Officials, Players Pronounce Meet Best In History

BIG LAKE SECOND

Owls Drop Heartbreaking Final By One Point Margin

With a blazing finish in both the championship and consolation brackets, the curtain was rung down Saturday night on the most successful and spectacular annual basketball tournament in the history of Ozona High School's annual tournament.

McCamey's Badgers, coached by Cuthbert Carrl, nosed out the fighting Big Lake Owls of Coach Roy White 32-31 in a hair-raising championship finish Saturday night. As thrilling as the tourney championship bout was the consolation final in which the Grandfalls Vaqueros shaded the Sanderson quint by a score of 25 to 23 in an extra period fracas.

Whitney of Big Lake, one of the tournament's outstanding players, almost beat the McCamey crew single handed, piling up a total of 24 points for the tournament's one game scoring record. The Badgers showed themselves superior to the Owls in the free chunking department, ringing up a total of 10 single points via this route to seven by the Owls, six of them by Whitney. The Owls outpunched the Badgers in the field goal throwing, marking up 12 to 11 by the McCamey lads.

Fierro Is Outnumbered
Fierro, ace Mexican player from Sanderson, was the big show in the consolation final. The wiry little Latin-American gave the enemy plenty of worries, but was outnumbered, and they finally wore him down in the extra period.

Team trophies, beautiful mounted silver basketballs, went to McCamey team as tournament champions, to the Big Lake crew as runners up, and to the Grand Falls Vaqueros as consolation champions.

Coach Ted White, generalissimo of the tourney, saw his Lions go down in the semi-finals in a heart breaking loss to the Big Lake Owls, who nosed out the Lions 19 to 15 in a frenzied skirmish. Coach White's spirits, however, if dimmed any by his team's loss in an otherwise perfect meet, were revived to the point of jubilation when one of his crew was awarded a place on the No. 1 all-tournament team selection. Crockett Voting Strength Stands At 756 This Year

717 Polls, 39 Exempts Registered At Close Of Period

Crockett County's voting strength in the coming elections of 1938 will be 756, according to a tabulation of poll taxes and exemptions issued through the office of the county tax collector at the close of the tax paying period Monday night.

The number of voters is 93 less than the total voting strength for 1936, the last election year, records reveal. In that year a total of 849 votes were registered, 763 via the poll tax route and 86 through exemptions. This year, the division is 717 poll taxes and only 39 exemptions. The number, however, is nearly 300 more than the total registration last year, an "off" year politically.

An unprecedented rush swamped the tax collecting force here Monday, the last day of the paying period. Bill Littleton, pinch hitting for Deputy Claude Russell, who is confined to his room with a severe attack of tonsillitis, and Sheriff W. S. Willis kept the office open until the midnight hour. The register of voters was completed Tuesday with tabulation of applications received by mail the last day.

Although the office has not had time to make a check-up on tax collections for the period, it is believed that the percentage of collections will run high. Approximately \$16,000 had been totalled for the last two days collections, with a big stack of payments coming by mail that had not yet been entered and counted. Totals on collections for the period will be available in a few days, officials said.

It was believed that Mr. Glover lay unconscious on the floor of his office for nearly three hours before his plight was discovered. He was taken immediately to his home where he was given medical attention, and at last reports yesterday was doing well, gradually regaining use of his arms, which were affected by the stroke.

Mr. Glover's resignation as justice of the peace for this precinct was being prepared this week for presentation to the Commissioners Court at its meeting this month. As soon as he is able to move, he will be taken to Lometa, where he will make his home with a daughter.

Organize Local Unit Of State Teachers Assn.

Teachers Here Form Organization Under Federation Plan

Organization of a Crockett County unit of the Texas State Teachers Association under a federation plan adopted at the last convention of the association was effected at a meeting of teachers of local schools the first of this week.

Under the new set-up of the heretofore statewide organization, local units are to be formed in the various counties, with a minimum of 25 members to the unit, and these units in turn affiliated with district organizations throughout the state.

C. S. Denham, superintendent of schools, was elected president of the local unit. Mrs. Ted White was named vice president in charge of publicity, Guinn Carruthers, vice president in charge of program, Miss Mildred North, secretary, and C. E. Nelson, treasurer. Mr. Denham was named as delegate from the unit to the district meeting which will be in San Angelo or Brownwood next month.

At present, the Crockett County units are assigned to District 6, which extends from Sutton to El Paso County. However, the unit has the privilege of asking affiliation with an adjoining district and may become a part of the San Angelo district, which is District No. 11.

Citizens, Court Meet With State Officials At 2 p. m.

