## Crockett Casts Only 23 Votes On Amendments

### Negligible Interest Shown In Constitutional Changes

Only twenty-three Crockett County voters took the trouble to go to the polls Monday to register an opinion on the six proposed amendments to the state constitution submitted by the legislature at a special election.

Twenty-one votes cast at the Ozona box, with two at the Howard Well voting place.

All of the six proposed changes were approved by a majority of the handful of voters who expressed an opinion at the polls.

The vote on the six proposals in this county was as follows: Bank stock liability, 16 for and 5 against in Ozona and 2 against at Howard Well; aid for destitute children 18 for, 1 against, with 2 against at Howard; abolishing salary system, 10 for, 7 against, with 1 and 1 at Howard; tax discount, 16 for, 1 against, and again a split at Howard; Harris County road plan, 8 for, 5 against, and both against at Howard; aid for blind, 17 for, 1 against, both for at Howard.

Reports from over the state indicate all of the amendments were approved by the voters with the exception of that abolishing the salary system for compensating public officers and returning to the fee basis.

## Mrs. V. I. Pierce Is Critically Ill In Santone Hospital

Latest reports this week from the bedside of Mrs. Victor Pierce of Ozona, who is critically ill in a San Antonio hospital, indicate that she is still in serious condition, but that some improvement has been noted.

Mrs. Pierce was rushed to San Antonio late last week and an immediate operation for appendicitis was performed. The condition had advanced to such a point that physicians for a time gave her less than an even chance for recovery.

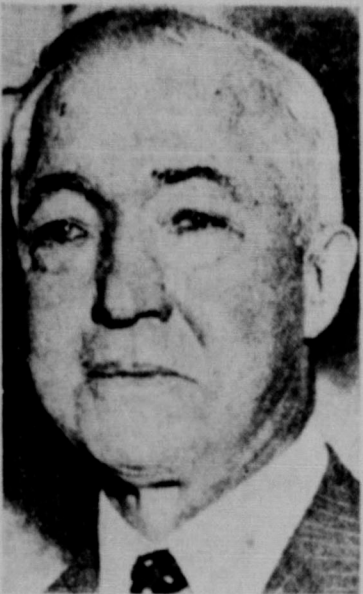

## Crane And Iraan To Fight It Out For Leadership

### Second Half Topnotchers Scheduled For Weew-End Series

Crane and Iraan teams of the Permian Basin League will fight it out next Saturday and Sunday for the second half championship of the league. The two teams, now tied for first place in the percentage column, with the Iraan team in the slight advantage by virtue of three more games to its credit, meet Saturday in Iraan and Sunday in Crane.

On the outcome of this series will hinge the second half flag. Should the Iraan crew take both games of the series, they would cinch the flag. A split would leave affairs very much up in the air, with the Cranes then left a good chance to win by taking all three of their remaining games, or to tie by taking two.

While these two crucial battles are in progress, the Ozona-Sonora combination will be at grips with the Texon nine, Saturday at Texon and Sunday in Ozona. The games will have little bearing on the outcome of the second half, except for a remote possibility of a three-way tie in which Texon might figure should a lot of "ifs" be hurdled, but a pair of interesting and exciting ball games are always in the making when these two teams are scheduled for a series.

Meanwhile, Ozona and Sonora fans and ballplayers alike, will be keeping one ear cocked for news of the Iraan-Crane battle, which may determine the opponent the two-town team, first half winners, will face in the playoff.

### New High Market Is Set By Crockett Lambs

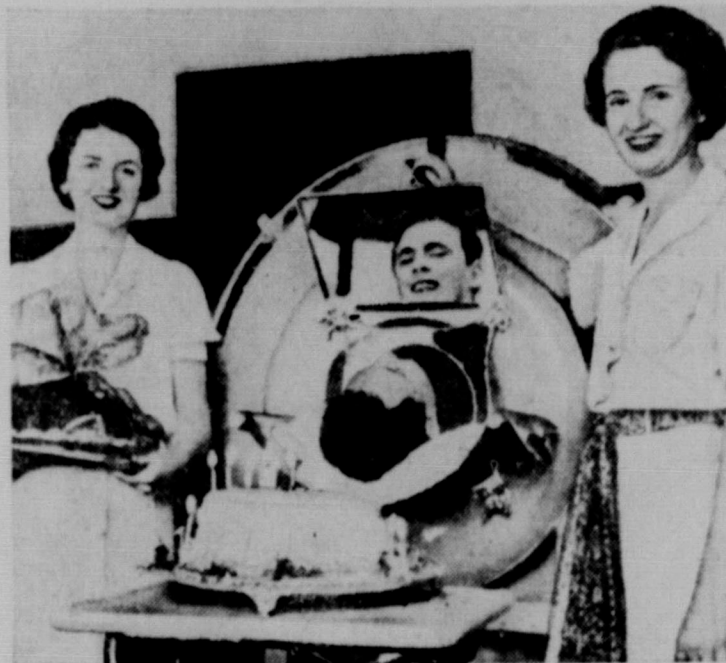
Crockett County lambs have again led the way in the upward trend of the sheep market with the sale yesterday by Joe Montague, who ranches in this county, of 5,500 of his mutton lambs at 8½ cents a pound.

