## Frost Well at Rate of Barrels Hourly

### on Tippet Largest Pro- from Wolfcamp

Gold Byrd and Jack Frost of Oil Corp. No. 1 J. B. Mayberry, J. Homer Tippet, wildcat panhandle of northwest Crockett county, had become the largest producer in the Wolfcamp, basal lime, in West Texas.

452 barrels of 41.5 gravity oil in five hours after treating with 500 barrels of mud acid. Gas-oil ratio 1.1. It was expected the well would be completed without perforating although it was completed on a drillstem test from 6,309-99 feet.

Mayberry-Tippet had naturally only three barrels of oil hourly 25-40 feet. Upon treating with 500 barrels of mud acid, it flowed out load oil of 20 minutes, then to pits to clean itself being turned to tanks.

Production to storage the first 81 barrels of oil, cut 1/2 inch of one per cent basic water. Yield the separator was 73 barrels of clean third hour 80 barrels, the fourth hour 73 barrels, the fifth hour 73 barrels and in the first 40 minutes of the sixth hour 67 barrels. The well then was shutting in.

The well is 660 feet from the east and southeast lines of section 39-31-H&TC, 1 1/2 miles west of the Pecos river. It is southwest of the Crockett field, six miles north of the Yates field in Pecos and 11 miles southeast of the Wolfcamp.

## Three Offsets Due In Area Of Byrd-Frost Strike

### Gulf, Standard Due to Offset; Unleased Ac- reage in Area

Crockett county's latest oil pool opener — D. Harold Byrd and Jack Frost and Gulf Oil Corp. No. 1 J. B. Mayberry - J. Homer Tippet — will require the drilling of two offsets, with a third virtually certain. Locations for none had been announced Saturday.

The discovery in the Wolfcamp basal Permian, which Friday flowed 452 barrels of 41.5 gravity oil in five hours and 40 minutes, a rate of 1,875 barrels daily, meanwhile remained shut in for storage. It began flowing after injecting 500 gallons of acid through casing perforations at 6,325-140 feet.

Gulf will be required to drill an east offset, in the west corner of what roughly is the northeast half of section 40, block 31, H&TC Ry. Co. survey, the discovery being 660 feet from the northeast and southeast lines of section 39.

Standard of Texas holds the lease on the southwest part of section 40, giving it a southeast offset.

A north or northeast offset would be on section 4, mineral classified land. J. Homer Tippet of San Angelo owning half the mineral rights, the state public school fund retaining one-half.

This tract, section 4, comprising 199 acres, is unleased and is widely sought if and when a sale is made, the purchaser is certain to start a test at once.

Other nearby tracts reported to be mineral classified held jointly by Tippet and the state and unleased are section 3 and the west 160 acres of section 2, block JH, northeast of the Byrd-Frost and Gulf well, and section 24, block 36, H&TC Ry. Co. survey, a full section the south corner of which is only 1/2 mile northwest of the pool opener.

Section 40-31-H&TC juts northeast into and divides section 3. The west and smaller part of section 3 adjoins section 4 on the east while the remainder of section 3 farther west adjoins section 2 on the west.

The Byrd-Frost and Gulf producer assured production from the Wolfcamp when it flowed oil on a drillstem test from 6,309-99 feet in August. It was contracted to the Ellenburger, however, and drilled ahead. The Ellenburger topped at 7,694 feet, 5,034 feet below sea level, was found barren and the hole was plugged back after sulphur was encountered on a drillstem test from 7,732-96 feet. Seven-inch casing was cemented at 6,400 feet for perforating.

No. 1 Mayberry-Tippet is 1 1/2 miles northeast of the Pecos river, 5 1/2 miles southwest of the Crockett shallow field, six miles northwest of the Yates field in Pecos county and 11 miles southeast of McCamey.

## Ozona-Sonora Grid Classic Here Saturday

### Lions Will Try To Stumble Unbeaten Bronchos

Ozona's High School Lions will wind up their District 8-B schedule on the Ozona field next Saturday afternoon against the unbeaten, untied Bronchos from Sonora. It will be a crucial battle for both teams — Ozona must win to stay in the running for the district flag and Sonora must win to assure a chance at an undivided championship, and both teams are expected to "shoot the works."