John V. Singleton, chief of the Centennial Division, State Board of Control, William McVey of Houston, sculptor, and Donald Nelson of Austin, architect, will be in Ozona tomorrow (Friday) to meet with members of the Crockett County Commissioners Court and a committee of interested citizens to discuss plans for the proposed memorial to David Crockett, money for which has been set aside by the Texas Centennial Commission.

This information was conveyed this week in a letter received by Judge Charles E. Davidson from Mr. Singleton. The men who will have charge of directing construction of the memorial will arrive here about noon Friday and the Commissioners Court will be hosts at a luncheon at the Hotel Ozona upon their arrival.

Following the luncheon, the group will gather at the courthouse where the public is invited to hear the discussion of the proposal.

An allocation of \$7,500 was recently made by the Centennial Commission for the David Crockett memorial to be located in Ozona. A full explanation of the type of memorial contemplated will be available to the citizenship in the meeting here Friday.

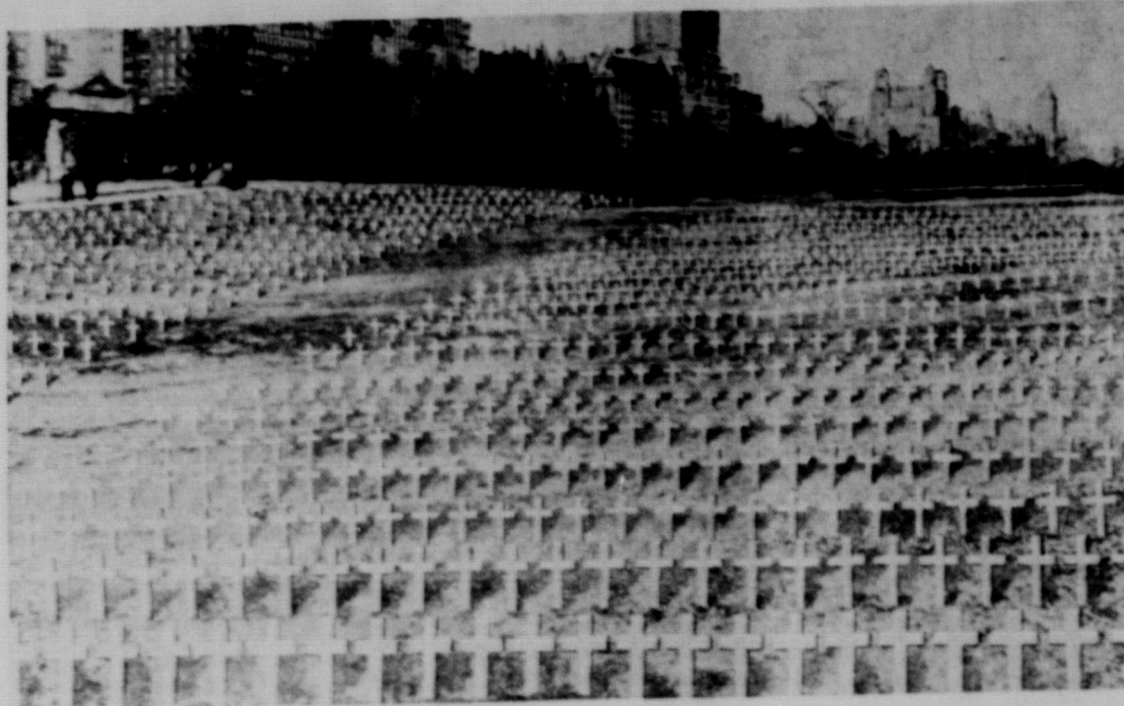
THE SPIRIT OF '38

With the battle against the depression and recession entering its ninth year, the war of 1776 for political liberty, has come to be a case of we'll all hang together, or we'll all hang apart.

In those days when the United States was drawing a first lusty breath in a world dominated by the sea-straddling power of England, Benjamin Franklin stood before the national fathers gathered to sign the Declaration of Independence. Then as now, basic differences of opinion, station and inheritance separated the citizens of the United States. Franklin, as he signed the birth certificate of the new nation, knew he spoke the truth as he placed his pen on the parchment: "We must all hang together, or surely we shall all hang separately."

Now in 1938, with a declaration of economic independence fresh on our national program, we face again a bitter war and a divided nation. In the battle against re-

The national crisis of 1929-38 has not been without its Valley Forge. That the bawling infant's spirit of '76 is still the spirit of '38 gives proof that the war for economic stability will cross its Delaware and know the victory of Yorktown.

