the quadrangle and other early buildings at Fort Sam Houston, San Antonio?

A. They were built in the early '70's under supervision of Gen. Edward Othe Cresup Ord, a grand son of King George IV of England by a morganatic marriage, who came to this country with a brother in his early life, and became prominent in military affairs. After able service in the Federal Army during the Civil War, Gen. Ord was sent to San Antonio in command of the Department of Texas.

Q. When was the first unit of the Menger Hotel at San Antonio constructed?

A. In 1859 by William A. Menger, a brewery being operated then in connection with the hotel. This hotel then specialized in Texas wild game of every kind, prepared under direction of Adolph Mitrovich, a noted chef of the period, and it soon attained a reputation throughout the country for its excellent cuisine.

Q. When was Nazareth Academy at Victoria founded?

A. Dec. 21, 1866, the school opening Jan. 7, 1867, with an enrollment of 55 students.

Q. Where was the Texas town known as Mantua?

A. At the close of the Civil War it was a prosperous village in the northern part of Collin County, where it was founded in 1853. The place was practically deserted in 1873, when the Houston and Texas Central Railroad was built into Van Alstyne, and is now a mere memory.

Q. Who was the first settler in what is now Houston County?

A. Daniel McLean was the first

settler, according to Judge A. A. Aldrich, local historian. McLean built a home there in 1814 and was killed in the McLean-Sheridan Indian massacre in 1837, near the present site of Elkhart.

Q. How was the Davy Crockett Memorial Auditorium at Crockett financed?

A. This auditorium of beautiful colonial design cost \$25,000, of which \$10,000 was supplied from Texas Centennial funds and the rest by the city of Crockett and by Houston County.

Q. Which is the youngest of the Texas colleges for training teachers?

A. Stephen F. Austin College at Nacogdoches, established in 1823. This college is located in a beautiful pine forest on land that was part of the homestead of Gen. Thomas J. Rusk.

Q. Are bananas successfully grown in Texas?

A. Near La Feria, Cameron County, banana trees planted four

years ago are 35 feet high and have produced finely flavored bananas this year.

Hunters Lay Down Barrage As Dove Season Opens In Area; Conflicting State And Federal Laws Explained

Supply Of Birds Plentiful; Season Closes October 31

Austin, Sept. 15 — The Texas dove hunting season, already in full swing in the Panhandle, will open in the rest of the state Wednesday and Thursday of this week, with hunters confused at the irregularity of the seasons still wondering where, when, and how they may pursue their favorite sport.

One thing was generally understood — the supply of mourning doves was plentiful, while the white wing crop in the Rio Grande valley was considered the smallest in 25 years.

The irregular seasons resulted from failure of the legislature at its last session to harmonize state and federal regulations. Will J. Tucker, executive secretary of the game commission, has announced the forthcoming special session will be asked to provide two uniform seasons—Sept. 1 to Oct. 31 for the Panhandle region, and Sept. 15 for the remainder of the state.

Because a special law limits hunting of both mourning doves and white wings to Saturdays, Sundays, Tuesdays and Thursdays of each week in the Rio Grande valley area south of the Texas-Mexican railway, the season in that section will not open this year until Thursday. Elsewhere shooting may begin Wednesday.

The white wing season—Sept. 15 to Oct. 31—is uniform except in the lower Rio Grande valley where the specific hunting days are provided.

The daily bag limit on each species is 15. The possession limit is 15 of each species, or 15 in the aggregate of both species.

Mourning doves and white wings may be shot from 7 a. m. until sunset of each day during the open season.

Both species of birds may be taken only with shotguns not larger than 10 gauge and capable of holding only three shells. Magazine guns will be allowed to hold only three shells at one time in the magazine and chamber combined.

The magazine must be permanently plugged so that it will hold only two shells.

During the open season in Mexico, a maximum of 15 mourning doves or white wings, or an aggregate of 15 of both species, may be transported into Texas during a calendar week provided the birds were legally killed in Mexico and are accompanied by an export permit. If a person possessed 15 doves lawfully imported from Mexico, he would be in violation of federal regulations if he possessed any additional birds, even though they were killed in Texas.

Dove shooting began in the Panhandle Sept. 1, and will continue through Oct. 31. This area includes Yoakum, Terry, Lynn, Garza, Kent, Stonewall, King, Cottle, and Childress counties, and all other counties to the north and west.

