

October Employment Declines Slightly **Over Sept. Figures**

Austin, Nov. 24-Reports to the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research from more than 1.700 Texas establishments showed that a total of nearly 89,-000 workers were employed in these plants during October, an increase of 7.5 per cent over the like month last year, but a decline of .7 per cent from the preceding month. Total weekly payrolls of these firms, \$2,262,371, were up 18 per cent from a year ago but there was no change from the month before.

Cities in which the percentage gains in both employment and pay rolls over both the month before and October last year were above the state average were: Abilene, Amarillo, Beaumont, Dallas, Fort Worth, Houston, and Wichita Falls.

Industries whose percentage increase in employment and payrolls were above the state average during the comparable periods were: chemicals, cotton oil mills, meat packing, and business and personal service.

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
