Thinks Galveston Has No Right to Ask It.

Beaumont, Texas, Nov. 27.—Hon. S. B. Cooper of this city, Representative in the lower house of the national Congress, from the Second Texas district, left tonight for Washington. Mr. Cooper is a member of the Ways and Means Committee of the House.

“On the question of a seawall for Galveston I shall not favor it. I am not a seawall man, and I think it is entirely out of the province of the national Government expending one cent toward the protection of one city more than another against destruction by Providence. I shall favor protecting Galveston as enthusiastically as

I will favor protecting Woodville or any other city, but no more so. I have always been and am yet an enthusiastic supporter of Texas improvement, but protecting one city against storms and leaving every other place in Texas subject to the direful effects of the recent visitation of the elements is contrary to my views of justice. Everything Galveston needs from the Government it should have and I shall lend my assistance toward getting it, but there is no more justice in it than for reimbursing a man for the destruction of his gin by fire or storm.

“In a word, the upbuilding of the port of Galveston and every port on the Gulf Coast will be my aim, and I shall not discriminate in favor of one for the other.”

Washington, Nov. 27.—Texas pop-
ulation is placed at 3,048,710, an in-
crease of 193,187 since 1890. Per
cent of increase 36.3. Harris county
shows greatest increase, Dallas being
in sixth place.

The Texas counties showing the
greatest increase are Harris, 26,537;
McLennan, 20,568; Bexar, 20,156; El-
lis, 18,285; Navarro, 18,001; Dallas,
14,584; Hunt, 15,415; Milam, 14,893;
Hill, 13,773; Collins, 13,351; Fannin,
13,004; Galveston, 12,640; William-
son, 12,163; Bell, 12,158; Kaufman,
11,778; Johnson, 11,566; Lamar, 11,
325; Tarrant, 11,234; Limestone, 10,
895; Grayson, 10,450; Travis, 10,063;
El Paso, 9,208.
