Council Adopts Constitution And By-Laws at Meet

Community Cooperation for Betterment Object of Group

A constitution and by-laws for Crockett county's Community Council were adopted at the Monday evening meeting of the Council held in the Commissioners' room at the courthouse.

Under objects of the Council, the constitution sets out the purpose for which the Council was formed at a meeting of citizens a few months ago. "The objects of the organization shall be community cooperation for the betterment and progress of Crockett county," the documents set out. "The Council represents the community as a whole and has as its duty the promotion and execution of projects needed and wanted by the citizens of Crockett county."

The constitution provides further that "the membership of the Council shall consist of thirteen members; six women and seven men, who shall be elected by popular vote of Crockett county citizens."

Elections shall be held in April of each year on the same day as school board elections, but at different polling places," the constitution provides. As to the tenure of office of members of the Council, the following provision made:

"Members shall serve two years except that for the first group of Council members one-year and one-year terms shall be determined by lot, six drawn for one-year terms and seven for two-year terms. Vacancies shall be filled by appointment of new members by the president."

Officers of the Council are elected by the group from among their own number, the constitution provides, officers including president, vice president, recording secretary, corresponding secretary and a publicity chairman. These officers to be elected at the first meeting of the Council after the Spring election.

The document provides for regular meetings of the Council on the first and third Monday evenings of each month, the sessions to be open to the public. Special meetings may be called by the president as occasion demands. A majority of the Council membership, seven—shall constitute a quorum. The constitution provides that it may be amended at any regular meeting provided notice of such amendment has been given in writing at a previous meeting. The by-laws of the organization specify the duties of the various officers and provide for the appointment of necessary committees.

Hot Matches Feature Sunday Roping Here

Several hot matched ropings, together with some lively jack-pot events, featured last Sunday's afternoon rodeo program staged by the Ozona Roping Club at the fair grounds.

Phillip Schneemann turned in the afternoon's fastest time, an admirable 10.6 seconds on one calf in a match in which he defeated Wee Smith, four calves each. Phillip's time was one of the best registered in these parts this season.

Kay Black defeated Tom Powers in a four-calf match and then took a licking at the hands of P. C. Turner in another match.

The roping club is staging jack-pot and matched roping events each Sunday afternoon at the fair grounds. No admission charge is made but a free will offering is taken to help pay for the upkeep of the calves.

Locals Nick Iraan Hurlers for 12 to Win Third in Row

Manager Tex Stuart took his hard-hitting Ozona baseball squad to Iraan Sunday afternoon and came up with the team's third straight win since organization, this time a 10-2 victory over the Iraan town team.

Dennis Maxwell and Lefty Shelton took over the hurling chore for the Ozonans, Maxwell going the first four innings and Shelton the last five. Maxwell allowed three hits and one run and struck out three batters in his four frames while Shelton allowed the same number of hits and runs and struck out eight.

Nat Read, one of Ozona High School's most promising in the way of diamond material, along with four or five other fine prospects for Coach Sikes' nine next Spring, was again a potent factor with the stick for the locals. Not at all baffled by the old timer's curves, Nat rapped out two safe hits in last Sunday's go on the Iraan diamond. Bill Hannah also accounted for two hits in the afternoon. Evidence that the Ozona fielders are playing it tighter as they progress in experience is apparent in the record of only two errors for the locals, while Iraan fielders bobbled four times.

Manager Stuart will take his team to Eldorado next Sunday afternoon for the first game of the season with that crew. The game will start at 3 o'clock. The next two Sundays will see the local team in action on the home diamond, Iraan to play here June 16 and Eldorado the following Sunday, June 23.

A game has been matched with the highly touted Alpine semi-pro team to be played in Alpine Sunday, July 7, Stuart announced this week. No return game on the local diamond has been arranged with the Alpine team as yet, but one may be arranged later in the season.

Mass Meet Called July 1 To Discuss Community Center

Council to Submit Plan to People; Park Landscape Planned

A mass meeting of citizens of Ozona has been called by the Community Council for Monday evening, July 1, for the purpose of discussing the proposed construction of a community center on property of the Crockett County Water Control District atop water works hill.

