## Here and There

### DANGEROUS PROPOSITION

Within the next few days or weeks the Congress of The United States will consider one of the most astounding propositions ever made to our government, Universal Military Training. We hope that it will be defeated again, as it was the last Congress.

Universal Military Training, which we shall call UMT, as recommended by the President's National Security Training Commission, is permanent military conscription in peacetime of every American boy 18 years of age. After an initial period of six months military training, the boy goes to the organized active reserve, where for seven and a half years he is subject to being called up at any time for training or other military assignment, as the President's UMT plan every boy in the country would be in a position to save his life between the ages of 18 and 20 years of age would be determined by the Pentagon at Washington.

No one of them could marry, have children, go into business, do anything else between the ages of 18 and 20 with any assurance of finishing what he has begun. He would be assigned to one of the three branches of the service, as the military authorities see best for their purpose, not his. His training would be in military methods, by military officers at military camps.

Germany, Italy and Japan are the countries that have tried UMT. In no one of them did it result in a war or win a war. In three, UMT built up a ruling military caste which dominated the government and prepared the minds of the people for the dictatorship to follow. Each of the three countries, feeling that it was prepared for a victorious war, hurried itself against the UMT, to be defeated and broken. In each case the defeat was in the hands of nations which did not depend on UMT for survival. What reason do we have to think that the experiment will turn out any better in the U. S. A.?

Our experience with wars from 1840 to now indicates that when nations think war is inevitable, they go to war, ready for war, and it comes to want war, and it always comes. Is it not strange that the U. S. A., which has always won its wars with military armies against nations who had professional armies recruited by UMT, should now turn away from its own method and accept the method of the nations it has defeated?

A second fact about UMT is that in a day when the economy of this country is already bent to the vast weight of armaments and inflationary taxes, the benefit cost of a UMT program will likely be the straw that will break the camel's back, and with the necessity of providing training officer for the two millions under UMT.

It is the enormous job of clothing, feeding and paying this vast army, the military leaders will try to hold over the head of the taxpayer, who will pass the bill, who will pay more than he can afford.

It is the raising up a new crop of sons. Eighteen million boys are in the formation of their lives. They are under the influences of the community, and their will, UMT will determine the fate of all these boys. A single stroke and their wills in the environment where they are determined by the agencies of petty drill masters. Discipline they will receive, the protection of the community. ## District Champ Lions To Lubbock For Regional Meet

### Ozona Cagers Are Undefeated in Season District Play

Ozona High School's 1952 Lions basketball squad, undisputed champions of District 6-A will leave next Thursday for Lubbock where they will represent the district in Regional contests scheduled at Tech gymnasium.

The Lions are bracketed to meet a team from Dimmitt in the Regional opener at 9 o'clock Friday morning, Feb. 29.

Ozona cinched the District 6-A title last Friday night when they licked the Junction Eagles 31 to 26 and went on to make it an undefeated district season when they won the regular season finale from Menard 44 to 30 in Davidson Memorial Gymnasium here Tuesday night. The Lions won eight straight district games in a round robin schedule against teams representing Sonora, Eldorado, Menard and Junction. The season's record was 17 wins against 11 defeats in all classes of competition, practice games and tournament play.

Coach Swede Peltos and his champion cagers are scheduled to leave at 2 o'clock next Thursday afternoon for Lubbock to be ready for their regional game Friday morning. A goodly contingent of local fans and Lions rooters is expected to be on hand for the regional opener Friday morning.

