ARE WE NEGLECTING OUR YOUNG PEOPLE?

The approach of Spring and Summer, warm weather, longer days, vacation for school children and time on their hands, brings to mind again the long felt need of this community for something to entertain its youth.

You who have children growing up now and those of us who have reared them here may think on common grounds. What your children do now in their leisure time is about what the younger generation has done through the years — go to a picture show, ride around in cars (except in the gasless, tireless war years), go to an occasional party, maybe now play a little golf if they happen to be interested in that game, play pool in the recreation halls, if they are boys, or sit on the fountain stools in drug stores as the only place available for visiting, or mayhap in the summertime go to a stock storage tank on some nearby ranch for a swim.

Its youth is the best collateral any community has. Its investments for their happiness and contentment will always be repaid a

thousand fold in pride in and affection for the community in which they spent a happy youth, and if it is their choice to become its citizens of tomorrow, that very pride and affection will assert itself in continued growth for their community through their efforts as men and women citizens.

A couple of years ago an inspired group of public spirited citizens of Ozona, under the leadership of the then community council, undertook the task of preparing plans for a community house, where both old and young could find recreation and a chance for a close knit community life, and a swimming pool where, likewise, old and young could spend many pleasant warm weather hours.

An election to decide whether or not bonds should be issued to provide these facilities was ordered held. The issue was defeated by the slimmest margin possible — one single vote.

Almost exactly half of the qualified citizens who went to the polls that day wanted some sort of community gathering place and a swimming pool, while just one more than half did not. And those who voted on the issue represented only a small part of the total qualified to express an opinion on the matter.

All of which, it would seem apparent to anybody, was an inconclusive test. In justice to those who voted in such numbers for the improvement, it would seem only right that the issue again be presented. Maybe it would be roundly defeated next time or maybe it would be approved in conclusive fashion. But a one-vote margin when only a fraction of the total voting strength is involved would seem to call for another test and a more determined effort to get an expression from as nearly all qualified voters as possible.

The country club is a fine advancement for the community and has answered the needs of at least a part of its citizenship, mostly the adults. But it doesn't answer the community-wide need of a center where all public gatherings

can be held, where a youth program can be carried on and where old and young alike can find social relaxation as occasion demands.

A number of West Texas cities in this area are now turning their attention to the need for swimming pools, and making plans for such developments. Three Pecos county towns, Fort Stockton, Imperial and Sheffield are being considered as sites for swimming pools by the Commissioners Court. Iraan already has a pool. Now a movement is under way in Big Lake for construction of a swimming pool. Sonora has had such a pool for years.

None of these communities have any advantages over Ozona in the way of greater financial resources, one-race citizenship or less recreational facilities already in existence. What difficulties those who have had pools have encountered have been offset by a wide margin in enjoyment for the citizenship.

Every community either advances or goes backward — they never stand still. Crockett county's tax valuations have gained each year through further oil development until now the county's oil wealth pays approximately 85 per cent of its tax bill. The voters have been liberal in approving needed additional school facilities for the education of youth. But "all work and no play" it would seem that they would be as liberal in providing a mere pittance in comparison to provide the youngsters with a place to play.

