Moore Exploration To Drill Shallow Test On Hoover

Moore Exploration Co. has filed the first application for a permit to drill in the Shannon field since designation, effective April 1 of that northwestern Crockett area as the Shannon San Andres field. The designation of the Live Oak pool, consisting of Moore's lone producer on the Shannon ranch about 1 1/2 miles southwest of the Shannon San Andres field, has been changed to the Shannon Grayburg field. This well has a current daily allowable of six barrels, pumping.

Moore No. 3 A. C. Hoover in the Shannon Andres field will be 330 feet from the north, 2,310 feet from the west line of section 4-FF-Brooks & Burleson. It is due to start at once and drill 2,500 feet with cable tools.

In the Shannon San Andres field, Sun Oil Co. has eight wells, John I. Moore and P. D. Moore four, John I. Moore three and Moore Exploration Co. and L. H. Armer one each. The wells during April will have daily allowable production of 60 barrels daily, unchanged from March, except from shutdown days. Two of the Sun wells and one of the John I. Moore and P. D. Moore wells flow; all the others in the field are pumpers.

A hearing has been set by the Railroad Commission for May 15 in Austin to determine the most efficient rate of production for wells in the Shannon, Olson and Todd Ellenburger and Todd crinoidal fields in Crockett County, the Barnhart field in Reagan County, the Page field in Schleicher County and the Tankersley field in Irion County.

3 Places To Be Filled In Annual Election Here Saturday

Max Schneemann now serving as president of the district board of school trustees, and whose term in that office expires this Spring, has asked that announcement be made that he is not a candidate for re-election and that he will appreciate the voters choosing another in his place in the trustee election Saturday.

"I believe that I have served long enough and feel that I should be relieved," Mr. Schneemann said. "I have enjoyed working with the board and I am grateful for the cooperation of the people with the board in directing school affairs."

Mr. Schneemann and Ray Piner are the two members of the board whose terms expire this year. In addition to these two places, voters must choose a member for the vacancy now existing on the board created by the resignation last fall of Melvin Brown.

The trustee election will be held in the commissioners court room at the courthouse Saturday. No names of trustee candidates will appear on the ballot and voters will be required to write in the names of candidates they may choose to fill the three vacancies.

Hold-over members of the board include Chas. E. Davidson, Jr., Bill Bissett, Chas. Coates and Ashby McMullan.

Election Sat. Council Work Aired At Cit- izens Meeting

A slate of nominees, three men and three women, for places on the 13-member Crockett County Community Council, to be voted on in an election to be held here next Saturday, was read at the mass meeting of citizens in the high school auditorium Monday afternoon.

Nominees to fill the Council posts are Bill Cooper and Mrs. Ira Carson, for re-election, Dr. H. A. Gustavus, Chas. E. Davidson, Jr., Mrs. R. A. Harrell and Mrs. H. N. Brown. These men and women were nominated by a nominating committee named by the Council and composed of a representative from each of the organized groups of the city, Wayne West of the Rotary Club, Mrs. Arthur Phillips from the Junior Woman's Club, Mrs. L. B. Cox, Jr., from the Woman's Club Mrs. Jake Young from the P. T. A. and Hubert Baker from the Community Council.

Printed ballots will be available for voters and all adult residents of Ozona and Crockett county are eligible to vote. The election is to be held in the sheriff's office by Mrs. Gertrude Perry, office deputy, the school trustee election to be held the same day in the commissioners room adjoining. Spaces are left on the ballot in which voters may write-in candidates of their own choice should they desire, but in any case, voters are asked to cast their ballot for not more than three men and three women.

Citizens of Ozona heard a report of the Council's activities during the first year of its existence when the group met in the auditorium Monday afternoon in the first citizens meeting since organization of the Council last Spring. Lee Wilson, President, presided and reports were given by committee chairmen from the council on various projects undertaken by the group during the year. Mrs. H. B. Tandy led the group in a few songs to open the session, Mrs. R. A. Harrell accompanying.

Mrs. Joe T. Davidson gave a running account of projects studied by the Council during the year and which have not been accomplished or were abandoned. Mrs. Pleas Childress reported on developments in the hospital building project and Mrs. Ira Carson on the park improvement project.

A report on the proposed paving program was made by Bill Cooper, who quoted a price of \$2.45 per running foot for curb and gutter and two-course paving as the best price he had been able to get to date.

Mrs. S. M. Harvick announced that a drive for funds with which to build a negro church would start Tuesday morning. Mrs. Ashby McMullan read the Council's constitution and by-laws.

Rev. Horace M. King, pastor of the Methodist Church, expressed appreciation for the work of Council members and urged that a big vote be registered in Saturday's election as an expression of the people's appreciation for the Council and its efforts in the community's behalf.

Sheffield Grocer, Wife Die In Car Crash On Highway

R. E. Rhoads Killed By Bullet In Chest; Boy Uninjured

Ralph E. (Dusty) Rhoads, about 50, manager of the Mike Couch grocery store in Sheffield, and his wife are dead following the crash of their car on the highway about two miles east of Sheffield at about 11 o'clock Wednesday night.

Rhoads' death apparently was caused by a bullet wound through the chest, while his wife is believed to have been killed as a result of injuries suffered when the car collided with a highway bridge. The couple's 6-year-old son, Wayne, who was a passenger in the car, escaped without injury. A pistol was found in the car.