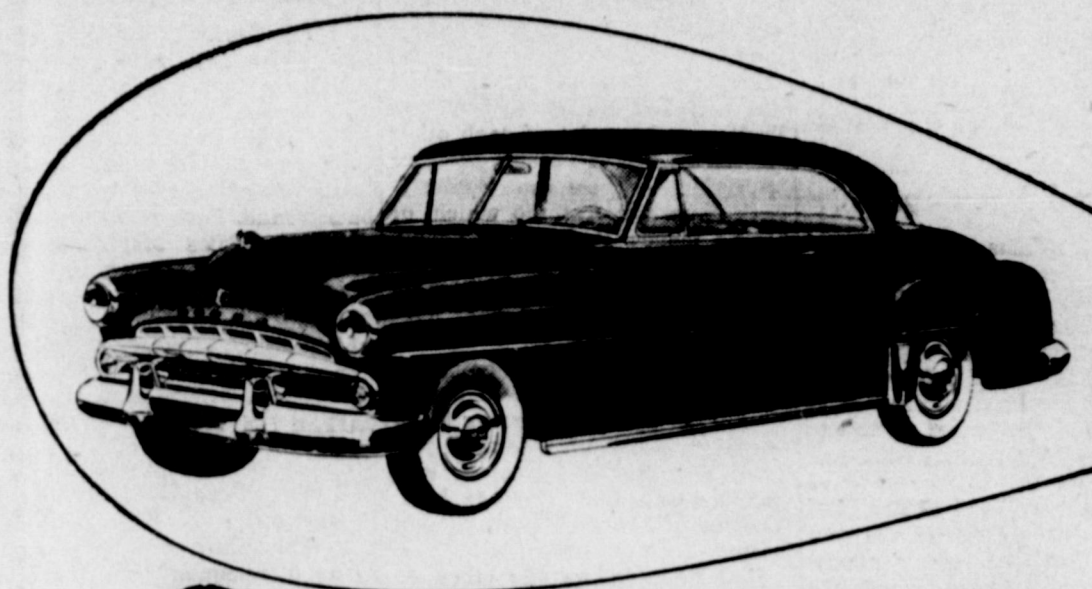
### Brains Galore! Freshmen to Seniors, OHS Has Plenty

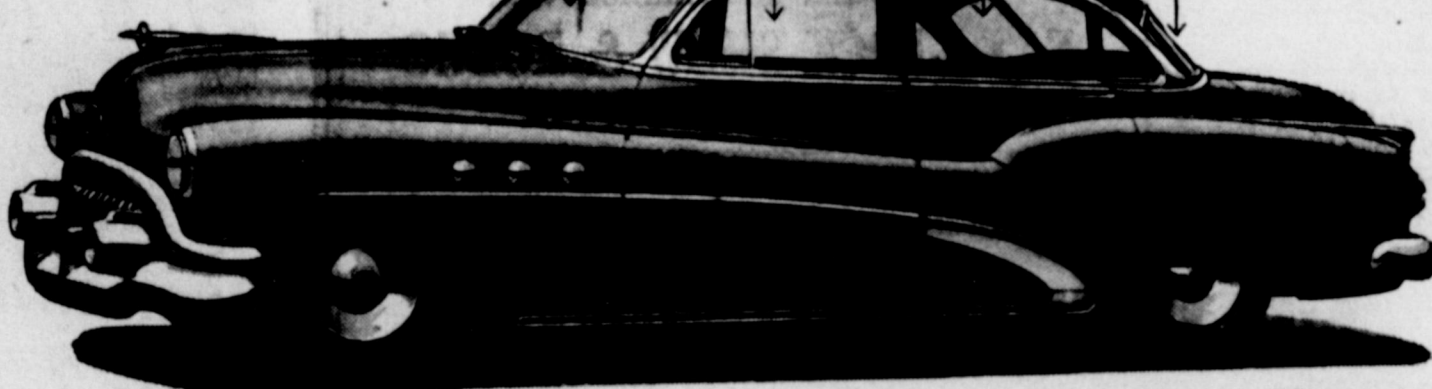

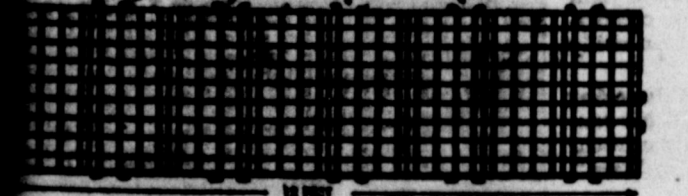

plan includes no protection for them against the rat-holes of prostitution, liquor and gambling that always flourish around army camps. They will be subject to the dangers of casualty from maneuvers with live ammunition, physical illness resulting from army routine and the mental illness which accounted for 4 of each 10 patients in the last war.

Dr. Ralph Hutchins, former President of the University of Chicago, in speaking of his two years in the army (at age 18 to 20) says: "Although free citizens make the best army, the army is not the best place to make free citizens. Character is a matter of making right choices for yourself, and in the army one makes no choices. One is taught there that blind obedience to orders and the bearing of arms are the first duties of citizenship. In my own army life, I came out lazier than when I went in. I became an expert at cutting corners and evading unpleasant tasks." Deprived of normal contacts with sweethearts, wives, sisters and mothers, and crowded up with other men in the same fix, the boy falls under the spell of a perpetual sex consciousness.

