COLLEGE STATION. — With Gen. Ike Eisenhower as honor guest at ceremonies here, memorial services for the seven hundred A. & M. men who died in military service in World Wars I and II will be held around the world on Easter morning, April 21, in observance of the forty-fourth traditional Aggie Muster held on the anniversary of the battle of San Jacinto each year since 1903.

Keystone in the world-wide services will be the huge memorial Muster to be held at Kyle Field as a climax of the Victory Homecoming to be staged on the campus April 19, 20, 21. A. & M. men not present for the campus Homecoming will be meeting in similar services throughout the length and breadth of the United States and at scores of overseas points.

April 21 this year falls on Easter Sunday, a time of deep religious significance to men of all faiths. On that day it is fitting that the heroic sacrifices of the war dead be commemorated. On that day it is fitting that thanks be offered to God for the contribution of those war dead, and that prayers be said for the comfort of their families and friends.

## Club Observes Centennial of Texas Statehood

### Story of Annexation Struggle Told by Judge Smith

Texas' Centennial of Statehood, being observed throughout the state during the month of February, was fittingly observed by the Ozona Rotary Club at its luncheon Tuesday of this week when Judge Houston Smith recounted for members the interesting story of the ten-year struggle for annexation which followed the battle of San Jacinto and freedom from Mexican domination.

International turmoil was engendered by the forces which were struggling for and against annexation, the speaker said, and political parties were wrecked in the United States, presidential candidates were defeated and elected on the basis of the annexation issue, and finally the Mexican war resulted from the annexation of Texas to the United States.

There was strong sentiment both in Texas and in the United States for Texas to become a part of the American Union after Texas had won her independence, Judge Smith said. But fear of war with Mexico and, later, injection of the slave issue were deterrents to immediate action. The issue became involved with England and France casting eager eyes on the new republic as a possible trade outlet, and this fact finally was used by wily Sam Houston to force agreement of the American Congress to approve annexation, Judge Smith pointed out.

Congressional action accepting Texas into the union was taken in December of 1845, but ceremonies held at the capital in Austin on February 19, 1846, in which the Texas flag was hauled down and the stars and stripes raised and in which President Anson Jones of the Republic of Texas handed over authority to the newly elected Governor Henderson of the State of Texas is observed as the true centennial of Texas statehood.

## Ships of Inactive Fleet Protected by New Plastic Paint

ORANGE, Texas.—An unusual new protective coating for the "outer skin" of ships of the inactive fleet which will be berthed here will kill barnacles or any other life that attempts to cling to the vessel, and is good for five years in salt water and 15 years in fresh water, the Navy disclosed today.

This application will be applied to the "ships in mothballs" of the Sixteenth Fleet, and ships out of commission can be made ready for sea within 30 days.

The Navy also disclosed that one or more ships in each berthing unit will be left in commission, with a skeleton crew aboard, for maintenance of the other ships in the unit. The Reserve ships left in commission can be returned to active service in 10 days.

The poisonous hot plastic paint will be applied to all ships of the inactive fleet for the protection of the hull. The topside equipment will consist of weaving of a moisture proof web by spray gun. Entire gun mounts are covered by means of these webs, giving a weird appearance to the inactivated ships. The vessels will be grouped by types and moored to piers so that greater protection can be provided at minimum cost.

## Million Pounds CCC-Owned Wool To New Storage

### Ozona Firm Ships Lot to Make Way for Spring Clip

Ozona Wool & Mohair Co. is engaged in the task of shipping approximately 1,150,000 pounds of Commodity Credit Corporation owned wools in storage here to new storage at Strawn, Tex., Melvin Brown, manager, said this week. The wool is being moved by trucks the entire distance.

The entire accumulation of government-owned wools in storage here, appraised and paid for under the government's wool purchase program, is being shipped to warehouses of the Western Wool & Mohair Co. at Strawn under an arrangement completed between the two firms. Shipment of the wool from the local warehouse will make room for the new spring clip soon to come from the backs of Crockett county flocks, the local warehouse manager said.

## Red Cross Fund Drive Postponed To Next Week

### Campaign Delayed Because of Holiday Week-End

Because of the holiday week-end here and the San Angelo rodeo and stock show the end of this week, the annual Red Cross Fund drive, scheduled to begin March 1, will be postponed to near the end of next week. Lee Wilson, chairman of the Ozona Chapter, American Red Cross, announced this week.