Sonora now stands at the top of the district standings in a tie with unbeaten Menard. Sonora and Menard meet in Sonora Friday night of next week to decide the issue between themselves, while Menard, or both, depending on with on November 21. An Ozona win here next Sunday would give the Lions a chance at a co-championship with either Sonora or Menard, or both, depending on who wins the Sonora-Menard game and the outcome of the Menard-Junction fracas.

The crucial game is slated for a 2:30 kick-off here at Powell field Saturday afternoon. Bands from both schools will parade at 1:30 p.m. through the downtown streets marching to the football field where they are due at 2 o'clock. The bands will assemble at 1:15, the Ozona band in front of the band house and the Sonora band in front of the High School building. They will then march and perform at a distance of about a block between.

The gates at the field will be open all morning for those who wish to park cars at vantage points. Cashiers will be at the gate at 1 o'clock.

Expecting the largest crowd of the present season, local school officials plan to install temporary seats along the sidelines to accommodate the expected overflow crowds.

## Gulf Completes Lancaster Hill Shallow Producer

### Callery Stakes Four Locations in Todd Deep Field

Completion of another Gulf producer in the shallow Lancaster Hill (Grayburg) pool in central west Crockett county, which was discovered by a core test, and applications by F. A. Callery to drill four tests in the Todd Deep field were filed with the railroad Commission in San Angelo Tuesday.

Gulf No. 3-S University in Lancaster Hill pumped 56.58 barrels of 32.6 gravity oil and 57.7 barrels of water in 24 hours, with gas oil ratio 403-1. With elevation 2,699 feet, it topped the pay at 1,718 feet drilled to 1,725 and was shot with 100 quarts of nitrogen. Location is 830 feet from the south, 1,650 feet from the east line of section 15-29-U.

Three of Callery's tests are projected to the Ellenburger on the southeast side of the Todd field, the other will be first scheduled crinoidal test by Callery and associates, in the northeast part.

Callery No. 1-A State-J. S. Todd estate will be 1,980 feet from the south 330 feet from the west line of the east half of section 66-UV-GC&SF, an east offset to Callery No. 6 Todd, an Ellenburger producer. It is due to start Nov. 5 and to drill 6,500 feet with rotary.

Callery No. 2 State-J. S. Todd will be 660 feet from the south, 330 feet from the west line of the east half of section 66-UV-GC&SF, an east offset to Callery No. 7 Todd, an Ellenburger producer. It also is due to start Dec. 15 and to drill 6,500 feet with rotary.

Callery No. 3 State-J. S. Todd will be 3,300 feet from the south, 330 feet from the west line of the east half of section 66-UV-GC&SF, an east offset to Callery No. 7 Todd, an Ellenburger producer. It also is due to start Dec. 15 and to drill 6,500 feet with rotary.

The first stated crinoidal test in the area by Callery and others will be No. 17-C Shannon estate, 466 feet from the south and west lines of section 27-WX-GC&SF, three-quarters of a mile north of the nearest crinoidal producer. It is due to start Nov. 15 and to drill 5,900 feet with rotary.

Parties residing on or near the Southern Pacific Railroad will find a regular first class pullman service already available to El Paso.

## Eldorado Falls 19-12 Before Lion Onslaught

### Locals Awaken in Sec- ond Half To Come From Behind

Trailing 12 to 6 at the half, Coaches L. B. T. Sikes and D. A. Parker and the Ozona High School Lions made some good "medicine" between halves at Eldorado Friday night. The Lions came back in the second half fired with a new zeal and in a few minutes had forged ahead by a point and in the final quarter widened the victory margin by another touchdown to win the District 8-B contest 19 to 12.

The Lions got off in the lead in the second quarter, after battling on about even terms through the first quarter. Lemmons scattered 36 yards from the Eldorado 45 to the 9 and Coates and Read took a couple of turns carrying the leather, the latter going to the one-foot line on the third down. But on the fourth a hand-off was fumbled and Eldorado took the ball on the one-yard line.

On the first play Munn, dropped behind his goal line and flicked a pass which was intercepted by Red Harrison, Ozona quarterback, who galloped over for the first touchdown. Cooke's kick was wide and the score stood 6 to 0 for Ozona.

