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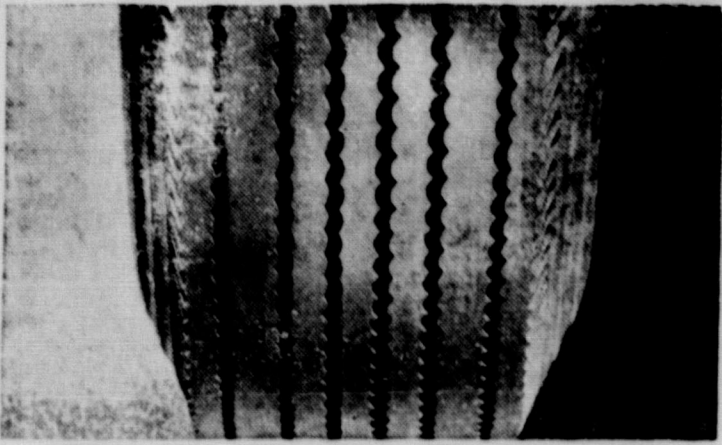
**Patton-Saunders Ceremony Read In Memphis, Tenn., June 8**

Certificate of Title  
Now Required On All

**HOUSE TRAILERS**

Owners of House Trailers are advised that it is now necessary to secure a Certificate of Title on these vehicles the same as for motor vehicles. Under H. B. No. 286 recently passed by the Legislature the term "House Trailer" means a vehicle without automotive power designed for human habitation and for carrying persons and property upon its own structure and for being drawn by a motor vehicle.

The same type of Title will be issued on House Trailers as is now issued on motor vehicles except that the words "House Trailer" will appear under the Title number.

The 1 percent tax, collected on motor vehicles, will not be collected on House Trailers.

House Trailers MUST BE REGISTERED at the time application for Title is filed, and House Trailers now registered should apply for Title.

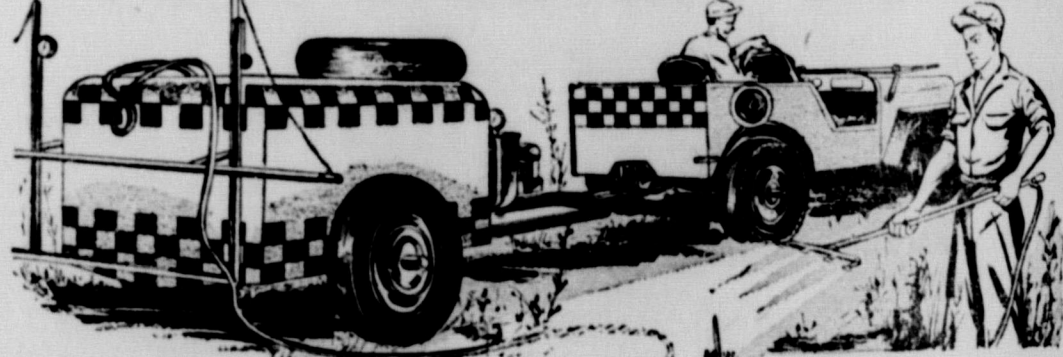
To register and secure Certificate of Title to a House Trailer owner must present manufacturer's certificate or bill of sale, serial number of the trailer, its weight and make. On homemade House Trailers the owner should execute an Affidavit of Ownership for Homemade House Trailers.

If House Trailer does not have serial number an application for assignment of a serial number must be made for which a charge of \$1 will be made.

### On Yard and Garden Improvement County Agent

ailments in your yard and garden can be remedied by application of some good commercial insecticides rather than spraying.

our tree is in a vigorous, growing condition, it has a chance to overcome any insect injury. For instance, a tick beetle will not attack a tree because the flow of sap destroys the eggs. In trees that show a rosette, the back of the terminal are not suffering an insect but a deficiency of zinc. can be remedied by applying sulphate to the feeder roots. copperas will help also.

Thrip and other insects on roses can be controlled by applying 2 pounds of 50 percent DDT to 100 gallons of water.

Try applying 100 pounds of ammonium nitrate to your lawn and also work into soil around shade trees.