Decision to call a town meeting was reached by the Council members in regular meeting at the courthouse Monday night. The Council recently launched its plan for a community center on water works hill in a published letter to the people of Ozona, in which the Council's idea for a pavilion-type community house on the hill for use of the community for public gatherings of all kinds was outlined.

The Council hopes to have ready by the July 1 meeting an architect's sketch of the proposed community center and if possible an estimate of the probable cost.

Taking cognizance of the present difficulties in building, the Council in its announcement of the mass meeting, pointed out that even though it may be some time before any construction work can be undertaken, preliminary planning can be done now and the community will be in a position to go ahead with the project when materials and labor again become available, provided people of the community favor such an improvement.

In discussing the community center project, members of the Council reported favorable reaction among people of the town to the idea. Members reported they had heard no opposition to the project and had heard many favorable comments. The Council proposed that the Center be financed by public subscriptions and is ready to receive any contributions which citizens wish to place in a fund to be held in the Ozona National Bank.

Another project to be undertaken by the Council is the landscaping of the county park in the downtown area. The County Commissioners have planned to add new dirt to the park to level the ground and members of the Council hope to work out a plan whereby a sprinkler system can be installed in the park. St. Augustine grass planted and the entire plot landscaped and beautified. It is hoped that preliminary work on this project can be done this summer and the replanting done next fall and winter.

265,000 Pounds Of Spring Wool Appraised Here

Average Price of Eight Months Clips 42 3/4 Cents Net

Appraisers for the Commodity Credit Corporation appraised a total of about 265,000 pounds of Spring wool at the Ozona Wool & Mohair Co. warehouse Thursday, according to Melvin Brown, manager.

This is the second local appraisal for the season and price averages were about the same as the first appraisal a few weeks ago. The eight-months wool brought an average return of around 42 3/4 cents a pound net to the grower, with the highest net price at 46.10 cents a pound net.

The new appraisal put the local warehouse to about the half-way mark in valuing its Spring clip. Mr. Brown said, approximately 600,000 pounds remaining yet to be appraised.

Hiway Department Considers Plan for Oil Field Road

County Judge Houston Smith and members of the Crockett County Commissioners Court, with the county judge and commissioners of Reagan County, appeared before the Texas Highway Commission in Austin Monday to make application to the Commission for payment of a 30-mile stretch of highway through the Todd and Powell oil fields in this county under the Federal government's farm-to-market post-war highway construction program.

The federal government will spend approximately \$75 millions in Texas under the farm-to-market plan and the federal grant, with state funds, will be distributed over the state by districts for construction of lateral roads.

Crockett and Reagan counties collaborated on the plan to place the application of the two counties on file with the State Highway Department for the paved road which is proposed over a route from a point on Highway 290 about 15 miles west of Ozona north up Pike's Peak draw to the Todd field and north to Midway lane, thence west two miles and then north to the town of Big Lake in Reagan county. From the point on highway 290 where the proposed road intersects to Big Lake will be a distance of approximately 30 miles of road construction.

Beauford Jester, a member of the Texas Railroad Commission, appeared before the Commission on behalf of the Crockett and Reagan delegations and asked favorable consideration of the application because of the service the new road would provide for the oil fields in this county. Mr. Jester told the Commission that the Crockett county fields are among the greatest potential producers in the state and are being developed in an orderly way by big oil companies and thus are destined to be important producers for many years to come.

The Texas Highway Commission, which will direct the federal farm-to-market road building projects, to be spread over the next five years, took the application under advisement.

Veterans Claims Examiner To Be Here Tuesday Afternoon

Servicemen's Readjustment Allowances Claims from veterans are running heavy in the Ozona area, according to T. R. Kemp, Junior Claims Examiner, for the Texas Unemployment Compensation Commission.

Mr. Kemp will be at the Courthouse here from 1:00 p.m. to 2:00 p.m., Tuesday, June 11, he announced this week.

In addition to veteran affairs, Mr. Kemp will conduct the regular business of the Unemployment Compensation Commission while in town.