But before the quarter had grown much older, the Eagles had tied the count and after another brief interim surged ahead 6 points. The Eagles took Ozona's kick-off after the touchdown and marched down field to the Ozona 26. From that point, Munn passed to Jones over the double line for a touchdown. The kick was blocked. An alert Eagle reversed the order of things deep in Ozona territory by pulling down an Ozona pass and negotiating to the Ozona 5, from which point a short pass in the flat counted for another marker. The attempt for the extra point failed and the score was 12 to 6 at the half.

Nat Read gathered in the Eldorado kick-off in the third quarter and galloped back to the Eldorado 30. But another fumble recovered by Eldorado appeared to stifle the Lion scoring threat. The Ozona line tightened its defense and held the Eagles for downs, forcing them to kick. Running from their own 40, the Lions sent Read around right end and after about a 15-yard gain, Read lateraled to Bill Melton, Ozona end, and Melton, spiked dust in the opponent's eyes the distance to the pay dirt. Cooke's kick from placement for the point was good to make the score Ozona 13, Eldorado, 12.

The Lions started their fourth quarter touchdown drive from their own 35. Lemmons was good for 9 yards and Read made it a first on Ozona's 46. Read picked up 9 more, Coates carried to a first on the Eldorado 41 and then Harrison took the ball on a sweep of the end, lateraled to Read who scooted to the Eldorado 15. In two more plays, Read darted through a hole at tackle for the touchdown. The kick for the point was wide to make the final score 19 to 12.

## V. O. Earnest Is Named Sheriff To Succeed Harp

### Deputy Ascends to Post Vacated by Res- ignation of Incumbent

Members of the Crockett County Commissioners Court, sitting in continuous session this week, late Wednesday announced appointment of V. O. Earnest, deputy sheriff and night watchman for the past six months, as sheriff, assessor and collector of taxes for Crockett county.

Mr. Earnest succeeds Bruce Harp, who tendered his resignation to the court last week, effective on appointment of his successor.

The new sheriff will fill out the unexpired term of Mr. Harp, who was elected to the office last fall and began his two-year term on January 1 of this year. Mr. Earnest has been a resident of Ozona for the past three years. Until a few months ago he was employed as a driller in oil operations in this county but had retired from that work because of a knee injury.

Earnest was appointed a night deputy by Sheriff Harp about six months ago and has served in that capacity since.

Mr. Harp expressed his appreciation to the people of Crockett county for their cooperation and support during the time he served in the sheriff's office. In explanation of his reason for resigning the office, Mr. Harp said:

"I believe that when a fellow gets to the point where he feels that he is not doing the job, he should quit. I have had wonderful help and cooperation from everybody and I am deeply grateful for it. But I feel that I am not fitted for fulfilling the obligations of the office in the manner to which the people of this county are entitled and I feel that in justice to them, I should resign."

Mr. Harp will go back into oil drilling, he said. He was with the Noble Drilling Co. for a number of years before resigning to become sheriff of this county. He has an offer from that company to return to its service, he said, but has made no definite commitments.

## Humble 1 Smith and I-G Owens Get Water On Drillstem Tests

Humble tests in the Childress (Ellenburger) and Clara Couch Wolfcamp fields in Crockett county encountered water as the well opened.

No. 1 Ethel Childress Smith estate, diagonal northeast offset to Humble No. 1 Mrs. Grady Mitcham, opener of the Childress field in northeastern Crockett obtained 2,940 feet, or 21 barrels, of salt water with a sulphur odor on a 90-minute drillstem test from 8,510-96 feet. The water showed 35,000 parts per million salt.

The outpost was shut in for 15 minutes before pulling of the drill pipe was begun. There was a fair blow of air throughout the test, which was made through a five-eighth inch bottomhole choke. Location is the C SW SW 1-B&SF (G. B. Couch).

Humble No. 1 Pleas L. Childress estate, C SW NE 5-CD-D&SE, 2 1/4 miles south and three-quarters of a mile east of Mitcham No. 1, was drilling at 6,153 feet in lime and shale.

