"GOVERNMENT SHOULD NOT SUPPORT THE PEOPLE"

"The lesson should be constantly enforced that, though the people support the government, the government should not support the people."

Does that sound like something that was said yesterday? Actually, it was said by President Grover Cleveland 76 years ago, in the course of vetoing a long-forgotten bill.

The principle which President Cleveland laid down was important then. It is a thousand times more important now. In the intervening years millions of us, knowingly or otherwise, have been infected with the virus of government paternalism. We have become accustomed to being supported, wholly or partly, by government. And that trend, unless checked and reversed, can end only in dictatorship, tyranny and the destruction of all that is courageous and adventurous in the human spirit.

SELF-RELIANCE BACK IN STYLE

In a recent book entitled "The People's Pottage," Garrett Garrett points out the hard fact "that when people support the government, they control government, but when the government supports the people it will control them."

For nearly 20 years the prophets of central authority have sought to obscure this truth. Now there is a growing realization that freedom can exist only when the individual is responsible for his own welfare, and that the degree of dependency upon government is an accurate measure of freedom lost.

The new awareness of this danger is well exemplified in the policy recommendations adopted by the American National Cattlemen's Association at a recent meeting in Denver. Despite price drops which have severely affected the nations meat producers, they recommend unequivocally the discontinuance of support prices on all agricultural commodities, and, in the interim, immediate amendment of the law to place supports on corn and other feed grains on a flexible basis to be determined by the Secretary of Agriculture. Recognizing the possible credit needs of livestock producers and feeders this summer and fall, they recommend that existing credit facilities be alerted to meet any emergency that may arise. No special federal emergency credit is wanted. With an eye to preventing awkward industry surpluses, they also recommend heavy marketing of cows this fall, thus reducing breeding herds.

All down the line the association backs Secretary Benson's efforts to put the agricultural economy of this country on a sound basis. This is the kind of self-reliant action that built the United States. It's good to see it back in style.

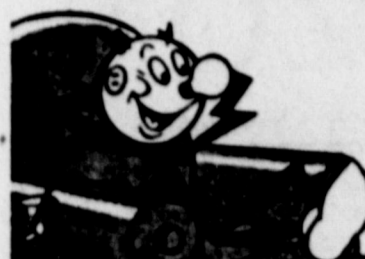
The WMU will meet next Wednesday, June 17, at 9 a.m. at the Church. The Baptist Vacation Bible School starts June 6.

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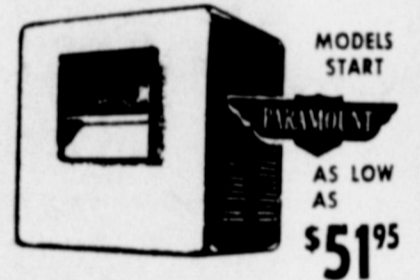

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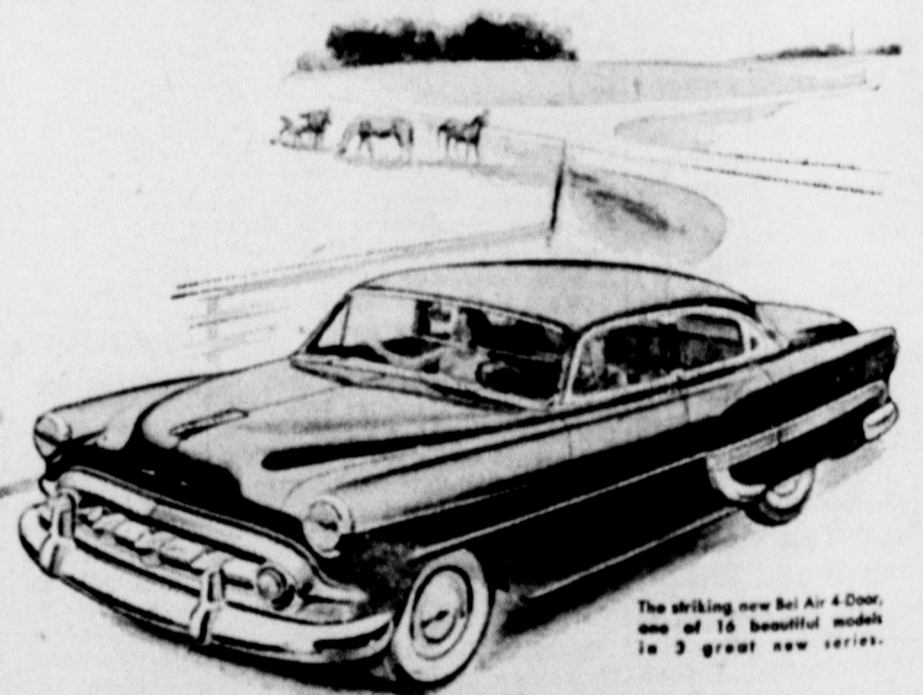