As agent for Veterans Administration, the Unemployment Compensation Commission accepts readjustment allowance applications from unemployed ex-servicemen, as well as from veterans whose earnings from self-employment are less than \$100 a month. The \$20-a-week allowances may be drawn by the veterans any time up to two years after the official termination of the war, or two years after the individual get out of the service, whichever ever is the later.

Superior Rating Given Schools in Inspection Report

Shop Work, Vocational Subjects Recommended in LA School

In a list of commendations, Ozona's public school system was given a superior rating in a report of a district supervisor to the State Department of Education after a visit to the local schools just before the recent closing of schools for the term.

Claude B. Mullins, deputy State Superintendent for District 14, which includes this county, made the local inspection on behalf of the State Department of Education.

"The work of classifying and accrediting the public schools of Texas is under the direction of the State Committee composed of 21 members representing the elementary and secondary schools" and colleges of the state," the report, made to the superintendent and the board president, explains. "This committee, by establishing educational standards, determines the conditions upon which high schools are classified and accredited and is interested in encouraging schools to attain these standards and in certifying those that have attained them so as to facilitate the transfer of students to any other school or college."

The report on the local school included only one recommendation for improvement, the addition of shop work and vocational subjects in the Latin-American school.

Ozona schools were commended on nine counts by the supervisor: 1. Evidence of real effort by school administrators and school board to care for teacher housing; 2. Excellent guidance program; 3. Library improved in Latin-American school; 4. Excellent scholastic record made by high school graduates; 5. Shop work reinstated; 6. Superior student activity program; 7. Athletic program expanded — new athletic field; 8. Preparations for school band next year; and 9. Buildings and plant maintenance superior.

Judge Randolph Grants Four Divorces In Brief Sitting

Judge J. B. Randolph of Fort Stockton finished the work of the April term of 112th district court in a brief sitting here Monday and adjourned for the term.

Four divorce cases were heard by the court and divorces granted, cleaning the docket of civil cases ready for trial.

Members of the petit jury for the term had previously been summoned to appear this week, but jury cases pending before the court were postponed until the fall term and the jury dismissed.

Suspected Case Of Polio Here Being Observed

Ray Robison, 5, Under Observation in San Angelo Hospital

While a five-year-old Ozona child, Ray Robison, son of Mr. and Mrs. Miller Robison, is under observation in a San Angelo hospital while tests are being made to determine whether or not his illness is poliomyelitis, safety measures are being adopted by local health authorities in an effort to prevent further spread of the disease in the event the suspected case proves positive.

Dr. H. B. Tandy, county health officer, has ordered closing of the city swimming pool and the banning of all gatherings of persons under 18 years of age until it is definitely determined whether or not the child is suffering from the dread malady.

Under the health officer's direction, too, a new spray coating of DDT insecticide was being applied to every spot in the city which might harbor insects of any kind.

"All precautionary measures recommended by the State Health Department in case of an outbreak of the disease are being carried out as nearly as possible," Dr. Tandy said. "The case has not been diagnosed as yet pending certain tests made by state health officials and until a report is made on such tests, no definite diagnosis can be made. In the meantime, we have adopted the safety measures recommended by the State Health Department in an effort to do everything possible to prevent any further outbreak."

The Health Department has recommended that all general health measures be adopted in every community, that all possible breeding places of flies and mosquitoes be eliminated. Safe water supplies, adequate sewage disposal, enforcement of livestock laws, health inspection of all public eating places, sanitary milk sources, and reducing personal contacts among youths to a minimum are among the state health officer's recommendations. All raw foods, fruits and vegetables, should be thoroughly washed before serving and over-exertion in children should be avoided, health authorities say.

Reports from the Robison child's bedside yesterday were that his condition was satisfactory. He was running only a moderate temperature and examination indicated that his condition was not serious at present. A slight paralysis of a portion on one side of the child's face was noted, but otherwise no extreme symptoms appeared.

Mother of Alvin Scheel Dies in New Braunsfel Sunday

Mrs. Louis Scheel, 69, mother of Alvin Scheel, employed here for several years at the Texas-New Mexico Pipeline Co. station west of Ozona, died at 6:45 o'clock Sunday evening at her home in New Braunsfel after an illness of several years.