Humble No. 1-G J. W. Owens, south outpost to the Clara Couch Wolfcamp field in western Crockett county, recovered 240 feet of sulphur water and 300 feet of water-cut mud on a two-hour drillstem test from 5,814-50 feet. It deepened to 5,900 feet and was drillstem tested again.

On a two-hour drillstem test from 5,784-5,814 feet No. 1-G Owens in 13 minutes showed gas that rated 12,000 cubic feet daily. It recovered 60 feet of gas and oil-cut mud 450 feet of 37.6 gravity oil. Location is the C SW SW 6-GG-H&OB.

**Battle Over State Spending Looms In Next Legislature**

A battle over state spending is shaping up as the biggest problem that will confront the next legislature when it convenes in January, 1949, according to the Texas Research Institute.

The legislature will either have to cut expenditures or levy additional taxes, declares a report issued this week by the Institute, a statistical agency sponsored by the South Texas Chamber of Commerce.

"The state government is taking in more money than ever before," says the report. "But it is spending far more than ever before. The last legislature appropriated all the money certified by the comptroller as available, including an accumulated surplus of \$52,000,000. A much smaller surplus will be available when the next legislature convenes. The difference will have to be raised by more taxes unless the lawmakers reduce expenditures."

State government cost increased 34 per cent in the fiscal year ended last August 31 over the preceding fiscal period to reach a total of \$319,988,104, the institute reports. It was the biggest year-to-

year gain in history.

"This expenditure will be overshadowed, however, by the anticipated expenditure of more than \$450,000,000 for each year of the present piennium," the report said. "Demands for still more spending money may be expected in the next legislature. Higher taxes will be difficult to avoid unless Texans alarmed by the prospect make their voices heard between now and January 1949."

**New Sulpha Drug For Bang's Disease**

AUSTIN. — Experiments on a new sulpha drug to combat Bang's disease in cattle and lamb fever in human beings soon be made at the University of Texas.

In the Clayton Brucella Laboratory, directed by Dr. V. Schuhart, the new drug, sulfathiazine, will be tested on infected cattle.

Tests already made show the drug will come through the mammary gland in high concentration. Dr. Schuhart said other sulpha drugs tested in laboratory did not kill all bacteria in the mammary gland.

**Texas Rescue '46'  
New Winter Grass  
Soon To Be Available**

COLLEGE STATION. — This time next fall farmers and ranchmen will be going to their seed stores and calling for Texas Rescue '46.

Rescue grass is a native of South America and has been growing in Texas for almost a hundred years. It is a winter annual which produces green feed when most other grasses are dead or dormant. Early ranchmen named it "rescue" because it came to their rescue when most needed.

Native rescue grass seed is harvested and sold commercially, as is seed imported from Australia and other countries.

Since 1941 George C. Warner and R. L. Hensel of the Agricultural Experiment Station at Texas A. & M. College have been making selections from both native rescue grass and from several strains of seed obtained from the

USDA Bureau of Plant Industry, Soils and Agricultural Engineering.

They found that rescue differed greatly in height, leafiness, seed production and resistance to disease. Out of these tests they came up with a selection they named Texas Rescue 46.

In field tests with their native and imported strains it has ranked high in forage and seed yield and in protein and phosphoric acid content. Foundation seed was placed with registered seed growers in September, 1946, and the seed will be available for general planting next fall.

Things Texas farmers — and their livestock — will like about Texas Rescue 46 are its upright growth, leafiness, resistance to disease and its habit of producing lots of grass early in the spring. Once established, its high yield will cause it to reseed itself year after year.

**September Livestock Shipments up 34 Pct.**

AUSTIN.—Livestock shipments in September to exceed August shipments by 34 per cent, reported The University of Texas Bureau of Business Research. At same time last year, shipments slid 18 per cent between August and September.

Shipments of cattle soared to 5,559 carloads during the month to tally a 41 per cent hike. Calves registered a 28 per cent gain, hog shipments were up 18 per cent during the month and sheep shipments advanced 22 per cent.

Interstate shipments (plus Fort Worth) rolled forward 37 per cent between August and September, with most of the gain resulting from the 46 per cent jump in cattle shipments.

