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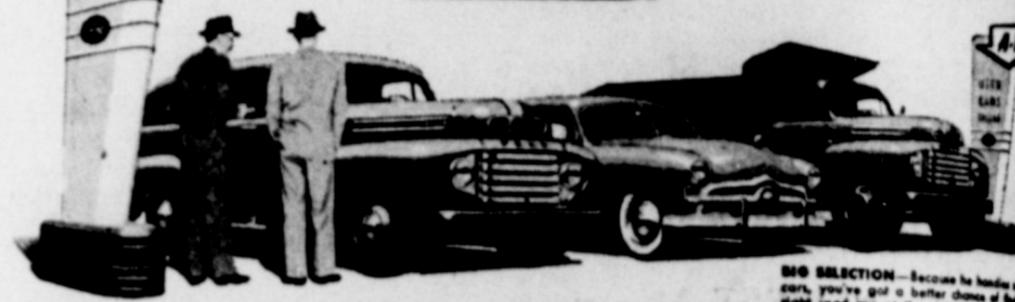

**FRESHMAN FOUNDED FACTS**

There are two kinds of legal trouble. They are civil and criminal. A civil wrong is one punishable by money payments. A criminal wrong is one punishable by money, imprisonment or death. There are two classes of criminal crimes. They are misdemeanors and felonies. A misdemeanor is usually a minor crime and a felony is considered a much more serious crime. To be convicted for felony leaves a scar on one's life which can never be completely erased.

There are two classes of law-breakers and they are the ones who, through ignorance, had companionship, temporary loss of good judgment, or just plain mistake break the law, and the ones who have a natural desire for wrong doings, who have a "loose screw" mentally, and believe that a living can't be secured by honest effort.

According to the F. B. I. every three persons arrested for robbery, one of the three was under 21; one of every two who had committed burglary was a minor; and more than one-half of all auto thefts were committed by juveniles. More 19-year-olds were arrested than any other group. The American Law Institute claims that in one year young persons were responsible for half the auto

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thefts, 40 per cent of the burglaries, 28 per cent of the robberies and 22 per cent of all other thefts. youths between 16 and 21 comprise only one-eighth of the population but commit over one-fifth of our most serious crimes.

Most women get in jail by giving fictitious checks to be able to keep up with the latest fashions — even if it means wearing those newest clothes in jail.

The American Bar Association finds the cost of crime \$15,000,000,000 a year and increasing each year. They also say that 1 of every 37 persons in the United States is a criminal — and that 200,000 citizens will commit murder before they die.

In summing up this problem of keeping out of trouble, we need to: (1) use foresight continually to avoid trouble that plagues people in this world. (2) Know our rights, as well as others and use our efforts to prevent such rights from being imposed upon. (3) Avoid every possible danger of sickness and accidents since those two troubles can ruin our lives. (4) Learn proper money management since most trouble is over money. (5) avoid in every way getting mixed up in courts, either in civil or criminal proceedings.