Decision to delay the drive until next week was reached after a conference of the chapter chairman and Ira Carson, fund drive chairman, and Bill Cooper, vice chairman of the drive. It was expected that many Ozonans will be out of town the end of this week and campaign workers would be handicapped in soliciting persons on their lists. Forest Service, Houston; R. A. Manire, Vocational Agriculture, Austin; J. E. McDonald, State Department of Agriculture, Austin; and W. E. White, Texas Forest Service, College Station. Mr. Vance will be chairman and Mr. Watson secretary.

In directing the creation of the group, Secretary of Agriculture Clinton P. Anderson said that its function and responsibility would include helping the agencies of the Department to coordinate their respective activities.

The rails are the same and trains still plunge swiftly towards the west, like thundering vehicles on a highway into the past.

Although they may possess great riches, they have lost the ability and satisfaction of spending, which renders their possessions as dust on books which are never opened.

About the time I find a fear that is producing a concealing shadow, the sun goes behind a cloud or it is night and the next day I must find a new one to keep me from being content.

Stray clouds were licking the crimson sunset with long tongues the evening we rode to the shabby, unpainted house where the tenant farmer lived. My friend dismounted and knocked at the door. A yellow hound approached and nosed his pants leg while he waited. A thin, unshaven man opened the door and there was conversation. They went back in to the house and after a time he returned with his grimy hat. We went to the cow lot and looked at the brindled cow pulling dry blades from stalks of bright fodder. My friend nodded his head, took a wallet from his pocket and counted out the bills, then loosened the rope from his saddle. We led the protesting cow out through the wire gate to the road. Her calf was bawling and a woman was standing in the open doorway with a calico apron pressed to her eyes.

Pleasure often goes to the same doors where opportunity knocked in vain, to enter with private keys.

Sipping his clabbered dreams and breathing the stench of his baseless lies, the squint-eyed man rolls crude cigarettes and holds them in his mouth until the brown

stain seeps through. The broken threads of a wasted life are in his hair; ambition has left no trace on the crude fabric of his soul. His interests are the mistakes of others, like vultures waiting in high branches and watching a road were many travel.

Future generations are waiting in the sacred soil of farms for their curtain calls on the stage of life. They remain patient beneath the winter snows, the darkest nights, the spell of molten moonlight; they have no fear of storms and the screaming wind. Their loves, heartaches and dreams sleep with them to mix in the strange chemistry which destiny will stir when they walk from the wings of clay. The rains of forgotten centuries will be returned as tears.

**OPA Warns Against Bogus Sale of Grain Sorghums for Seed**

Due to the present scarcity of grain, there is an increasing tendency to sell grain sorghums as seed for planting purposes in an attempt to evade OPA regulations. Clifton George, Jr., price executive of the San Antonio district office

of Price Administration, declared.

"Much of the grain sorghums being sold for seed, which is exempt from price control when actually used for this purpose, is going to areas which do not plant this grain," George said. "The Office of Price Administration has information that many purchasers of these grains have no intentions of using them for seed but are using them for manufacturing purposes, such as feeds or beverages."

**8th Service Command Quota Is Doubled**

Lt. Col. Robert L. Hardy, commanding officer of the West Texas Recruiting District was in San Angelo on a routine tour of inspection on hte 21st and 22nd of this month.

"Local response to the recruiting campaign has been excellent," Col. Hardy said.

The Eighth Service Command has met its quota of 70,000 and the quota now is doubled, making a total of 140,000 men that the command must get before June 30th.

**Good Enlistment Record Achieved In Army Recruiting Drive**

Captain Mundell, commanding officer of the Army Recruiting Station in San Angelo, declared

that "more men have signed up in the last three and a half months than were in the entire Regular Army when Pearl Harbor was attacked on December 7, 1941, when the Army was at its highest peacetime total."

New theatres heretofore not announced include the West Pacific, India-Burma, China, Antilles Department, South Atlantic, Newfoundland, Bermuda Base Command, Iceland and Greenland.

Of interest to men with families, said Capt. Mundell, is the reminder that family allowances are being continued for the duration of the man's enlistment for those men who enlist prior to October 6, 1946, only.