Intrastate shipments (minus Fort Worth) turned in a 16 per cent monthly increase to total 878 carloads, 538 of which were cattle.

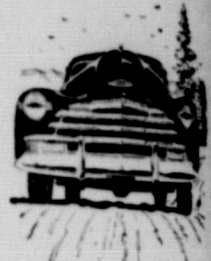

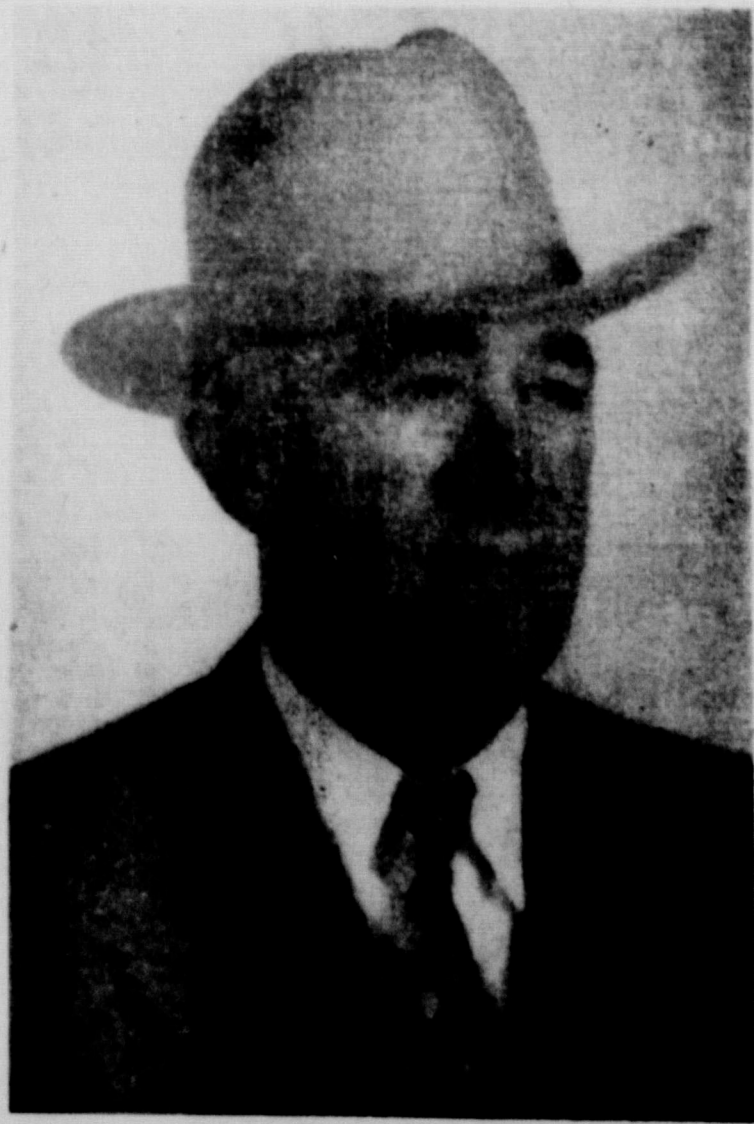

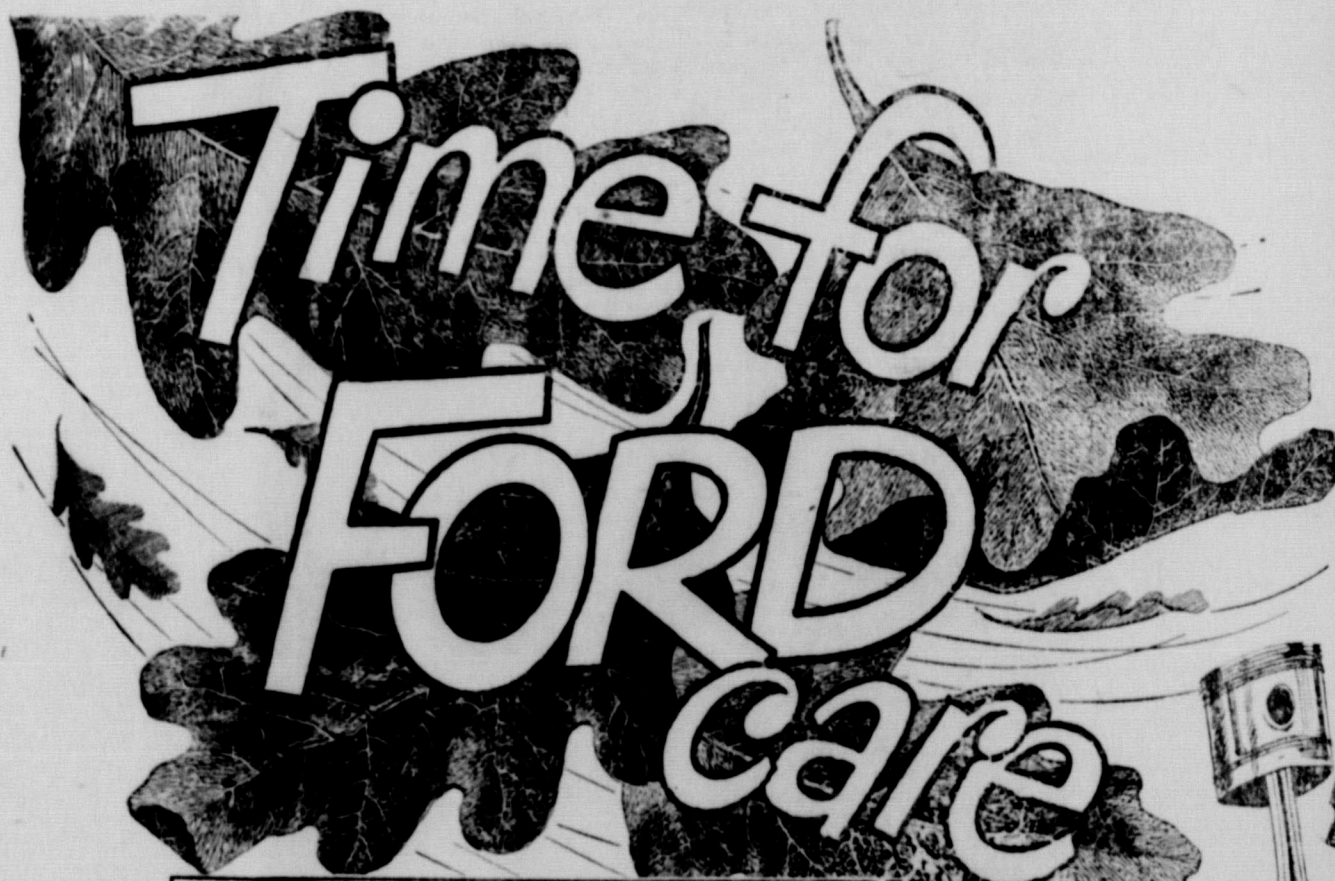

**Multi-Million Dollar Expansion for S. M. U.**

DALLAS, Texas. — Following a called meeting of its board of trustees, Southern Methodist University announced November 1 a multi-million dollar building program on which construction is to begin as soon as possible.

Authorized by the board were the following three major projects: re-location of the Perkins School of Theology on a more ample plat of campus ground and erection of six buildings, including chapel, classrooms, library, and three dormitories; construction of the \$2,000,000 Fondren Science Building as soon as contracts can be let by the SMU executive committee; and completion of a Law School Quadrangle, including construction of a legal center for the Southwestern Legal Foundation established last year at SMU.

Capacity student enrollment prompted the action taken by the trustees in voting the expansion program and relocation of the theology school.

The new Fondren Science Building will be financed largely by a gift of \$1,000,000 to SMU by Mrs. W. W. Fondren of Houston.

**Pecos Tomatoes As Good As Mississippi**

COLLEGE STATION. — You wouldn't think of Pecos county as the spot to raise tomatoes in Texas. But it's being done.

Mrs. H. H. Mathews of Fort Stockton heard her grocer say, "Wouldn't it be great if we could grow tomatoes like this in Pecos county?" She looked at the tomatoes in his hand and said, "Come out to my place. I'll show you

some bigger than that."