So the People May Know

The publication laws of Texas are many. Few attorneys are familiar with all of them, and public officials charged with carrying out these laws may not have a detailed knowledge of them.

This series of articles calls attention to some of the publication laws so as to attract the interest of more citizens in the governmental units that they support with their tax dollars; and to inform government officials who may be in violation of these laws through unfamiliarity with them.

One of the provisions of the law is that the tax assessor and collector must by the first of April each year prepare the delinquent tax rolls of water control and improvement district.

Directors of the water control district must publish the delinquent tax rolls in a newspaper. The law says:

"Art. 7880-72. Water — publication of delinquent tax roll of water control and improvement district.

The tax assessor and collector shall on or before the first of April each year prepare a delinquent tax roll, showing all charges upon the tax rolls which have not been paid and file same with directors of said district. The directors shall publish said delinquent tax list showing name of owner, description of property, and total amount due, in a newspaper published in the county where said district or any part thereof is situated. Said notice shall be published once a week for two weeks. If no newspaper is published in the county said notice may be published in a newspaper outside of the county. There shall be paid to the newspaper for publishing such notice a reasonable fee fixed by agreement, not to exceed, however, twenty cents

for each rendition or each tract of land, allowing not to exceed three lines single column thereto. The publisher of such notice shall file in the office of the district a copy of each issue of the paper containing said notice with affidavit of publication attached thereto. The notice herein provided for to be made by publication is intended to be for the information of all taxpayers and shall not be, or held to be, a requisite to the filing of any suit for the collection of taxes and such suits may be filed without publishing such notice."

The Draft Law

(Editor's note: This is one of a series of 10 short articles on the draft law and its rules and regulations.)

How does a local draft board consider a draft registrant's case when it comes before the board in the manner governed by law and regulations?

The members of a board sit around a table and the file containing the man's papers are placed before it by the clerk.

The board then considers the man from the following standpoints, based on information in the file:

1. Is he on active duty in the military service? (1-C.)
2. Is he a conscientious objector who has been ordered to a civilian job? (1-W.)
3. Is he too old for service under the law? (5-A.)
4. Can it be determined at the board level whether he is physically, mentally, or morally unfit for service? (4-F.)
5. Is he a minister of religion or a divinity student? (4-D.)
6. Is he subject to exemption as an alien? (4-C.)
7. Is he a public official deferred by the law? (4-B.)
8. Is he a World War II veteran as defined by the law? (4-A.)
9. Is he subject to deferment because of his dependents? (3-A.)
10. Is he eligible for deferment as a member of the armed forces reserve or a student taking military training? (1-D.)
11. Is he a student in a college or a university deferrable under local board authority? (2-S.)
12. Does he meet the requirements for farm or other civilian job deferment? (2-C and 2-A, respectively.)
13. Is he a college or high school student subject to deferment by law for a short period? (1-S.)

If the evidence in the file indicates to the satisfaction of the local board that he is eligible for none of these, then the registrant

is considered available for military service. (1-A.)

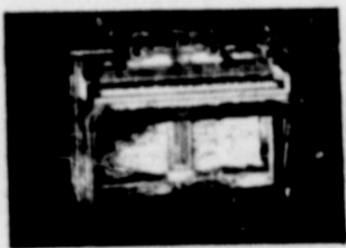