There are many useful bulletins on gardens and ornamental plants in the county agent's office—all free. The agent has available information that the general public does not have at hand through the Extension Service and will be glad for the people of this county to make use of his services.

The Extension Service with its trained personnel is always standing by to give the latest information to agents for assistance to the people. If you have any problems the agent will be glad to assist you in getting the desired information. For those ladies who are plan-

ning to can vegetables from the garden, we have canning bulletins which will be of help.

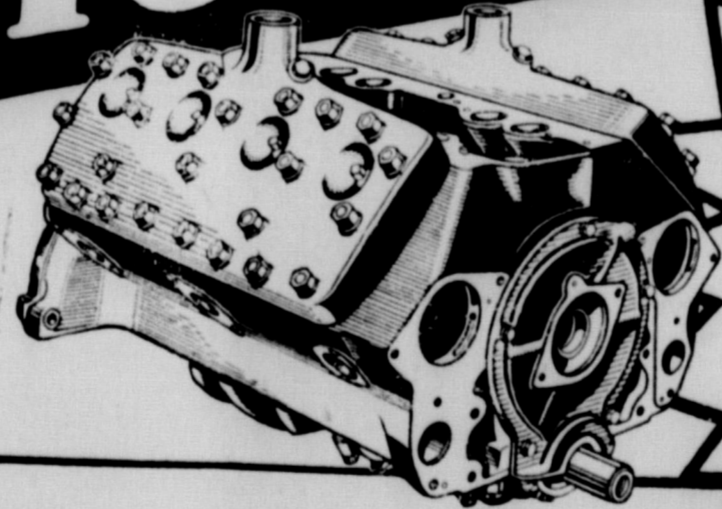

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**BOYCE HOUSE "GIVE YOU TEXAS"**  
 Nothing which has been touched upon in this column in months has attracted as much comment as the recent criticism of the incident in Pawtucket, Rhode Island, where a man was arrested and fined for laughing. Nearly all the reaction from our readers has been favorable but several letters were received from Rhode Island, or former Rhode Island, citizens and they took your columnist over the coals. Their letters criticized Texas. In other words, the writers denied

that I had the right to criticize their state but they the right to criticize mine.  
 If Texans have faults—and of course we do have—that would be no excuse for the Pawtucket outrage—for that is what it is, an outrage. Our forefathers wrote into the Bill of Rights the assurance of freedom of speech, freedom of press and freedom of worship; they did not provide for freedom of laughter for the reason they never dreamed that anyone would question that right.  
 I have before me a letter from

the mayor of Pawtucket who admits the man was arrested and fined for laughing but the fine was paid back, so that ought to make everything just ducky. The reason it was paid back was because editorial writers and columnists by the scores all over the nation protested. Was the chief of police fired or even reprimanded for making the arrest? West the judge who levied the fine kicked out of office?

When the letters protesting against the criticism made in this column came from men, I replied by mailing them a timetable showing the trains that leave Texas, northbound.

Those who don't like Texas ought to go back to the place they do like, then both they and we will be happy.

**Public Safety Dept. To Recruit 30 New License Examiners**

AUSTIN. — The Texas Department of Public Safety is undertaking a "mass manhunt," Director Homer Garrison said today.

Objects of the search are 30 young Texas men who, come September 1, will be recruited as Driver License Examiners. Ten will fill existing vacancies and 20 will be additional personnel authorized by the recent Legislature.

"These are career service jobs," Garrison said, emphasizing that both recruitment and promotion in the Department of Public Safety are based strictly on merit.

Salaries range from \$100 a month with room and board during the 4-week training period in Austin to \$208.72 after training and probation have been completed. Examiners work a six day week, receive two weeks annual vacation with pay, and are entitled to benefits under the new State retirement act.

Applicants must have at least a high school education or its equivalent, be not less than 21 nor more than 35 years old, be not less than five feet eight inches in height, weigh not less than two

nor more than three pounds for each inch of height, be in excellent physical condition and have a reputation for character and uprightness of conduct that will stand the intensive investigation that is made of those who are tentatively accepted on the basis of written tests.

Competitive examinations for those positions will be held at various points in Texas "sometime in July," Garrison said. He invited those interested and qualified to write him, at Post Office Box 100 in Austin requesting application forms.