She is raising five varieties at her ranch. She prefers the Brimmer as a table tomato, as it has few seeds and grows to a large size. The Pan-American is her favorite for canning but she says the Rutgers and Scarlet Dawn are good also.

She has sold 15 bushels from the garden and expects to harvest around 120 bushels before the growing season is over.

Mrs. Mathews told Pauline McWilliams, Pecos county home demonstration agent, that a friend from Mississippi had been amazed by the tomatoes. "We grow tomatoes like that in Mississippi, but didn't know it could be done in Texas," she said.

facilities for student recreation, including a browsing room, game room, music room, lounges, cafeteria, fountain, and space for art exhibits.

Formerly a service club at Camp Howze, Gainesville, the new Union building was transported to the S. M. U. campus and assembled by the Federal Works Agency. The structure, with an added wing built by S. M. U., provides approximately 18,000 square feet of floor space.

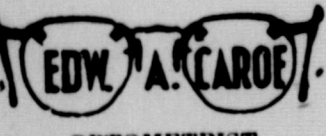

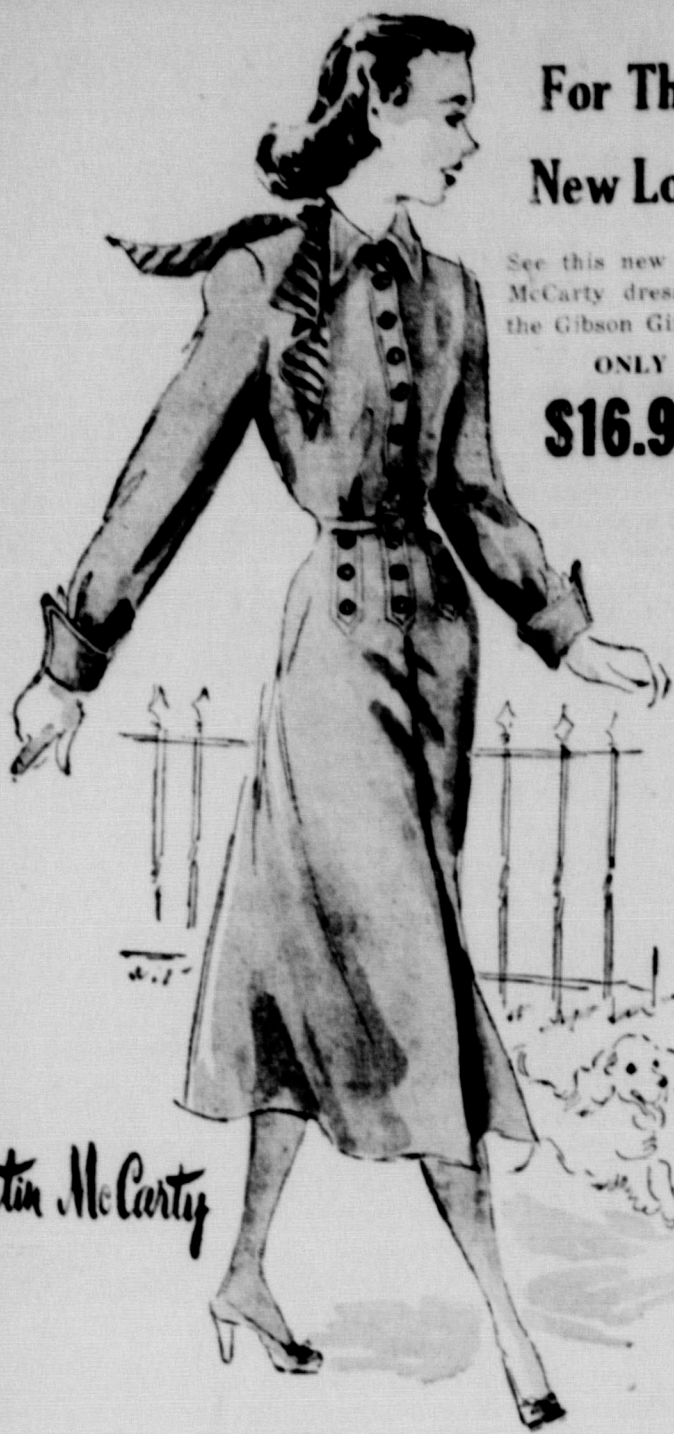

**Alamo Bowl Newest Entry; San Antonio C. C. Launches Plan**

SAN ANTONIO — "Football fans of South Texas need no longer take a back seat to Pasadena, Dallas, New Orleans or Miami," C. C. Kreuger, football chairman of the San Antonio Chamber of Commerce declared this week with his announcement that the Chamber will sponsor an Alamo Bowl Game on New Year' Day in San Antonio.