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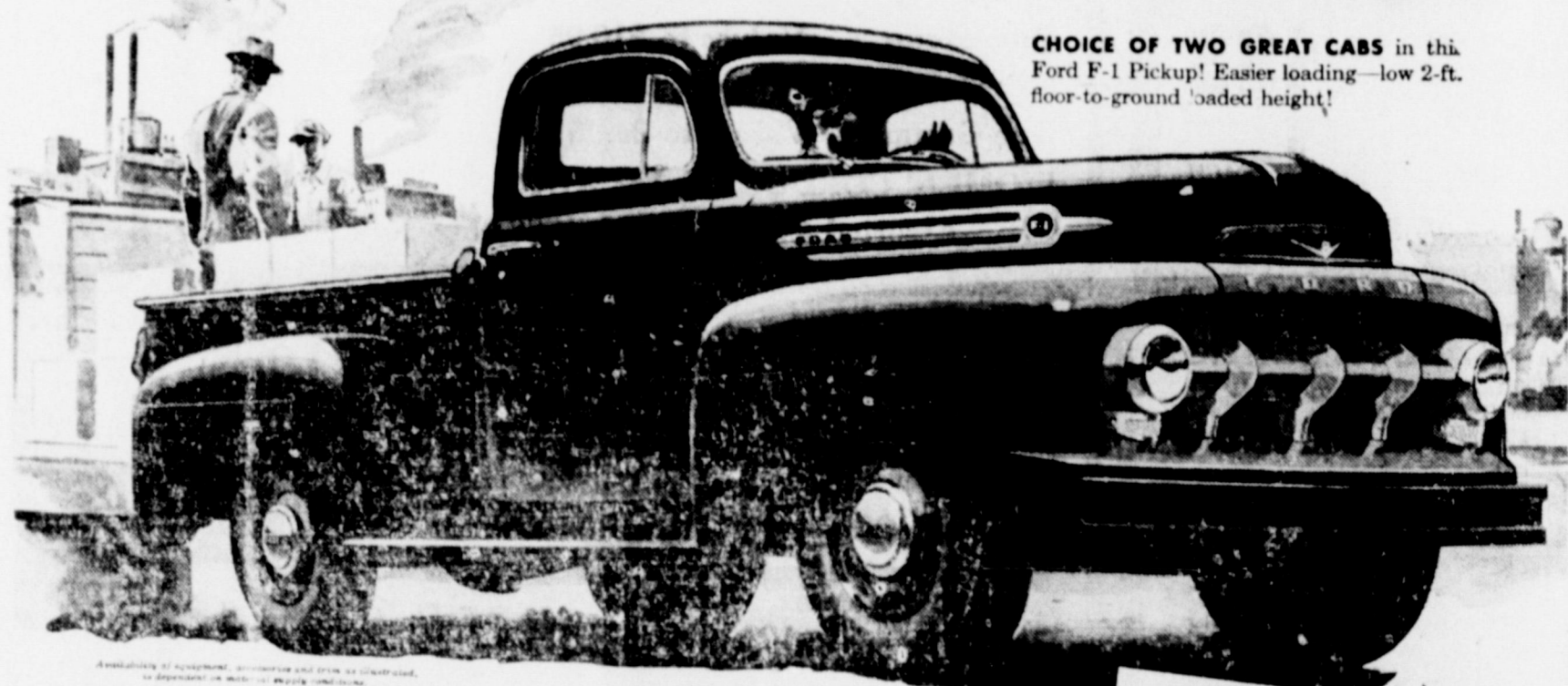
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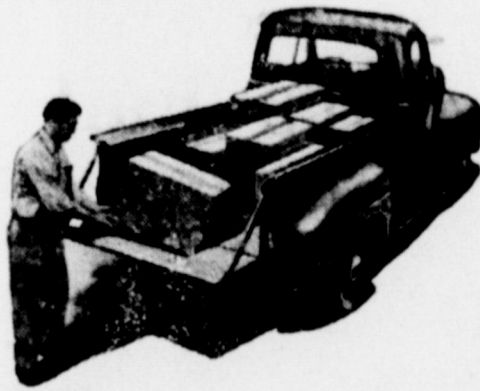

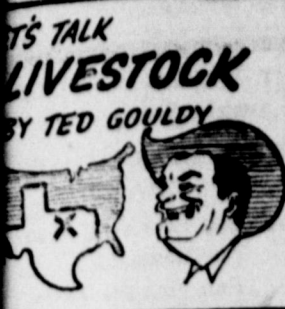

**TALK LIVESTOCK BY TED GOULDY**

**FORT WORTH** — The week with another heavy run of calves and sheep at Fort Worth and other points around the circle. Twelve major livestock markets reported 165,000 cats above a week ago and more than the same Monday. Calf receipts at 12 markets were 41,900, or 7,400 above last week and 26,700 above a week ago. Thus, cattle and calf receipts on Monday were 102,000 above the same day last year. Receipts at 12 markets Monday were 67,800, or 18,500 over a week ago, and 31,500 above the day last year. Heavy shipments of livestock to market have been going on for more than six months at Fort Worth and other major livestock markets.