Mr. and Mrs. Alvin Scheel were notified of his mother's critical illness Sunday and were at her bedside when death came. Funeral services were conducted from the New Braunsfel funeral home at 3:30 o'clock Tuesday afternoon, burial following in the New Braunsfel cemetery.

Surviving are the husband and six children, four daughters, Mrs. Ben A. Werner of San Antonio, Mrs. Herman Albrecht of New Braunsfel, Mrs. Arthur Neuse of Seguin; and Mrs. Clarence Rhinlander of New Braunsfel, and two sons, Alvin Scheel of Ozona and Ervin Scheel of San Antonio. Six grandchildren also survive.

Salary Increases Seen As Only Solution To Teacher Problem

The Texas State Teachers Association has just completed a survey among city and county school superintendents to determine the condition of the teacher personnel in Texas. Replies were received from 945 superintendents representing 36,057 teaching positions or about 80 per cent of the total in Texas. Since the opening of school in September, 3,633 teachers have resigned their positions which represents about 10 per cent of the total. Of the teachers included in the survey, 5,546 were listed with sub-standard qualifications which represents approximately 15 per cent of the total.

Local districts are exerting every effort possible to keep teachers in the classrooms but many superintendents report that it appears impossible to fill all of their positions this coming year because of the low salaries paid and the

number of resignations which are anticipated at the close of the current school year. Practically all of the cities in Texas report resignations averaging 13 per cent. Many local school districts are voting to increase their tax rate or will increase property valuations in order to secure more revenue for teachers' salaries. 110 independent school districts have voted a tax increase above the rates levied a year ago and 143 report that they plan to hold elections for tax rate increases soon. In 40

counties, one or more county school districts have increased their tax rates and 10 counties report that they plan to hold elections for this purpose soon. It is estimated that 8,500 Texas teachers entered the armed forces through 1945. However, only 127 have returned to teaching.

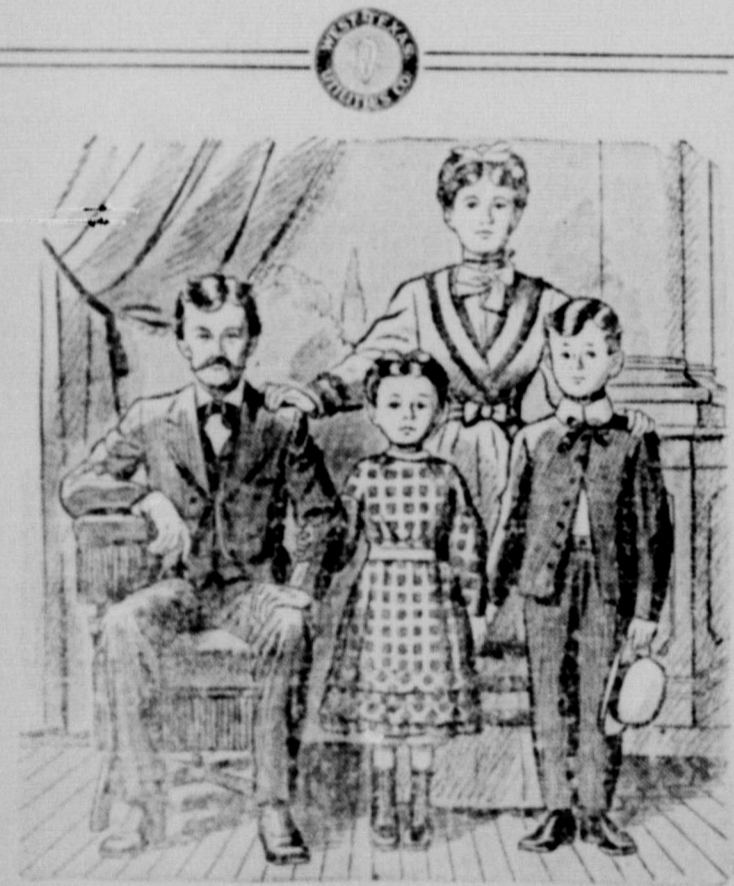