LYNCHING AND THE LAW

As Congress completes its first month of work, the legislative parade is again being delayed by the determined opposition of the Southern Democrats to the anti-lynching bill. The Southerners, under the fighting leadership of Senator Tom Connally of Texas, have unquestionably been using obstructionist tactics. With equal lack of question, such tactics are justified. The Southern senators don't like to filibuster any better than the rest of the Senate like to sit and listen, but they have a right to use every weapon at their command to defeat a bill which is an invasion of state's rights, and will inevitably fail in its purpose.

It has been said that the Southern bloc's lynch law fight is preventing Congress from acting on problems dealing with the current business recession. Rather let the blame for this delay be placed on those who have pushed this sectional measure to the fore at a time when national problems re-

If Congress learned anything from the Prohibition experience, it should realize that social evils can not be corrected without a backing of public opinion. Laws will not stop lynching. Public opinion will.

Let the Federal government tend to its duties and regulate national matters. The South will keep its own house in order.

Building In 1937 Best For 6 Years

Prospects for 1938 Considered Good in Some Localities

Reporting the nation's 1937 building operations were the best in six years despite a late sharp curtailment, the National Association of Building Trades Employers said today the industry's 1938 prospects were optimistic in some localities.

Some cities expect building in 1938 to be on even larger proportions than in 1937, Secretary E. M. Craig said. Others are not as optimistic.

Craig said building authorities do not expect any rental boosts this spring due to contraction of general business. Although some cities complain of housing shortages, he said, the number of workers added to jobless ranks the last few months is again creating a doubling-up situation in their localities which has lessened demand for housing.

The association's semi-annual survey of 41 cities by Robert D. Steele showed 1938 construction volume involved 236,264 permits with a valuation of \$775,460,237,

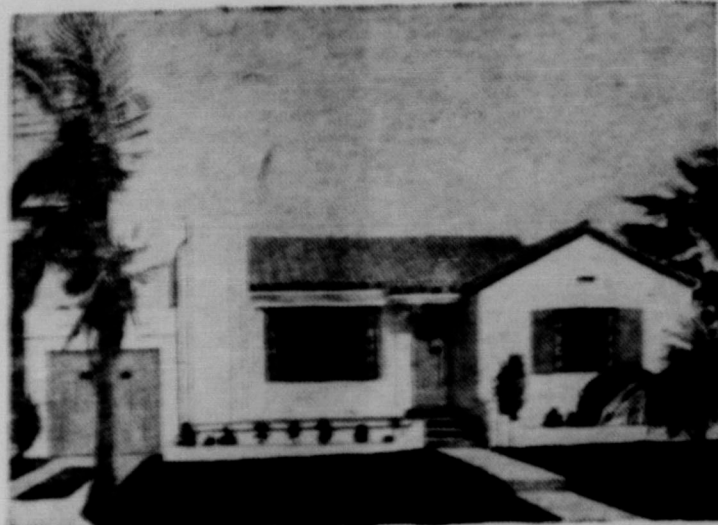
compared with 222,689 permits at \$554,086,362 in 1936. Construction totals for 44 states aggregated close to \$3,500,000,000, Steele said compared with \$2,911,287,000 in 1936 and \$1,373,098,235 in 1935.

Steele said that among the cities Boston reported the sharpest upturn in building permit valuation with an increase of 81 per cent. Gains elsewhere included 51 per cent at Chicago, 47 per cent at Philadelphia and 44 per cent at New York, Washington, Cincinnati, Milwaukee, Memphis, Dallas, St. Louis, St. Paul, Fort Worth, Louisville, Nashville, Kansas City, Peoria, Ill., Scranton, Pa., and Toledo had decreases in valuation he said.

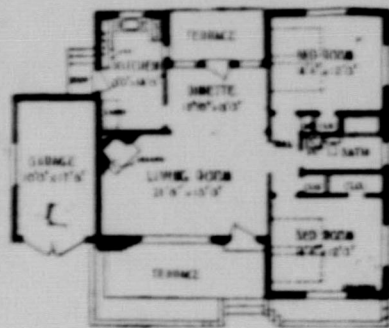
Craig said cities with population of 150,000 or less and not adjacent to larger cities anticipate a substantial number of new \$4,000 to \$6,000 homes this spring because of reasonable building costs.

In the 1920-29 decade, he said, the average annual number of family residential units constructed was 477,000. In the seven years 1930-36, the average annual number dropped to 165,300. Craig said that the nation, to be abreast of the times, should have an annual turnover of 475,000 to 500,000 new homes.

'37 BUILDING DECLINES

Austin, Feb. 2 — Reports furnished the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research by chambers of commerce throughout the State indicate total building permits of \$5,406,156 in 34 cities during December, up 39 per cent over November but down 16.6 per cent from December, 1936. Aggregate permits for the entire year in these cities were \$62,218,411, a decline of .3 per cent from 1936.
