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Feed Deliveries Continue Despite Pauper' Ruling

Local Committee Interprets All Ranchers Need Cheap Feed

Deliveries of feed to Crockett county ranchmen under the government drought relief program continued this week despite an ambiguous directive from the Department of Agriculture, relayed through the state drought relief committee, which in effect would limit eligibility to purchase the cheaper feed to those livestock raisers who were financially unable to buy feed through regular market channels to maintain their herds.

The new directive caused considerable uneasiness among members of the local drought relief committee administering the program, as it did among committees throughout the designated disaster area. Protests were written and read to all agencies, including Washington officials, and the Crockett county committee was among many lodging such protests.

However, the local committee is interpreting the directive as virtually having no effect on operation of the program. Four years of drought and a continuing livestock feeding program has placed almost all ranchmen in the category of being "financially unable to buy feed through regular market channels to maintain their herds in a satisfactory manner," even though they still may be able to borrow money to operate or even they still have cash money. The trend between livestock prices and feed prices (through regular market channels) would make it difficult to argue successfully that an operator was "financially unable" to continue to feed without access to the cheaper feeds, the local committee reasoned.

Ambiguity of the directive was heightened by the fact that it applied the feed program to cattle only, falling to mention sheep or goats. However, sheep and goats are specifically included in the original announced plan and this oversight was being interpreted as such, and feed for sheep and goats continued to flow. Meanwhile, the government subsidized feeds, being sold at reduced prices to ranchmen in a designated drought disaster area, continued to flow into county. Several carloads already been delivered at the market, where unloading and feeding facilities have been arranged by the local PMA committee. Feeds are being delivered from Barnhart rail cars to ranchers by truck.

August 1 New Estimated Pool Opening Date

Still indefinite because workmen were unable to give an exact date when various finishing jobs would be completed, a new tentative opening date for Ozona's two swimming pools has been set for August 1, according to available information this morning.

Both pools proper were completed during the past week and filled with water. However, power was not immediately available to supply the pumps to operate the recirculating and filtration systems. A West Texas Utilities Co. construction crew arrived here Wednesday morning, however, and the completion of lines and setting of transformers was expected in a matter of a few more hours.

Meanwhile, finishing work around the pools, concrete walks and deck area, painting and finishing bath houses, installation of plumbing fixtures and electrical equipment was being rushed. Before the pools can be finally completed, county machinery must be moved in to fill with dirt the surrounding area to bring the ground up to pool levels. Then fences around the pool areas can be completed.

Plans were being discussed early in the week for a formal opening program when the pools are completed. Plans are to bring a diving team here from Goodfellow Field in San Angelo or from Reese AFB at Lubbock to put on a diving demonstration at both pools as a part of the opening festivities.

The completed pools, filled with water, plus some night work by construction crews, have proved irresistible attractions for hundreds of Ozonans and some of the youngsters have succumbed to the lure of the blue waters and are said to have wet bathing suits while workmen were looking the other way.

Fire Alarm To Stop Traffic At Light

Hereafter when the fire siren sounds, traffic will be stopped at the downtown intersection of Highways 290 and 163 by means of the signal light.

Installation of a switch, controlled from the telephone office, was completed this week. When a fire alarm is turned in to the telephone office, the operator will close the switch controlling the light at the same time she starts the fire siren and notifies the fire department of the location of the fire.

The light will turn red in all directions and remain so until all fire trucks have passed the corner and will then be switched back to normal operation.

Stopping of traffic at the intersection for safe passage of fire trucks will eliminate a hazard which has been apparent since installation of the signal light. The traffic will be stopped at the intersection with every alarm, although the trucks may go in a different direction.

Motorists are asked not to drive too near or into the intersection on these occasions, thus giving fire trucks enough room to pass in any direction without risking a smash-up.

Ozona Service Man Assigned To Famous 508th Airborne Team

FORT BENNING, GA. — Adrian A. Haire son of Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Haire of Ozona, Texas, was newly assigned to Company B of the 508th Airborne Regimental Combat Team one of only two airborne Regimental Combat teams in the Army.

Haire, a Rifleman, was previously a student of the airborne school at Fort Benning, Georgia.

The mission of the 508th is to train for and maintain combat effectiveness of the troops in its command. One of the most decorated outfits of World War II, troopers of the Red Devil regiment are authorized to wear the Presidential Unit Citation and French fourragere for campaigns at Normandy, Ardenne, Central Europe and the Rhineland.

Penn. Flow Logged In Crockett Strike

Flow of oil from the crinoidal of the Pennsylvanian has been reported for Continental Oil Co. 2-27 University, one location north and west of production in the Elkhorn (Ellenburger) field of Crockett County.

The flow came on a 1½-hour drillstem test between 7,000-65 feet. Gas surfaced in four minutes, mud in 27 minutes. The project then flowed 31 barrels of oil in one hour. Flowing pressure was 625 pounds, and 15-minute shut-in pressure was 2,200 pounds.

The project was drilling ahead.

Man Fined On Assault Charge After Attack On Father-In-Law

Manuel Camarillo was fined \$25 and costs in justice court here Tuesday morning on a charge of assault.

