Crockett Growers Set Pace In Establishing New High

#### 55.050 HEAD SOLD

#### Nearly 30 Growers In Pool Making Up Big Deal

Crockett County sheepmen set the pace for the 1937 feeder lamb made in Texas in a decade when a group of nearly thirty growers pooled lambs for a sale of 50,050 head at that figure in a deal closed here Saturday.

The estimated \$250,000 sale was made to Jess Elrod and Bob Weatherby of San Angelo, for northern feeders.

The 8 cent price was a half cent rise in offers being made through the territory, representing the dividends of Crockett County growers on their investment in the best quality bucks and careful breeding for maximum quality pro duction in their flocks-a premium quality always found by buyers of Crockett County produced wool and sheep.

Two years ago, 25,000 tons were thus sold, for 3226,000 and in 1933 the canned portion of the crop amounted to only \$10,000. The number of Texas plants has grown from three to 25.





Denton, July 28- Baking powder biscuits, so easy to make, offer a variety of suggestions to the busy housewife. They are particularly good for lunches or sup-

Cheese biscuits are delicious with fruit salad, and for breakfast nothing can top cinnamon rolls. Hhere are a few other varlations which can make a meal into an occasion.

#### Baking Power Biscuits

3 c. flour, 1 t. salt, 6 t. baking powder, 3 to 6 T. shortening, and 1 c. milk. Sift dry ingredients, work in shortening with fingers, fork or two knives until the mixture is like very coarse corn meal. Add liquid all at once and stir quickly until mixture thickens. Place dough on lightly floured board and roll or pat out 1/2 to 1 inch thickness. If a fine grain is desired they should be kneaded or about 12 minute. Cut with floured cutter and place biscuits n baking pan. Bake at 425 F. for 12 to 15 minutes.




