SCS Board's Action Governed By Survey Report Findings

If the preliminary survey report is complete by that time, Crockett county's application for watershed assistance in constructing f'ood control dams on the watershed of Johnson Draw will be approved or rejected at the next meeting of the State Soil Conservation Board, to be held in Crockett, Texas, May 12.

"The next meeting of the State Board will be at Crockett, Texvised the local board chairman in the letter. "The final disposition of your petition for watershed assistance will be made if the preliminary survey report has been completed. The board's approval or disapproval will be based entirely on this report.