Mrs. Rhoads was thrown clear of the car and was found in the bar ditch some 20 feet from the wrecked car. She lived an hour or more after the accident. The Ratliff Funeral Home ambulance from Ozona went to the scene and brought the bodies back to Ozona. Mrs. Rhoads was still alive when the ambulance arrived but died in the ambulance while preparations were being made to take her to the hospital in Iraan. Dr. Robertson of Iraan, called to the scene, had administered first aid.

Constable Jake Yancy and Justice of the Peace P. A. Campbell of Sheffield investigated the accident and conducted an inquest before the bodies were moved here to the Ratliff Funeral Home. No bullet hole was found in the woman's body, Willard Deaton, local mortician who prepared the bodies, said. She apparently died of internal injuries. No announcement of the inquest verdict was made, according to available information.

The couple's son was taken to Sheffield and is under care of Constable Yancy. Mr. Rhoads' son, Johnny Rhoads, of Sidney is reported on his way here and a brother of the dead man, who resides in Brownwood, was expected here this morning. Mrs. Rhoads has a son, Pvt. James M. Glover, stationed somewhere in the state of Washington. The couple has operated the Couch store in Sheffield the past year or more.

Shell May Drill To 9,000 Feet In University Test

Stanolind 1-GG May Redrill; 1-TT Swabs 44 Bbls. in 29 Hours

Shell Oil Co., Inc., Tuesday filed a supplemental application to continue exploration in its No. 1 University, northeastern Crockett county wildcat, to 9,000 feet. Drilling had reached 8,450 feet in Ellenburger dolomite and lime. The Ellenburger was entered at 8,040 feet, 5,486 feet below sea level.

Location is in the C NW SW 21-39-U, 1 1/2 miles south and half mile west of Stanolind No. 1-GG University first of three tests on the geophysical high to explore the Ellenburger.

Stanolind No. 1-GG University, it was reported, will set a whipstock and attempt directional drilling in an effort to develop production from the Ellenburger that was indicated on drillstem tests at 8,330-55 and at 8,355-85 feet. Sulphur water encountered on the second of these drillstem tests and in cementing in an effort to exclude it the pay also was shut off, it is believed.

The Ellenburger was topped at 7,975 feet, 5,389 feet below sea level, and on a drillstem test from 7,977-8,005 feet in July, 1946, No. 1-GG University sprayed distillate gas being estimated at six million to eight million cubic feet daily. Location is in the C SW SW 12-39-U.

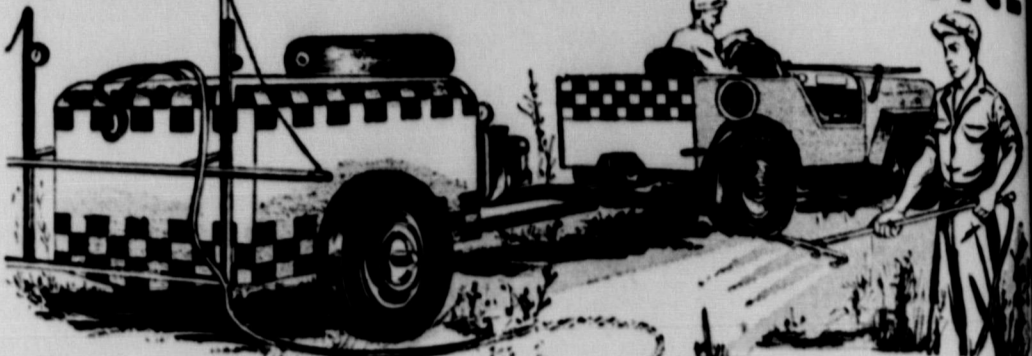

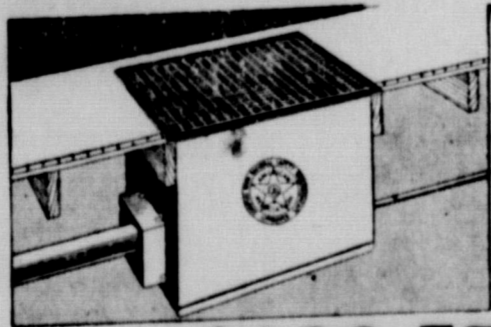

Stanolind No. 1-TT University, C SW NW 12-39-U, half mile north of No. 1-GG University, swabbed 44 barrels of oil in 22 barrels of water in 29 hours. Swabbing continued, to test through casing perforations at 8,044-52 feet, with plugged back depth 8,070 feet. The Ellenburger, found barren, was entered at 8,085 feet, 5,501 feet below sea level. Exploring continued to 9,000 feet in sand, presumably the Hickory of the Cambrian. Amerada No. 1-CTA University, slated 8,500-foot wildcat C SE SW 23-42-U, 4 3-4 miles west and 3-4 mile south of Shell No. 1 University, was drilling at 5,407 feet in lime and shale.

Los Nietos Abandons University Wildcat In Crockett County

Los Nietos Co. of Dallas filed application Monday for a permit to plug and abandon its No. 1 University, north central Crockett County wildcat, at 3,000 feet in lime. No shows of oil were logged but sulphur water was encountered.

The test was drilled in fulfillment of an obligation assumed in purchasing the lease on a block of 1,380.2 acres for \$3,500 cash at the University Lands auction last December. It was located 1,650 from the south, 330 feet from the west line of section 30-7-U, 3 1/2 miles northwest of the World pool and 2 1/2 miles south of the Reagan County line.

Cities Service and others' No. 1-B J. W. Owens, western Crockett County wildcat which flowed oil, gas and water out of control for three days until shut in Saturday night, March 22, continued fishing, it was reported unofficially. Drillcollars and bit were left in the hole, reported 5,804 feet deep when the drillpipe was pulled.