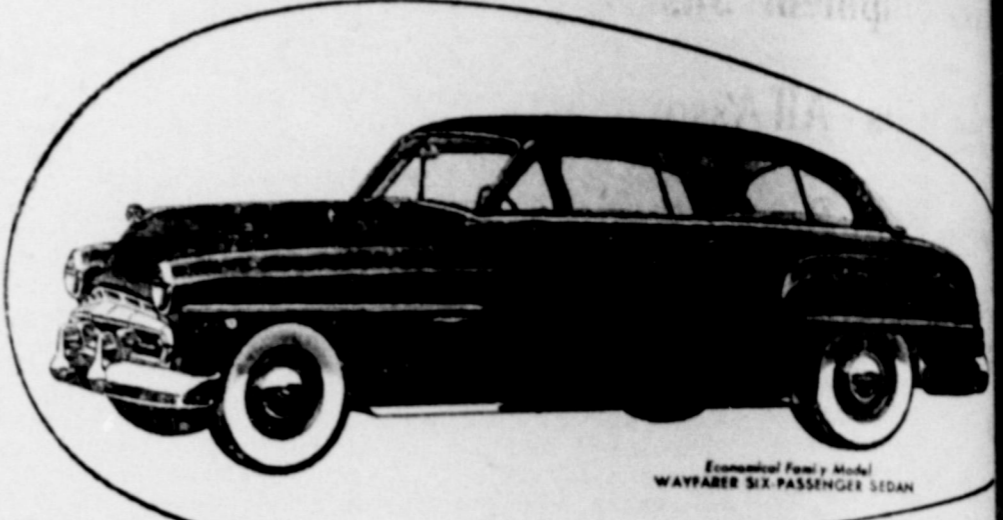

FHA Loans Now Available in Texas Drouth Disaster Area

All Texas counties are now under designation as disaster areas by proclamation of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. The action qualifies farmers who have suffered crop losses and who are unable to obtain credit elsewhere for loans from the Farmers Home Administration to put in 1952 crops. Announcement of the designation was made at Dallas, headquarters of the Farmers Home Administration by L. J. Cappleman, state director.

Bad weather conditions in 1951 reduced crop yields materially and tightened up credit conditions, to the extent that many farmers were unable to finance crop plantings. Disaster loans are now available in each county. Farmers who have sustained production losses on crops and livestock may apply for funds to pay for seed, fertilizer and materials for insect control where needed, gas and oil for tractors, feed for livestock, essential farm and home operating expenses, machinery repairs and other expenses incident to the production of a crop.

Credit is advanced under authority of Public Law 38 and is available to farmers who have sustained losses, and who cannot obtain from local sources the funds needed to plant a crop this year. Before a loan is made a county committee of three farmers must certify that the applicant suffered a substantial production loss. Farmers may apply for loans at the office of County Supervisor Denny O. Sullivan located at San Angelo in the Tom Green county courthouse.

Funds will be available to ranchmen whose herds have been depleted by the drouth. They can borrow to restock their pastures.

Farmers who qualify under the disaster loan regulations may discuss their needs with the county supervisor.

Better farming practices are emphasized in the FHA loan program. These will be discussed and agreed upon by the county supervisor and the applicant when the loan application is prepared.

Henry Bell, secretary and general manager of the Association, expects that most of the cattlemen will arrive in Fort Worth early Monday, March 17th.

A number of outstanding speakers will address the cattlemen during the convention and plenty of entertainment will be provided, Bell said.

An elected official's idea of what "the best interest of the country" is will depend very largely upon what he knows his party's interest is, and what he believes his individual political interest is. Human nature being what it is, an elected official's thinking on every issue is affected by the crosswind of his political ambitions. The majority of elected officials on the federal level are career politicians. That is, they are making a life work of public office. Each one hopes either to continue to serve where he is, or else take a step up the ladder. Whether he realizes or not, his attitude on every question is colored by what he imagines will be the most politic thing to do. The will of his constituents is likely to be dimmed out by his intense desire to hold his own particular in a system like ours where there is no effective way for the electorate to register its will except through pressure groups.

Is there anything we can do to make the government more responsive to the majority will of the people? Yes, if we will do them. The first thing would be to make a more frequent use of the referendum. In matters as important and far reaching as the tax rate, the national budget, and Universal Military Training — to name only a few — no action should be taken by Congress without a popular vote on each issue. If the objection is made that we should then spend too much time going to and from the polls, the answer is that would be the best thing that could possibly happen to the American people. Frequent national elections on specific issues would be powerful tonic for the apathy and indifference of the electorate.

A second measure to make democracy more workable would be direct presidential elections. There should be some way for each voter to vote for the person he wants for President, regardless of whether that person is a candidate of a political party or not. The President should be elected directly by a majority of the popular vote, not by an electoral college.

Finally, it would seem to me that the cause of practical democracy would be served by the participation of more people in the government as elected officials. There is a tendency for a few men to stay in power too long.

How To Spoil A Good Dish!

Some will argue that one term of Roosevelt and the New Deal could have been a good thing for the United States. Many are wondering whether his long tenure and invincible coalition of powers was not the most disastrous event since the Civil War. A one term limit for all major elected officials, from President down to state legislators, might be a wholesome thing. Some of the terms probably should be lengthened. Many of the salaries should be raised. Elected officials should be allowed no exemptions from taxes beyond those allowed an ordinary citizen. Such a measure would encourage more citizens of highest quality to take a term in some public office as an act of service. There would be no opportunity to make a career of politics, and less temptation to compromise conviction for the sake of another term. Since there would be no question of reelection, many successful professional and business men would be able and willing to sacrifice a few years from their private careers to serve the country. More frequent changes of personnel in Congress, the legislatures of the state, and the high offices of President, governors, etc. would tend to break up the coalitions of party politicians like the one we have in the national saddle now, and like the one the Republicans had before Roosevelt.