The lambs were purchased by Amos Womble, buyer for John Clay & Co., commission firm. Delivery is to be between Sept. 15 and Oct. 1. It is estimated the Montague lambs will weigh from 65 to 70 pounds.

Watt Turner has sold 3,500 head of mixed lambs to the Webb Farm Co. of Fort Stockton at 8 cents a pound. The lambs are to go on irrigated farms near Fort Stockton for a while and then go on feed.

## Osborn Raps Out Homer In Tenth For Crane Win

### Ozona-Sonora Bow Before Effective Work Of 10th Man

Gus Leedy, tenth man on the Crane club, had the Ozona-Sonora combination "on the hip" Sunday afternoon at Sonora and kept them there until his "teammates" could get a lucky punch in the tenth for another "victory". Result: Crane 3, Ozona-Sonora, 1.

In the extra inning, Bob Osborn, pitcher-manager of the "ballgame-at-any-price" club, connected solidly with one of Al Crostwaite's pitches for a home-run with one aboard, which proved the necessary margin.

With Tenth-man Leedy good in the clutches, Osborn kept the Ozona-Sonora crew's nine hits well scattered, while Crane's seven hits, counted for three runs. Even with the Gas House gang's five errors to none for the locals, with three walks issued by Osborn to two by Crostwaite, and the 9 to 7 hitting advantage, the Ozona-Sonora crew was ineffective. The locals had 12 left on bases, Crane 4.

An unlooked-for contingency arose in the ninth inning after the Crane gang had led by one score from the fourth, when Mangold reached over the plate to get one of Osborn's Leedy strikes and rapped it to right field for three bases, scoring Ratliff, who had walked. But that was the only trouble the combination experienced in the afternoon's display of bad temper and worse language.

By virtue of the win, the Crane team stepped into a tie with the league leading Iraan Oilers. Saturday's game, scheduled at Crane, was rained out.

## Former Ozona Child Attains Genius Rating In Intelligence Test Given By University Of San Antonio Prof.

### Little Bobby Taylor, 5, Son Of Rev. and Mrs. R. A. Taylor, Is Child Prodigy

In an intelligence test given before a class in psychology at the University of San Antonio recently, little Bobby Taylor, 5-year-old son of Rev. and Mrs. R. A. Taylor, former Ozona residents, attained a rating well above that of genius, according to a news story appearing last week in the San Antonio Express.

The youngster was discovered as a child prodigy when Dr. D. B. Harmon, professor of Psychology, used him as a demonstration subject for the revised Stanford-Binet intelligence test. Bobby made a score of 154 on the test.

## Abandon Superior Deep Test After Salt Water Shows

Drilling equipment was being moved out this week following abandonment of the Superior Oil Co. and others' No. 1 Massie unit on the J. S. Todd ranch in this county, drilled to below 7,900 feet seeking Ordovician production.

The well was ordered abandoned after swabbing salt water with a very slight showing of oil in testing at intervals between 1,230 and 1,270 feet. The test was plugged back to 1,370 feet and 7-inch casing cemented at 1,230 feet. The well had no shows of consequence in the Ellenburger, lower Ordovician formation, which was topped at 7,424 feet, 300 feet lower than in Stanolind No. 1 J. S. Todd, a dry hole 1¼ miles to the northwest.

## Henry Oberkamp, Father Of Ozonan Buried In Angelo

Funeral services were conducted in San Angelo at 10 o'clock Saturday morning for Henry Oberkamp, 77, well known San Angelo business man and operator of a plumbing establishment there for many years, who died at 11 o'clock Friday night in a hospital in that city.

Mr. Oberkamp was the father of Joe Oberkamp, Ozona business man.

Death was due to a heart ailment. He had been ill for about ten days.

