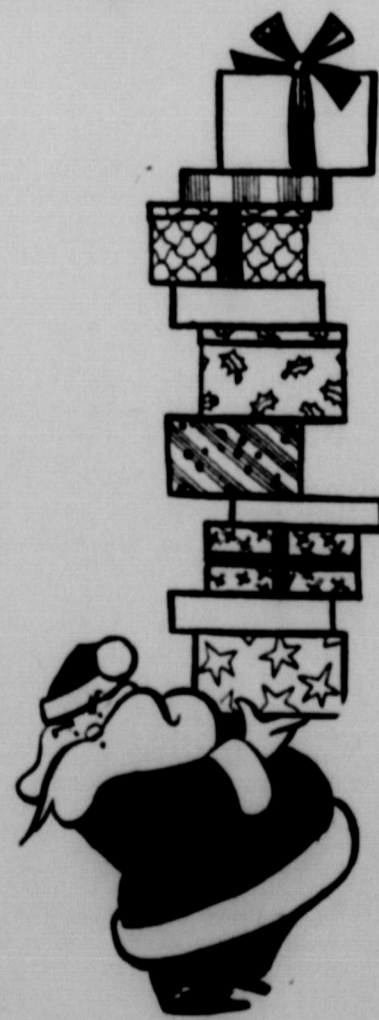

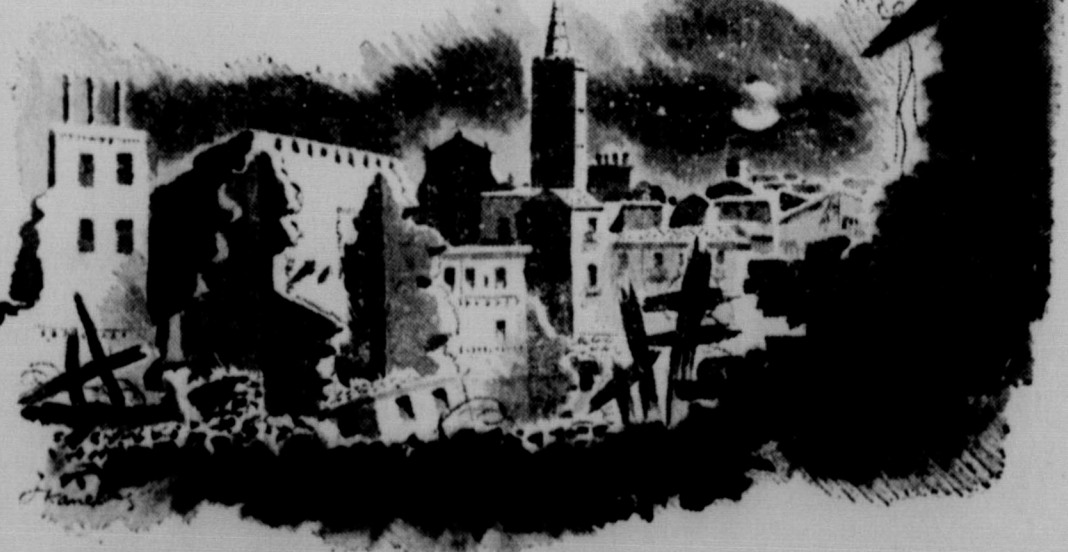


Our New Plant, Built in 1941