It is not enough just to say we are a democracy, to teach our children in public school the pretty fables about Democratic America, and to make grand speeches on patriotic occasions about "Our Democracy." We ought to be honestly asking ourselves a hard question. "Are we really, in effect, a Democracy?" My answer to this question, frankly, is, "I

doubt it." To be completely realistic about it, one would have to go and say, "But anytime we want to, we can be a Democracy. Already we have the tradition. We have long had the intention. All we need now is to devise the ways and means."

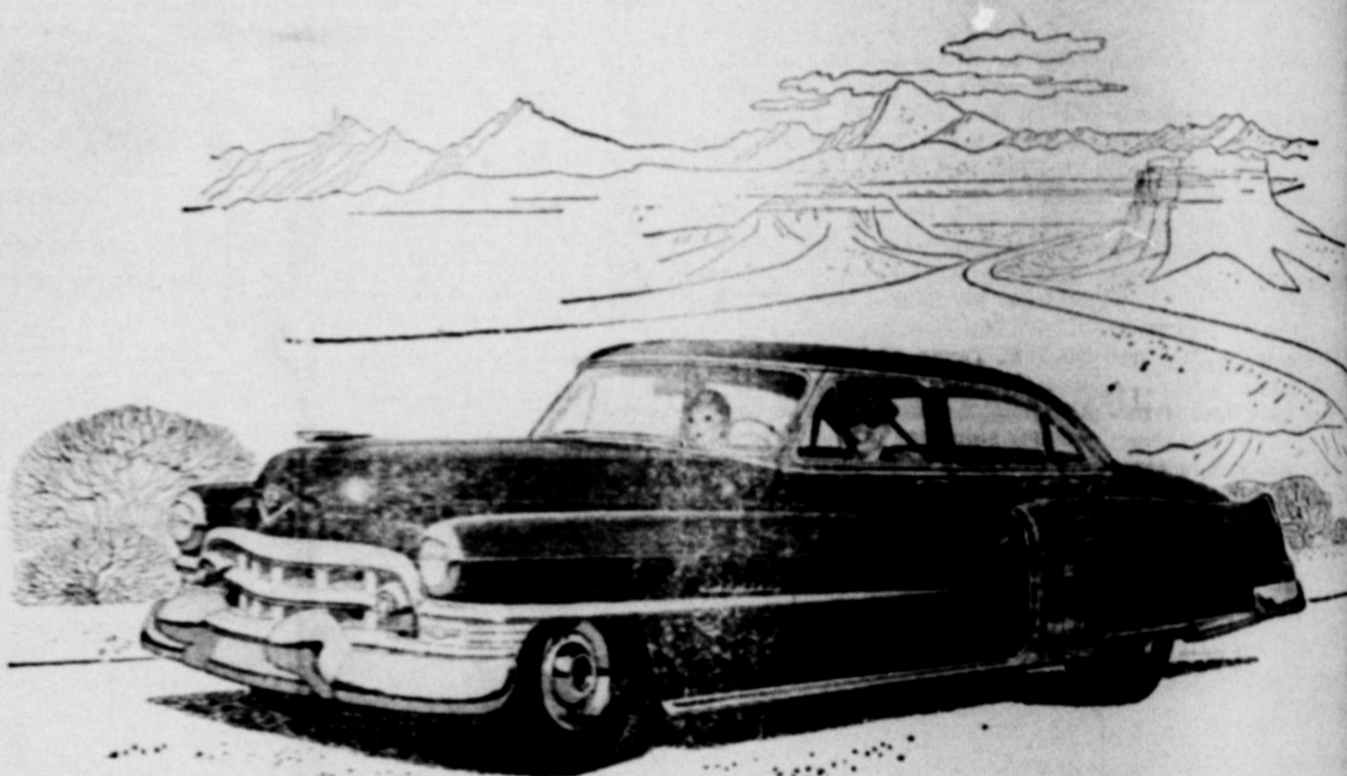