With all the major bowl games sold out, visitors expecting to come to San Antonio were requested to write immediately to the San Antonio Chamber of Commerce, 700 Insurance Bldg. for ticket reservations which will be filled in order of receipt. Money order or check must accompany reservation.

Prices for the game are \$7.20 for box seats, \$4.80 for reserved seats on either side of the field, \$3 for seats in the South Section and end zone bleachers.

Alamo Stadium, with a normal seating capacity of 22,418, will enlarge its facilities to take care of the sell-out crowd of 25,000 expected to attend.

Top teams in the first twenty of the nation are being scouted preliminary to feeler bids being sent out. The Chamber will offer each team \$30,000 or forty-five per cent of the receipts. This figure is slightly lower than the cash inducements of other major bowls

but will attract most of the good football teams of the country.

Special colorful attractions are promised for half-time entertainment. Merchants and residents of San Antonio will cooperate in many of the activities scheduled during Bowl Week.

Businessmen and football fans back their enthusiasm for the South Texas' own Bowl Game with orders for more than 1,700 ducats within 24 hours of the announcement.

Kreuger extended a hearty welcome to all out-of-town visitors. He stated: "This Bowl Game will stand on its feet as a national attraction. The teams selected will be among the nation's best."

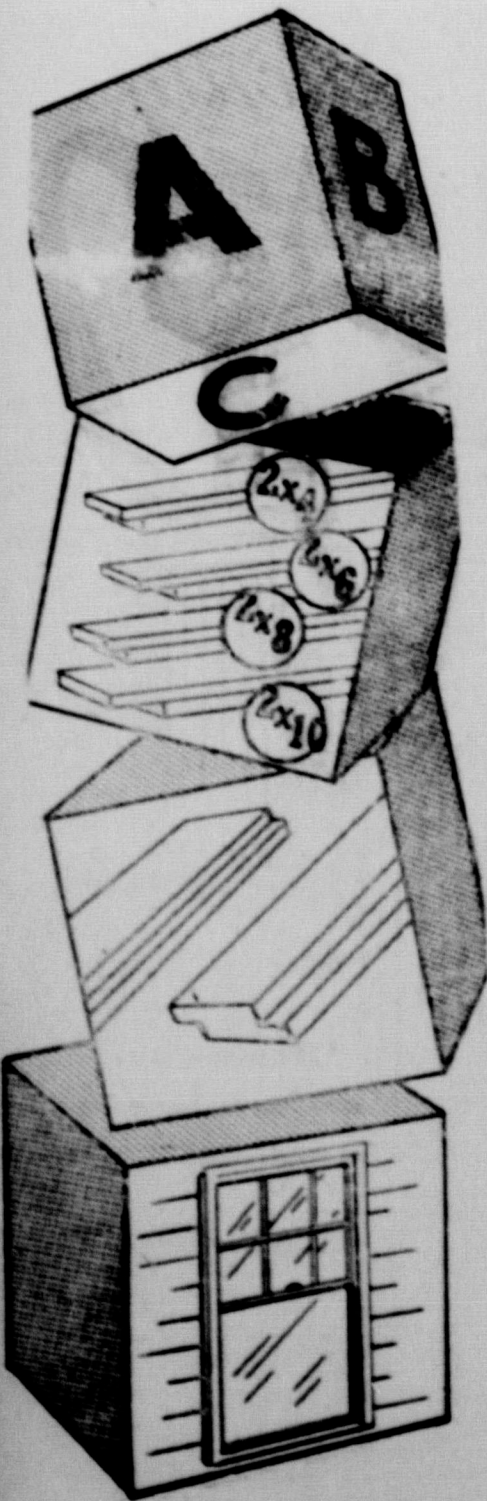
