

Hospital without head man 'till June 1

Muleshoe Area Medical Center will function without an interim hospital administrator May 17 through June 1.

The Muleshoe Area Hospital District Board of Directors Thursday accepted the resignation of MAMC hospital administrator Richard Murphy, effective May 17.

Murphy has accepted an administrative position at a 60-bed hospital in El Campo near Houston.

An interim hospital administrator is expected to be appointed by Methodist Hospital by June 1 to serve while applications are being taken for the position of MAMC hospital administrator.

Meanwhile, Ray Mason with Methodist Regional Services will be available to the hospital for assistance by phone, the hospital's administrative secretary Sharon Plott said.

In personnel matters, the contract of Dr. Bob Johnson, surgeon was continued for one year; Cynthia Jo Coberley of

Muleshoe Lions roar no more

The Lions Club will roar no more in Muleshoe.

The 54-year-old Muleshoe Lions Club officially disbanded April 10 after deciding the club could not meet its monthly expenses.

The Lions Club's former president, Stacey Conner, said that in order to stay solvent, the club needed to "double its membership or double its dues."

Expenses included \$100 a month to rent the Bailey County Coliseum meeting room weekly, plus meal expense and the cook's fee, as well as dues to the international and district Lions Clubs.

Lack of local restaurant facilities conducive to organization meetings also played a part, Conner said.

Activities of the Lions Club this year included its annual Pheasant Hunt Breakfast and bringing the Culpepper & Merriweather Circus to town.

Some of the Lions' on-going projects will be continued by the Muleshoe Rotary Club, according Conner, who took office as Lions Club president in July.

Cattlemen hoping to survive An inch of drought, brutal market rain means

Cattlemen face more tough times ahead according to an industry spokesman. Increased feed prices, the large number of cattle imported form Mexico in 1995, and the

"I hope we can survive and continue to make a living in this industry we love. It will be tough," President Chaunce O. Thompson Jr. told members of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association in March.

"The largest issue of the year has been cattle prices," said Thompson. He said the factors contributing to the continuing depressed cattle market have been an increase in the size of the cow herd, increased beef production per animal, number of cattle imported form Mexico in 1995, and the drought striking Texas and Oklahoma. He said packer concentration is another continuing problem.

Thompson challenged producers to work towards improving the quality and consistency of beef. "The only way we're going to get there, I think, is to have enough pride in individual cow herds to bring them around to the kind that will produce the desired product. We've got a lot to learn," he said.

County water levels dip

Bailey County ground water levels declined an average of 1.53 feet in 1995 in 103 privately-owned wells in the observation well network maintained by the High Plains Underground Water Constion District No. 1 in its 539,625 acre service area within the county. The represents a decrease of 123,843 arcefeet of water in storage in the Ogallala Aquifer last year in Bailey County.

Ground water levels within Bailey County declined an average of 0.60 of a foot annually during the 10-year period from 1986 to 1996. An average annual decline of 0.82 of a foot was recorded during the five-year period from 1991 to 1996.

Ground water levels in the Ogallala Aquifer with the 6.7 million acre High Plains Water District service area had an average decline of 1.91 feet form January 1995 to January 1996. The decline was 0.24 of a foot less than the 2.15 feet decline recorded for 1994.

For starters, about \$91

million in market value for corn, wheat, milo and cotton grown on 15 southern Panhandle and northern South Plains counties, says the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District.

Those dollar numbers resulted from research accumulated by HPUWCD and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, which looked at a 3-5 year average rainfall.

For every inch of rainfall, an acre of corn land receives more than 27,000 gallons of water. With each inch, the value of corn increases by \$26.50 per acre, a yield increase of 700 pounds (about 12 bu.).

That inch of rain will generate an extra 10 bu. of wheat, or \$25 per acre. Milo production increases by \$16.87, or 500 pounds. And cotton yield goes up by 100 pounds, or \$37.50.

The buck doesn't stop there. Using common multiplier effects, the overall economic impact of 1 in. of rain translates to \$318 million for the region.

Of course, the trick, now, is to get the rain.



In other business, the hospital board approved a FirstCare Health Maintenance Organization (HMO) contract through the end of December, with a slight rate increase.


HMO's involve a designated primary care physician for each

I'm happy to wear the Shelburne name, but I'm pretty sure a little real research would turn up a horse thief or two.



Muleshoe Schools to give Tracking the TAAS Test **TAAS Test April 30-May 3**

TAAS has become a part of the vocabulary of every school in Texas. (TAAS stands for Texas Assessment of Academic Skills.)

Teachers, principals and students talk about it a lot. Some students see it as a hard test that they have to do ... and pass, while others see it as a challenge.

Some teachers, on the other hand, feel that it takes teaching time to work on TAAS; others feel that it certainly guides the way they teach.

Parents hear about the test and want their children to pass it for many different reasons. No one likes to fail a test.

Without discussing the pros and cons of the test, here are a few facts to let you know about this famous TAAS test.

Muleshoe will be giving its

Spring version to all eligible students, in grades 3 through 8 and 12 on April 30, May 1, 2 and 3.

Students in grade 12 who have not previously taken or passed all three portions of the test will retest in math and reading and writing.

Grades 3 through 8 will test in math and reading, with 8th grade also testing in social studies and science.

The test is "Exit Level" when grades 10, 11 and 12 take it, and the student must pass all parts to receive a Texas high school diploma.

In May, the test gets to be very important to a senior who hasn't passed all parts. It is important, too, for the other grade levels, because each school gets a report card form the State of Texas on how well

One high school official told me that reporting this incident would be negative journalism; that this is a small town.


Ignorance is not the answer.

"Well rehearsed and performed. A spirited performance," according to Fred Pankratz of Canadian.


Mike Watts of Odessa said, "Keep working hard and listen to your directors. It is obvious you are well taught and you care about what you do." Several judges praised




Four of the five Lady Mule golfers are underclassman.
