Little League Teams Remain In Tight Deadlock

Everybody Even With Season's End Only 2 Weeks Away

With just two weeks remaining in the season, the four teams composing the Ozona Little League are deadlocked again this week, each with two games won and two games lost for a 500-all.

The evenly matched race is for the second half championship and a chance to play against the Ozona Oil Co., first half winner, for the season championship.

After tonight's game, which will see the Ozona Oil Co. vs South Texas Lumber and Kyle Kleiners vs Spencer & Stevens, the teams will have two more weeks of play, four games each, to the close of regular season play, July 23.

Bobby Sutton, 12-year-old Ozona Oil Co. hurler and leading batter, continues to lead the league in all departments. He leads in the home run department with a total of 6, is the leading three-base hitter with 3, leads with 13 two-base blows and with the most runs scored, 33. Bobby is at the top of the heap in batting averages too with a sizzling .650 average, and leads all other pitchers in the league with a perfect average of 4 games won and none lost.

Other extra-base hitters in the high ranking slot are Donald McCaleb, Jimmy Freeman and Johnny Cooper with six two-baggers each, and in the total runs scored the next competitors are Johnny Jones with 23 and Jimmy Freeman with 21. Pitching records show Jimmy Freeman of Spencer-Stevens with 3 wins and one loss, Muggins Good of the same team with 3-1 and Pat Jones of the Oilers with 4 won and 2 lost.

The ten leading batters, all up ten times or more, with their percentages, follow:

Boys and girls attending the school are taking advantage of the trained leadership offered, with 44 capable workers directing activities. Mrs. Clarence Oster is superintendent of Nursery work. Wilkins, Smith Named Managers Of Swimming Pools

Contractors Estimate Pools Will Be Completed Next Week

Managers were selected, operating hours set and other details decided during the past week in preparation for opening of Ozona's two swimming pools.

Date the pools will be completed and ready for use, however, remained somewhat indefinite this week. Work was being speeded up in an effort to complete the pools by July 15, a representative of the contractors said, but whether or not this be accomplished depended on good luck and a continued full force of workmen.

Installation of filtration equipment was complete in both pools and laying of the tile rim and gutters, a slow finishing work, was about complete on the north pool and largely complete at the south pool. However, final interior plastering and finishing, installation of the underwater lighting system and much concrete work around the pools and bath houses, plus completion of the bath house and surrounding fencing remained to be done.

Larry Wilkins, high school football coach, has been named to manage the north pool and Corbett Smith, band instructor, will manage the south pool. Naming of life guards had not been completed.

The pools will be open from 7 to 9 a. m. for swimming instruction only. For swimmers, the pool will be open from 9 to 11 in the morning and from 3 in the afternoon to 9 in the evening. These open hours are experimental, county officials pointed out, and a close check on hourly use will be kept to guide the pool operators in determining the best hours for pool use.

Since both pools and surrounding area are without shade, the county plans to erect some form of shade which will be in harmony with the pools and surroundings. This project will be undertaken after the pools are completed by the contractors, however.

Midway Lane Field Extended To Southeast

Chambers School Land Producer by Tubbs-Gann Pumps

The Midway Lane 1300 field of Crockett County has been extended one location southeast on the south side with the completion of Tubbs-Gann Drilling Co. 2 Chambers County School Land for a daily pumping potential of 42.84 barrels of 34 gravity oil, no water, with a gas-oil ratio of less than 200-1.

Production was from open hole between 1,298 feet, where 7-inch casing was set, and 1,590 feet, the total depth. Plugged back total depth was 1,312 feet. Top of pay was picked at 1,300 feet, elevation unreported. Pay section was fractured with an unreported amount of fracture fluid.

Location is in 4-Chambers csl, 17 miles northwest of Ozona.

The Texas Railroad Commission has announced the designation of a new Crockett County field.

It will be the Dry Creek 1150 field. Discovery well is Harry J. Russell 1 Winnie Puckett Martin et al, finished July 1 for a daily pumping potential of 7.5 barrels of 31 gravity oil, plus 66 per cent water. Gas-oil ratio was too small to measure. Production was from a section between 1,149-161 feet in the Grayburg. Top of pay was picked at 1,149 feet on elevation of 2,526 feet.

Location is in 39-OP-GC&SF, nine miles northwest of Ozona.

4 Million Pounds Feed Ordered By Crockett Ranchers

First Shipment May Arrive This Week; Must Sign Forms

Ranchmen in drought seared Crockett county have placed orders for approximately 4,000,000 pounds (2,000 tons) of drought emergency feeds made available by the U. S. government from its stored grains and cottonseed feed products in a program designed to save a large segment of the livestock industry in the grip of a four-year drought.

This was the announcement yesterday at the local P.M.A. office where orders are being received and dispatched after approval by a committee composed of members of the county ACA committee, the county agent, a local banker and another ranchman. Added to the local committee were Wayne West, banker, and Boyd Clayton, ranchman.

The first shipment of the emergency feed was expected this week at Barnhart. Mrs. Mary Dunlap, PMA executive officer, said. The first orders were placed last Friday by long distance telephone. Other orders are being processed and sent in.

Application forms, prepared at state headquarters, were received by the local office yesterday and orders previously turned in by ranchmen were being transcribed to these required forms. Mrs. Dunlap asks all ranchmen who placed orders prior to Wednesday to come to the PMA office and sign the application blanks. This will be required before delivery can be made.