Mr. Oberkamp moved to San Angelo in 1887 from New Braunfels and entered the plumbing business there in 1911. He was associated with a son, Harry, in the wholesale and retail business. Survivors besides the two sons include one daughter, Mrs. Ann Osler of Dallas.

## J. W. Owens Named President Natl. Rambouillet Assn.

### Crockett County Breeder Succeeds Candland Of Utah

J. W. Owens of Ozona, nationally prominent breeder of registered Rambouillet sheep, was named president of the American Rambouillet Sheep Breeders Association at the annual convention of the association in Salt Lake City Tuesday.

Mr. Owens succeeds W. D. Candland, of Mt. Pleasant, Utah, as head of the national Rambouillet association.

D. T. Jones of San Angelo, another well known breeder, was named a director in the organization. Winn Hansen of Collinston, Utah, one of the regular contributors of fine animals for the annual Crockett County sheep show and sale, was also named a director.

Headquarters offices of the association are now located in Marysville, Ohio, and breeders in this section see a possibility of location of headquarters here with election of Mr. Owens to head the organization.

## Delinquent Tax May Be Paid In 20 Installments

### New Law Requires First Installment Be Paid Before Sept. 1

A new law, passed by the 45th Legislature, which became effective August 21, permits payment of delinquent taxes on the "installment plan."

The law was written to become effective July 1, with the deadline for paying first installments set for September 1. However, the bill known as House Bill 456, lacked the necessary majority of passage to insure its immediate effectiveness, and the measure did not become law until 90 days after adjournment of the legislature.

Under the terms of the law, a taxpayer owing more than \$10 in delinquent taxes may pay such taxes in twenty equal installments over a period of 20 months from July 1, 1937. A time limit was set for life of the law, and taxpayers who wish to take advantage of the installment plan must pay the first installment before September 1.

Only five days remaining in which taxpayers may take advantage of the plan, Sheriff W. S. Willis has called attention to provisions of the law and urges those wishing to use that method of paying delinquencies to call at the collector's office at once.

## Ozonan's Brother Radio Operator On Shelled Ship

### W. D. Lucas On Vessel Struck By Missile In China Waters

W. D. Lucas, a brother of Elbert Lucas of Ozona, is a radio operator on the U. S. S. Augusta, which was the target for a stray shell in the Sino-Japanese fighting around Shanghai last week.

The shell, which exploded on the ship, killed one sailor and injured thirteen others. Although the Ozonan had had no definite word concerning his brother's fate in the incident, he was confident that he escaped injury, since his duties on board ship would likely have called for his being below decks.

THE TAX SPECIAL SESSION

Reports from Austin indicate the existence of considerable recalcitrancy among legislators in the matter of a special session to be called for the single purpose of adjusting the state taxes—upward. The opposition generally rests on the improved conditions of all manner of business within the legislative districts.

If the proposed special session were called for the broad purpose of readjustment of the entire state tax process and made to include some provision for settlement of the huge volume of unpaid taxes, variously estimated between \$50,000,000 and 75,000,000, the tax paying public might feel that the special session expense would be justified. It being generally taken for granted, however, that the sole incentive for the session is a program of separate tax increases, the objections being voiced by numerous legislators are wholly valid.

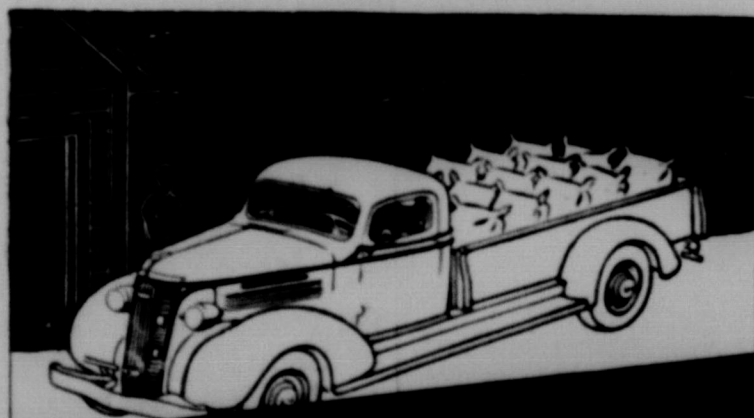
It is true that some measure of prosperity is returning to most Texas industries and that such a condition betokens a corresponding increase in tax payments. It is a mere guess at the volume. It would seem very much better gubernatorial judgment to hope for the best instead of expensively registering fear of the worst. Tax payers are entitled to the "break" they indubitably have earned during the recent seven years of burden carrying that has been theirs. It is true that a deficit exists in the state treasury, but when has one not existed?