In his testimony before a committee considering this bill, General MacArthur recently said that the present crisis is no time to pass on the UMT plan. His advice was to stay with the present draft law, wait until the crisis has passed, then consider the matter in a calm perspective. But the military brass in Washington want to take advantage of the present hysteria to saddle UMT on the U.S.A. When he get it, we will be stuck with it for the rest of our lives.

Is there anything you and I can do to prevent this dangerous and un-American measure from being made into law? Yes, if we will act now. Let as many as will sit down and write short but clear letters to one or more of our Congressmen. Write them in your own hand. Send them to one of the following: The Honorable Ken Regan, House of Representatives Office Building, Washington 25, D. C., or The Hon. Tom Connally, Senate Office Building, Washington 25, D. C., or The Hon. Lyndon Johnson, Senate Office Building, Washington 25, D. C.

Do it now. Tomorrow will probably be too late.

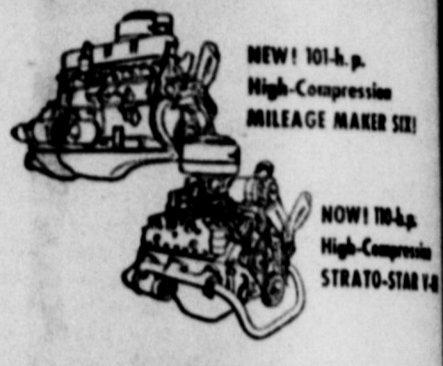

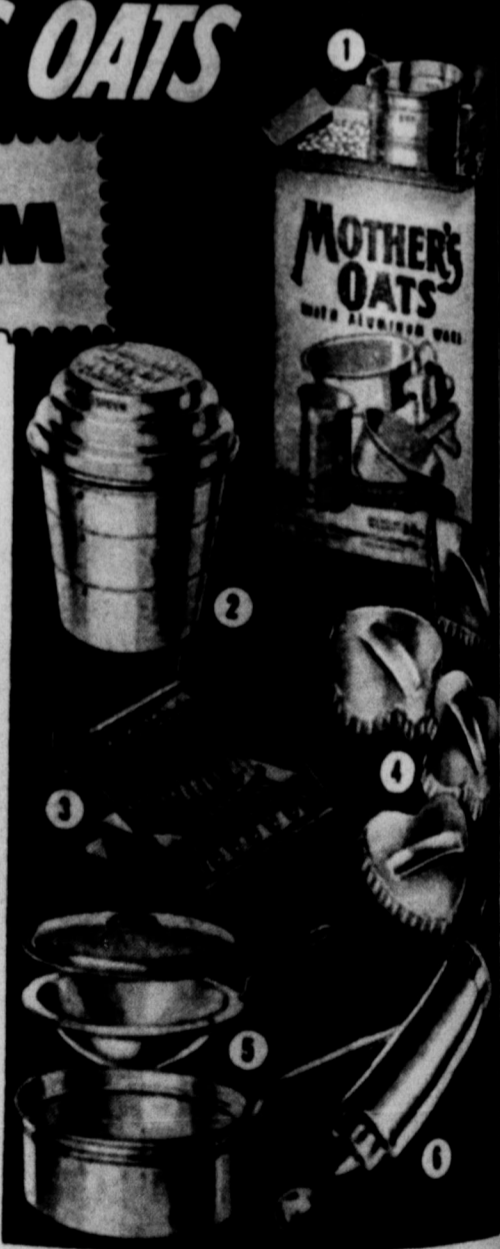

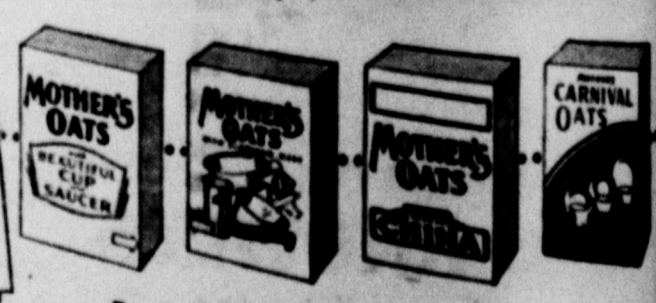