As in the case of the hay program, ranchmen are being limited to one-month supply of feedstuffs. Numbers of basic livestock are listed on the application forms and normal feeding rates are used to determine quantities.

Ranchmen may buy cottonseed meal or pellets, corn, oats or wheat. Cottonseed products are being offered ranchmen in the drought emergency area at \$35 a ton, corn at \$1 a bushel, oats at 50 cents per bushel and wheat at \$1.10 per bushel.

Cottonseed meal is available in large quantities for immediate shipment, state headquarters has advised, but saw a possible delay in shipment of cake due to the necessity for processing. A good supply of corn and oats is available in the midwestern states and shipment can be made immediately, it was further advised. A good supply of wheat is said available within the state.

Equitable allotments of feeds, in smaller lots in many cases than original orders specify, are being made of arriving feed. Balances on orders will be supplied in later shipments.

LET'S TALK LIVESTOCK BY TED GOULDY



Fort Worth — Movement of livestock around the major market circle Monday was 25,000 cattle short of a week ago and for the first time in many weeks the offering was below the comparable day a year ago. At Fort Worth, however, the cattle receipts were some 1,400 above a year ago, and calf receipts were 500 below a year ago. The beef buying program launched by the government last week with purchase of 3,495,000 pounds of beef and gravy and 126,000 pounds of frozen boneless beef will require some 25,000 to 30,000 cattle per week to satisfy their demand for ten million pounds of

beef per week. While this program has not been underway long enough to be felt in the trade, it was deemed certain to have a beneficial effect.

The buying side was aggressive Monday at Fort Worth. Fat calves were in keen demand, and butchers and packers took most of the offerings that were fat, leaving stocker buyers a relatively small percentage. Cows were another 25 to 50 cents higher. Compared with ten days ago, most cattle and calves are about \$3 higher, with some spots \$4 to \$5 over the low time ten days or two week ago. Fat steers were the exception, and selling steady with a week ago. Stockers and killers shared the better market for calves.

Good and choice fat calves \$16.21.00; common and medium \$10.00 to 16.00; culls \$7.00-10.00. Good and choice fed steers and yearlings \$17.00-23.00; with common and medium kinds \$10.00-17.00, and ratty yearlings \$7.00-9.00. Fat cows drew \$9.50-13.50, and canners and cutters \$6.00-9.50. Bulls cashed at \$7.00-14.00.

Good and choice stocker steer calves drew \$13.00-17 and stocker steer yearlings bulked at \$10.16.00. Stocker cows cashed at \$8.00 to \$11.00.

Good and choice fat lambs drew \$18.00-23.50, and common, medium and good lambs sold from \$10.00 to \$18.00. Culls sold from \$6.00-10.00. Feeder lambs cashed at \$10.14.00. Fat yearlings drew \$10.10 to \$14.00, and feeder yearlings cashed at \$10.00 down. Cull yearlings \$6.00-8.00, old wethers sold at \$6.00-8.00. Two-year-olds sold from \$7.00-10.00. Slaughter ewes drew \$3.50-4.50. Breeder ewes drew \$5.00-6.00. Old bucks \$2.00-2.50.

Hogs held to the season's highs. Top hogs drew \$26.00-26.25. Sows were steady at \$19.00-22.50. Pigs drew \$20.00 down.

THE ONLY WAY

The Sixteenth Amendment to the Constitution which became effective in 1913 and gave the federal government the power to lay a direct tax on the incomes of the people, was the seed from which the socialistic welfare state idea grew in this country. Actually, not one of us has a constitutional right remaining to one penny of our income.

The unlimited power to tax the incomes of the people revised the basic concept of government on which our republic is founded. It made government master of the people, rather than their servant.

Most of us, still startled by the tremendous chunks of our income that went to pay federal taxes last year, begin to agree with the idea that the only way to prevent confiscatory taxation is to now limit, by Constitutional Amendment, the income taxing power of government. This is the only way we can hope to preserve representative government and a free economy.

Relief will never come from tax collectors but only through changes forced by taxpayers.

The Draft Law

(Editor's note: This is one of a series of 10 short articles on the draft law and its rules and regulations.)

Any young married man regis-
 tered with a draft board had bet-
 ter be on the alert about any ex-
 pected additions to his family. If
 his wife is expecting their first
 child, it is to his interest to tell
 the board about it immediately.

As long as he has only a wife
 to support, he's as eligible for a
 hitch in the Army as a single man.
 When he has a child in his family,
 or one has been conceived and not
 as yet born, the law provides for
 his deferment, provided he tells
 the board about it before he is or-
 dered for induction.

Draft regulations require that
 a man with an unborn child be
 deferred if he files with his board,
 prior to the time his induction or-
 der is mailed, certificate of a li-
 censed physician that a child has
 been conceived.

If he does not take this highly
 necessary step and the draft board
 sends him an order to report for
 induction, then the draft board
 has no authority to defer him on
 the basis of the unborn child, Brig
 Gen. Paul L. Wakefield, state draft
 director, points out.

Neither does the state draft
 headquarters or the national draft
 headquarters have authority to in-
 terfere with his induction under
 such circumstances. Draft regu-
 lations would have to be amended
 to permit consideration of his de-
 ferment solely because of the un-
 born child.

Afterward, the law requires a
 man to report birth of children into
 his family, just as it requires
 him to provide the local board at
 all times with his latest change of
 address.