Camarillo was charged with a knife attack on his father-in-law Juan Longoria, and Trine Castillo, cousin of Camarillo's. The fracas occurred at the Longoria home. Longoria suffered a knife wound across the abdomen which extended from side to side, Sheriff V. O. Earnest reported. Fortunately the cut was not deep and Longoria's condition is good. Castillo, who attempted to restrain Camarillo, suffered a deep cut on the arm.

Ranch Couple Suffer Harrowing Experience In Electrical Storm

It was a harrowing experience but fortunately it was a happy ending, for no real injuries or damage resulted, when members of the James Baggett family were knocked about and cut by flying glass from an exploding electric light bulb in a hide-and-seek game with a terrific electrical storm which struck at the ranch headquarters Tuesday night.

Boiling thunderstorm clouds were approaching from two directions and lightning was bouncing around as thunder in a continuous roll added to the eerie effects. Mrs. Baggett reported. James had gone to the newly built chicken house, where 700 young pullets are being fed for layers, to close opening to protect the chickens. Two Baggett children, Sally and Jimmy, were on a bed reading by the light of an electric lamp.

The light bulb suddenly exploded in the children's faces, spewing bits of broken glass, and at the same time all lights in the house went off. The children were screaming and Mrs. Baggett could not locate a candle or flashlight. She felt blood on the children's faces.

In the meantime, Mr. Baggett was having his own troubles at the chicken house. The electrically charged air had sent him sprawling to the ground twice while he was attempting to close the chicken house. By that time he figured he had had enough and had better see what was happening at the house. He arrived, with a flashlight, and the children were examined. Jimmy had suffered a number of small cuts about the face and Sally had been cut on the leg by flying glass from the exploding light bulb, but the injuries were not serious.

But those few harrowing moments in the pitch dark with two screaming children had all but fitted Mrs. Baggett for a hospital bed, but relief at finding their injuries only minor proved tonic enough to restore her.

New Drive-In Theatre Damaged By High Wind

Torrential Rainfall Floods Area North Of Ozona

High winds, possibly a small twister, wrecked the screen of Ozona's two-weeks old drive-in theatre, the Triangle, a mile north of town in a late afternoon thunderstorm which struck Ozona and vicinity Wednesday. Damage to the theatre was estimated at \$7,000 by W. V. Adwell, owner.

The thunderstorm, which rode in from a mountainous thunderhead that built up across the north from early afternoon, dumped a torrential rain on the Bill Baggett, R. L. Flowers C. O. Walker and Dick Henderson ranch lands in the area and north. Floodwaters poured across the new Highway to Big Lake which turns off from Highway 163 at the drive-in.

Floodwaters built up a considerable lake in the triangle on the north side of the highway, across from the theatre, and water pouring across the highway and thru the flume under it added to the damage to the theatre entrance driveway.

High winds struck Ozona, bringing a cloud of dust which, in some areas of the town, produced almost darkness. The winds were almost gale strength but lasted only a short time, and aside from a few broken tree limbs, no damage was reported in the town.

The dust was soon washed out of the skies by light rain in the city. A heavy fall was reported on the Chas. E. Davidson and W. E. Friend ranches east of Ozona and areas to the south received more spotted showers. Ranches in the extreme southern and eastern sections of the county received up to two inches of moisture in the Tuesday afternoon thunderstorm activity, according to reports.

Shallow Wildcat Spotted On W. R. Baggett Ranch

Midland Operator to Drill Seven Miles Northwest of Ozona

Harry J. Russell, of Midland, has spotted his W. R. Baggett of a 2,000-foot cable tool wildcat seven miles northwest of Ozona in Crockett County.

Operations will begin immediately.

Location, on a 355-acre tract, is 2,310 feet from the north and 330 feet from the east lines of 56-OP-GC&SF, two miles south and slightly west of the same operator's I Martin, discovery well of the Dry Creek 1150 (Grayburg) field. The discovery was completed July 1 for a daily pumping potential of 7.5 barrels of 31 gravity oil plus 66 per cent water through perforations between 1,149-61 feet.

The new project is also two miles east of the Pure-Bean field. Continental Oil Co. 2-27 University, indicated Crockett county crinoidal of the Pennsylvanian discovery located ¼ mile north and west of the Ellenburger production in the Elkhorn field of Crockett county, recovered 1,350 feet of gas-cut mud, no water, on a one-hour drillstem test between 7,103-68 feet in the Ellenburger.

The project was drilling below 7,170 feet in lime and chert.

WHO CAN AFFORD TO FEED?

We wonder if folks in Pakistan were asked to sign a pauper's oath before receiving U. S. wheat as a gift from our government. We wonder if the East Germans had to make a financial statement before receiving the American food that was rushed to them when they began to riot against their Russian masters. We wonder if only the penniless of the world will receive the five and a half billion dollars in "foreign aid" recently appropriated.

One of the most absurd directives ever to come out of the Washington mill which manufactures the world's top absurdities was the one of the past week declaring in effect that those livestock raisers who are flat broke can buy government owned feed (acquired under a support program which has kept the price of feed up, with no corresponding support for livestock prices) at drought relief reduced prices.