It would be interesting to know the figure of a referendum majority against another special session. —Fort Worth Star-Telegram

### Practical Cookery

Dept. Home of Economics

Denton, Aug. 25—"The same old thing!" How many husbands and children make this remark when they look discontentedly at the food before them? But this cruel cry is surprisingly unnecessary. Mistress Cook merely has to try out some new ideas in the preparation of old foods and the problem vanishes.

#### Spanish Beans

1 qt. kidney beans, 1 pt. strained tomato, 1 chopped onion, 1 chopped pepper, 1 t. paprika, 1/4 lb. fat pork, 1 T. salt. Soak beans overnight, drain, cover with water. Parboil 1 hour. Drain. Put in southern dish, add other ingredients and hot water to cover. Cook 6 to 8 hours.

#### Stuffed Peppers

6 large green peppers, 1 T. chopped onion, 1 c. canned corn, 1 c. bread crumbs, 1/2 c. milk, 2 T. flour, 1 T. butter, 1 egg. Parboil peppers 10 minutes in 1 qt. water. Cut stem end, remove seeds, and stuff with stuffing made from other ingredients. To make stuffing, make white sauce from milk, butter, flour, salt, onion and add corn and cook 5 minutes. Add beaten egg and bread crumbs to absorb excess moisture. After peppers are stuffed, cover top with bread crumbs and bake in moderate oven until brown.

#### Bean Loaf

2 c. dried lima beans, 1 c. dry bread crumbs, 4 T. peanut butter, 1 T. bacon fat, 2 T. grated onion, 1/2 salt, 1/2 t. pepper, 1 c. water or other liquid, 1 T. celery leaves or seed. Wash, soak, and cook beans 1 hour. Drain. When cool chop coarsely and add crumbs and all other ingredients. Put into greased bread pan and bake in moderate oven 30 minutes.

#### Peanuts and Rice

1/2 c. uncooked rice, 1 1/2 c. white sauce, 1/4 c. chopped peanuts, white sauce. To make white sauce use 1 c. milk, 2 T. flour. Cook rice in boiling water, keeping grains separate. Drain. Put in buttered baking dish. Add white sauce and peanuts and heat in moderate oven 20 minutes.

#### Plenty to Print

Denton, Aug. 25—News is flashed into Texas homes by a total of 909 publications, according to the 1937 Ayer & Son directory. Of this number 773 are newspapers. With 579 incorporated communities in the state, 563 of them have newspapers located there. A great majority of these papers, 620, are weeklies, 131 are dailies, 20 the semi-weeklies and 2 are monthlies.

#### A Snakey Story

Down in the Valley is located probably the largest snake ranch in the world. "Snakeville" is operated by W. S. "Snake" King, one of the foremost collectors of reptiles in the United States. He supplies large museums and parks both here and in foreign countries with rare specimens. Most of his pets come from Mexico. He sells them by the pound, the price varying according to rarity and condition. In his lifetime he has handled nearly three hundred thousand snakes.

#### Church-Going Texans

With the highest percentage of church-goers per capita of any state in the nation, Texas claims 2,280,366 church members. There are 63 denominations in the state and 15,962 churches, according to the U. S. religious census in 1926. Leading denominations are the Baptist, Roman Catholic and Methodist.

### Syphilis Is Major Health Problem Of Present Generation

Austin, Aug. 25—"The eradication of syphilis is today's major health problem and our children will hold us incompetent if we fail to control syphilis within this generation," said Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

Since inauguration of the national campaign, the public has been made aware of much of the truth about syphilis. While the vast importance of syphilis in general has been stressed, further emphasis needs to be placed on hereditary or prenatal syphilis, one of the most readily preventable types of the disease. Prenatal syphilis is an innocently contracted form, transmitted by an infected expectant mother to her unborn child. The disease in the child can be prevented in almost every instance, provided the mother receives proper treatment during pregnancy. Syphilis, in a sense, is chivalrous; it deals more kindly with women than with men. The early signs of infection are usually not manifest in women; this is especially true during pregnancy. Blood tests, therefore, are all the more essential in the early recognition of syphilis in women.

It has been determined that syphilis affects approximately two to three and a half per cent of the white children attending hospital clinics. People should appreciate also the fact that many cases of syphilis are contracted innocently, in marriage and before birth. Syphilis in itself, is not a disgrace. Disgrace lies rather in the failure of people to take advantage of modern medical science and in failure to assure an equal chance in life for all of Texas' children.