There will be an open season from Sept. 15 to Oct. 31 on both mourning and white wing doves in most of the state, including the following West Texas counties: Coleman, Brown, McCulloch, San Saba, Mason, Llano, Gillespie, Blanco, Kendall, Bandera, Kerr, Kimble, Menard, Concho, Runnels, Taylor, Jones, Haskell, Knox, Foard, Hardeman, Fisher, Nolan, Coke, Tom Green, Schleicher, Sutton, Edwards, Real, Scurry, Mitchell, Sterling, Irion, Reagan, Crockett, Glasscock, Howard, Borden, Dawson, Martin, Midland, Upton, Pecos, Terrell, Brewster, Crane, Ector, Andrews, Gaines, Winkler, Ward, Loving, Jeff Davis, Reeves, Presidio, Culbertson, Hudspeth, and El Paso.

An open season from Sept. 15 to Oct. 31 is provided for those portions of Val Verde, Kinney, Bexar, Comal, Hays, Travis, Bastrop, Lee, Fayette, Washington, Grimes, Montgomery, San Jacinto, Polk, Angelina, Nacogdoches, and Shelby counties north and west of the Southern Pacific railway, the Missouri Pacific railway, the H. and T. C. railway, the Beaumont branch of the Santa Fe, and the Houston East and West Texas railway. In the remaining portions of the counties named above there will be no open season under present state laws and federal regulations, and for the same reason there will be no open season in Maverick, Karnes, Wilson, Guadalupe, Caldwell, Gonzales, Lavaca, Colorado, Austin, Waller, Liberty, Hardin, Tyler, Jasper, Newton, Sabine, and San Augustine counties.

There will be an open season for mourning doves from Oct. 1 to Nov. 15, in Uvalde, Medina, Zavalla, Frio, Dimmitt, LaSalle, McMillen, Atascosa, Live Oak, Bexar, San Patricio, Aransas, Refugio,

Goliad, DeWitt, Victoria, Calhoun, Jackson, Matagorda, Wharton, Fort Bend, Brazoria, Galveston, Harris, Chambers, Jefferson, and Orange counties, and that portion of Webb, Jim Wells, Duval and Nueces counties that is situated north of the Texas-Mexican railway. In the counties named in this paragraph, the open season for white wings, however, will be Sept. 15 to Oct. 31.

Both white wings and mourning doves may be hunted on Saturdays, Sundays, Tuesdays and Thursdays only, in that portion of Webb, Duval, Jim Wells, and Nueces counties south of the Texas-Mexican railway and in Zapata, Starr, Hidalgo, Cameron, Willacy, Jim Hogg, Brooks, Kennedy, and Kleberg counties.

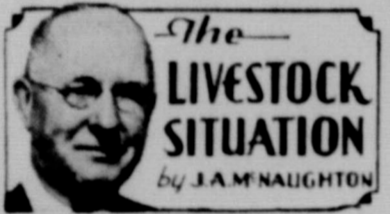

Los Angeles, Calif. Sept. 15 — Despite the higher level of stocker and feeder cattle prices this fall, there is a feeling of optimism on the part of cattle feeders that, in view of lower feed and forage prices, next year may offer a reliable and stable outlet for fed cattle. The very fact that there is available in most parts of the country an abundant supply of grain and other feeds is expected to exert a stable influence on the markets as feeders will be able to carry on a policy of orderly marketing not possible when there is a shortage of feedstuffs.

That the fall market is likely to remain favorable to the sustaining of favorable prices to producers and feeders seems likely, in the opinion of market observers. Actual marketings of cattle this fall, particularly from the western range states, is expected to be somewhat smaller than a year ago. An added strengthening influence is the likelihood that there will be more than the usual competition between slaughterers and cattle feeders.

Ranges and pastures in the far western states and most of the Great Plains country are reported as very satisfactory. This fact will enable cattlemen in states affected by the 1936 drought to hold back a larger proportion of young stock and foundation breeding animals. On the other hand, the relatively high price situation may be an incentive for cattlemen to realize cash in many instances. It would seem worthwhile for many range operators to make use of the present favorable price situation to practice rigid culling of their herds.