The program was designed in the first place to save foundation herds and flocks, which were be-

ing liquidated because ranchmen, the rich ones and the broke ones alike, were selling off because they could no longer afford to feed them the high priced, government supported feed. Whether a producer has a bank full of money or is borrowing to the hilt makes little difference — neither can afford to feed a cow \$100 worth of feed and get a \$40 calf or a ewe \$15 to get a \$5 lamb — not for long, anyhow, and be able to feed himself and his family at the same time.

SHOPPING IN WARSAW

When you walk into an American retail store, whether it be in one of our great cities or a small town, you take it for granted that a wide and attractive selection of dependable merchandise will be offered to you, at prices which are well within the means of most people.

The contrast with stores in communist countries, where the government owns or bosses everything and competition in our sense of the term is non-existent, is incredible.

U.S. News & World Report recently described the prices charged for representative commodities in Warsaw, where communism reigns supreme. In terms of U.S. money, shoes are priced at \$231.25 a pair, a girl's sweater costs \$187; bathing trunks carry an \$85 price tag; and ordinary leather brief case commands \$200. The cheapest brandy costs \$48 a bottle, horse meat retails at \$1.50 a pound and beef is \$3 to \$5 a pound.

Some skilled workers in Poland get good wages — a tractor driver can earn as much as \$400 a month.

But it would take all his wages for about two weeks to buy a pair of shoes.

Next time you hear someone extolling the virtues of big, all-powerful government at the expense of free enterprise, remember these figures.

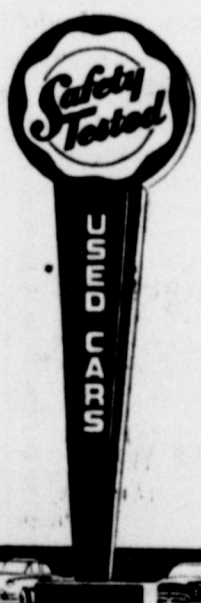

Fort Worth — Strong point of the market Monday at Fort Worth was the demand for calves. Both stocker and feeder buyers and the packer buyers were competing strongly for the supply and the result was a strong to \$1 higher market. Both replacement and fat calves topped at \$20 to \$21 on Monday and were considered quotable over that in load lots of the proper kinds.

Cows were uneven, selling on steady to easier basis, with prices about in line with last week's close. Bulls were off \$1 per hundred.

Very small numbers of fat steers and yearlings arrived, and grain-

fed were very scarce. Some broadening inquiry is noted for suitable feeders and indications are that sizable numbers of these fleshly grassers and supplementally fed steers and yearlings will wind up in feedlots.

Sheep and lambs were fully steady. Fat lambs topped at \$22 to \$23.50, and feeders drew \$12 to \$16.50, and were quotable to \$17 or better in loads and of suitable quality and weights.

Fat cows drew \$10.50 to \$14, while canners and cutters drew \$6.50 to \$10.50. Bulls sold for \$8 to \$14.

Good and choice fat calves sold from \$17 to \$21, and common and

medium butcher calves drew \$12 to \$16. Cull sorts sold from \$8 to \$12.

Good and choice stocker calves sold from \$16 to \$21, and plain to medium sorts sold at \$12 to \$16. Good and choice stocker steer yearlings sold from \$15 to \$18.50, and heifer calves drew \$19 down, and heifer yearlings sold from \$16.50 down. Stocker cows cashed at \$10 to \$16.

Good and choice fat lambs sold at \$20 to \$23.50, while cull, and medium offerings sold for \$8 to \$18. Stockers and feeders drew \$10 to \$16.50. Fat yearlings sold at \$12 to \$15, and feeder yearlings sold at \$10 to \$12. Slaughter ewes \$3.50-5.50, stocker ewes \$6.00-9.00. Old wethers \$6.00-9.00 yearlings ewes \$13.00 down Two-yr.-olds \$10. down.

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So the People May Know

Cities and counties are required to advertise for bids before making any contract calling for expenditure of more than \$2,000. Texas publication law state: "Art. 2368a. Commissioners Court — advertising for bids on contracts requiring expenditure in excess of \$2,000.00. "Sec. 2. No county, acting through its Commissioners Court, and no city in this state shall hereafter make any contract calling for or requiring the expenditure or payment of more than (\$2,000.00) Dollars or more out of any fund or funds of any city or county or any subdivision of any county creating or imposing an obligation or liability of any nature or character upon such county or any subdivision of such county, or upon such city, without first submitting such proposed contract to competitive bids. Notice of the time and place when and where such contracts shall be let shall be published in such county (if concerning a county contract or contracts for such subdivision of such county) and in such city (if concerning a city contract) once a week for two (2) consecutive weeks prior to the same set for letting such contract, the date of the first publication to be at least fourteen (14) days prior to the date for letting said contract; and said contract shall be let to the lowest responsible bidder. "Provided, however, that the provisions of this Act shall not apply to counties having a population of more than three hundred fifty thousand (350,000) inhabitants according to the last preceding or any future Federal Census."