To eradicate prenatal syphilis and thereby give the newborn child its rightful heritage of a sound mind and a sound body, health authorities urge observance of the following measures: (1) blood tests for syphilis, effecting both parties who contemplate marriage; (2) a blood test for syphilis on every expectant mother, and (3) thorough treatment if necessary for the benefit of both mother and child.

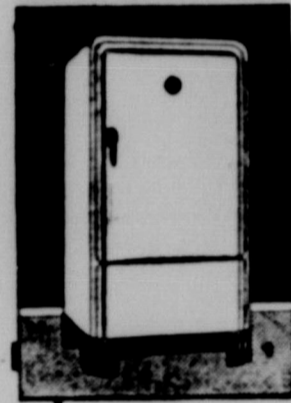

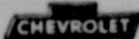

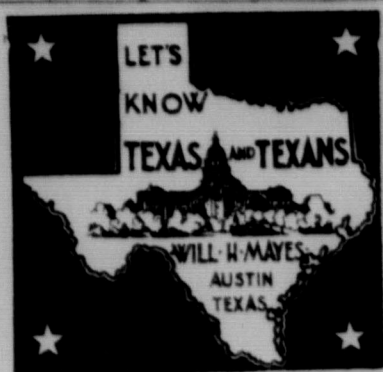

In this column answers will be given to inquiries as to Texas history and other matters pertaining to the State and its people. Address inquiries to Will H. Mayes, Austin, Texas.

**Q. What is meant by chemurgic farming?**

A. The term is so all-inclusive that it is difficult to define briefly, but as this columnist understands it means the scientific use of farm products by enlarging and adapting industrial outlets. For instance the conversion of pine stumps, sawdust and other pine wastages into resin products, sweet potatoes into starch, cotton seed hulls into wallboard is farm chemurgy, as is also the scientific use of chemicals in farm production.

**Q. Where was Camp San Elizario?**

A. Camp Elizario was established as a presidio in 1718 on the Rio Grande about 25 miles below El Paso, and was garrisoned by U. S. troops in 1850, but later abandoned, but used intermittently by Texas rangers as temporary headquarters.

**Q. Who was Chief Victorio?**

A. A notorious chief and warrior who led a murderous, thieving band near the Rio Grande in Texas and Mexico from 1879 until his death in 1880 in an engagement with Mexican soldiers under Gen. Joaquin Terrazas. He was a military genius of even greater ability than Geronimo and had fought some 200 engagements with Indian tribes, Texas and Mexican forces.

**Q. Who was Chief Victorio's leading lieutenant and war chief?**

A. Nana, who joined Geronimo with a band of about 50 after the death of Victorio and was finally captured by Gen. Lawton with Geronimo in 1886 and sent to a U. S. Government reservation in Florida, where he died. Nana and his band are said to have massacred more people than any other small Indian force ever known.

**Q. When was Judge W. E. Hawkins a member of the Supreme Court of Texas?**

A. From 1912 to 1920. Judge Hawkins, who died at Abilene, July 23, was born at Greenwood, La., Sept. 26, 1862, and was brought to Texas when a child by his parents, Rev. and Mrs. Samuel J. Hawkins. He was graduated from Southwestern University at Georgetown, and married Miss Ella Dickason of Dallas, where he taught school and practiced law until appointed assistant attorney general in 1905. Chief Justices Thomas J. Brown and Nelson Phillips were among his contemporaries on the Supreme bench.

**Q. How many mules are there in Texas and how many are annually shipped from the state?**

A. There are approximately 900,000 mules in the state; the out-of-state shipments in 1936 were estimated at 40,000, mostly going

**Q. What forest pine trees are best adapted to making paper?**

A. Non-resinous pines under 25 years old, such as are found in great abundance in the cut-over areas of East Texas, are said to be better adapted to paper making than the larger trees that have been used from Canadian forests. About 90 percent of the long leaf area of the South has been cut over.

**Q. What is meant by strip-cropping and why is it recommended?**

A. It is the planting of cane, oats and other noncultivated crops in strips between corn, cotton and other crops that are given frequent cultivation. It reduces runoff during rains, lessens moisture loss during droughts, increases organic matter in the soil, and keeps plant food better balanced in the top soil.