Lighter cattle opened 50 cents above \$1 lower at Fort Worth Monday. Exceptions were that sold steady. Stocker cattle prices were steady, other killings were 50 cents and spots lower. Hogs were steady to 25 cents lower, topping at \$17.25 and \$16. Sows were steady at \$16. Lams sold weak to \$1 for slaughter and feeder were 50 cents lower. Yearlings were 50 cents lower. Yearling and choice fed steers and heifers drew \$22.00-30.00; plain medium butcher cattle brought \$21.00, with ratty yearlings \$12.00. Fat cows drew \$12.00-14.00 and canners and cutters for \$7.00-12.00. Bulls cashed \$10.00-18.00. Choice stocker steer drew \$20.00-23.00 and heifer for \$21.00 down. Stocker yearlings sold at \$22.00 and heifer calves and yearlings usually sold around \$2 or under similar steers. Stocker cashed at \$11 to \$18, four Monday at \$17.50. Lambs sold at \$17 to \$22, and lambs drew \$10 to \$15. Wethers at \$9 down. Slaughtering wethers cashed at \$5 to \$7. Old sold around \$4 to \$5. Fat wethers sold from \$11 to feeder yearlings sold at \$11

totals of popular vote piled up by the two candidates in this election, but the electoral vote was heavily one-sided. There are situations where the majority of the popular vote could go to the candidate with the short end of the electoral vote. This should not be so.

The public opinion prediction polls suffered another defeat. Not a one of them, for all their profound analyses, was able to come anywhere near predicting the outcome. Human nature is too fluid and variable to measure in advance. Certain individuals who had money on the outcome did a much better job of forecasting.

Eisenhower probably will not be able to accomplish much by making the inspection trip to Korea. But it is a good gesture. It shows that he realizes the importance of the Korean War and the fact that a solution of the problem is basic to our national life, and perhaps to the peace of the world.

The administration of the government during the next four years will be neither simple nor easy. These are perilous times and expensive times. But in the choice of Eisenhower and a Republican Congress the American people have shown clearly that they trust to private initiative, rather than a planned economy and paternal government, to provide peace and prosperity for the future. We shall see what we shall see.

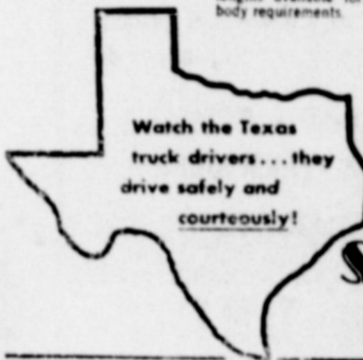

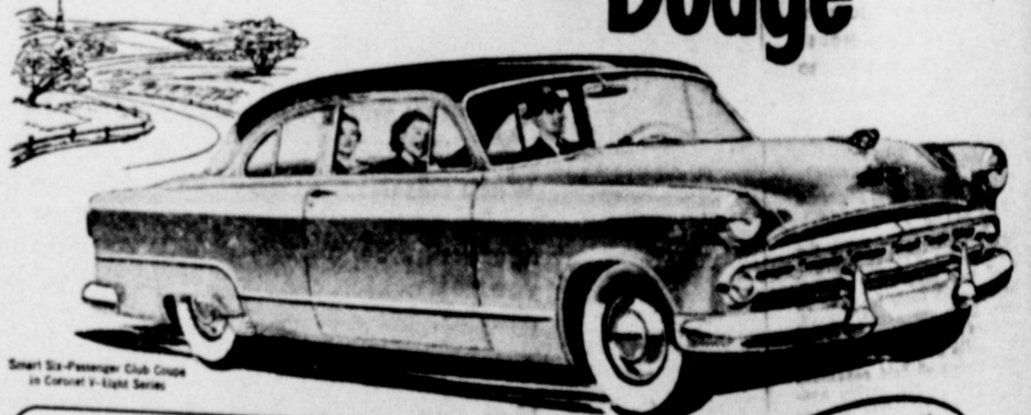


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