**Q. What laudatory inscription in memory of George W. Glasscock, Sr., has been placed in the Williamson County courthouse?**

A. The Texas Centennial Commission of Control has placed on the courthouse at Georgetown a plaque bearing the inscription: "In memory of George Washington Glasscock, Sr., for whom the city of Georgetown and the county of Glasscock, Texas, are named. Born in Kentucky, April 11, 1810, participated in Black Hawk war 1832, came to Texas in 1834, and fought for its independence from Mexico, 1835-36. Surveyor,

to the cotton areas of the Mississippi valley and the southeastern states.

**Q. Where has the Federal Government recently acquired land for a large southern game preserve?**

A. In Cameron Parish, La., across Lake Sabine from Port Arthur, where 137,235 acres has been purchased for a wild life preserve, one of the largest game preserves in the South. All types of game abound in the area, especially wild fowl.

**Q. Will you give a brief sketch of Capt. James B. Gillett, ex-ranger who died at Temple, June 11, 1937.**

A. He was born in Austin, November 4, 1856, son of James S. and Elizabeth Harper Gillett. His boyhood dream was for service as a Texas ranger, for which his outdoor training especially fitted him. In 1875 he joined Company D at Menardville under Capt. Dan W. Roberts and in 1879 went to Yselta with Capt. G. Baylor with whom he served six and a half years, after which he held the offices of marshal and chief of police at El Paso. Later he engaged in ranching and in business, with his home at Marfa. His book "Six Years With the Texas Rangers," is an authoritative record of the ranger service of the period.

**Q. What distinctive honor was conferred on Capt. James B. Gillett?**

A. Years after he had retired

from ranger service, Gov. B. Sterling, at the suggestion of Adjutant General W. W. Sterling, appointed him "Captain of Texas Rangers," he being the only person ever to receive this honorary distinction.

**Q. Why has a dam been constructed across Taylor's Bay near Port Arthur?**

A. This dam, or levy, 350 feet long and costing \$50,000, was built to protect the lower Jefferson County rice lands against encroachment of salt water, rice being one of the most valuable crops of the county.

### West Texas Ranchers, Farmers Benefit From Conservation Program

The building of earthen tanks and reservoirs is the practice of most interest to West Texas farmers participating in the Range Conservation Program, reports of county agricultural agents in that section indicate, but other practices such as eradication of Prickly Pear, cedar, and deferred grazing are receiving much attention.

To date, 31 dam sites have been located in Brown county. Elevations on these dams have been taken and stakes for the base of the dams have been set. Applications for the building of 101 more tanks are on file in the office of the county agricultural agent, and these tanks will be measured and completed as rapidly as possible. The water area impounded by these tanks runs from one-eighth of an acre to 10 acres.

The lines run on one spreader dam on the Means ranch in Jeff Davis county when completed will turn a vast volume of water from an arroyo onto about 20 sections of grazing land where it will be irrigated in one body. This dam when completed will be 1800 feet long and from 8 to 9 feet high.

W. W. Sherrill cleared a 70-acre trap of prickly pear in 10 days with three men and a truck. Using labor at \$1.75 per day per man this work cost him 75 cents per acre. The pear on the Sherrill ranch was classed as medium by the range inspector and Sherrill will draw 75 cents an acre from the government for compliance.

Ranchmen in Menard county have made application to build 56 earthen tanks and reservoirs which will total 87,435 cubic yards of dirt to be used in the dam sites.

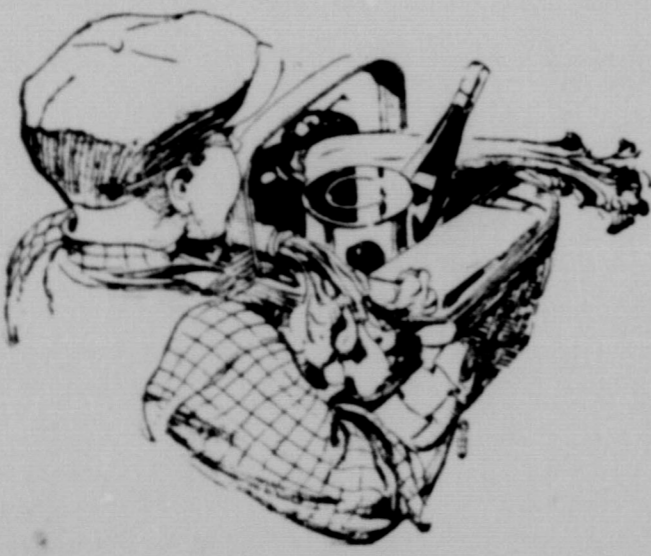
