Record Number of 4-H Feeders Vie For Show Honors

Some Good Prospects For Major Show Winners In Lineup

Crockett County 4-H club members met recently for an organizational meeting, the first for the 1955-56 year, and elected officers and adult leaders.

Electing unanimously, Carl Conkling became the club president for the third straight year. Erby Chandler was elected vice-president; Tommie Sue Chandler, secretary; Brock Jones, reporter; Jackie Williams, song leader; and Miss Carolyn Friend as 4-H club sweetheart. Benny Newton and Mrs. H. C. Skelke, Jr., were selected as adult leaders.

A record number of 4-H club members started a record number of livestock on feeding projects this year, County Agent Pete Jacoby reported. Forty-one boys and girls placed on feed some 350 head of sheep and six calves. Sheep numbers consisted of around 75 head of registered Rambouillet which will give the Crockett County Show one of the largest registered Rambouillet Junior Breeding shows in the state. Some 260 mutation lambs and 15 commercial ewe lambs were placed on feed. The mutation lambs include 25 Southdowns, 90 cross-breds and 145 fine-wool lambs.

"We have some outstanding prospects for major show winners in all classes of livestock this year," county agent Jacoby stated, "and so far most of the projects are coming along in fine style and all the kids are doing a fine job of feeding," he added.

Don and Betty Jack Cooper, who recently moved to Crockett County from Pecos County, set the pace for the local calf feeders. They recently showed their calves at the Pecos County Show and Don took the championship and Betty Jack the reserve champion. Three of their lightweight calves will be exhibited at the county show, one of these being the Pecos County Champion. To give them some competition will be Jackie and Billy Troy Williams and Carl Conkling with a calf each.

Heavy Flow From San Andres Reported In Stanolind Strike

Flowing San Andres production has been established at Stanolind Oil & Gas Co. No. 1-BY University, Crockett County project in 10-50-University, 1 1/2 miles southeast of the Farmers (San Andres) field and 27 miles northwest of Ozona.

The well flowed oil for an unreported time at the rate of 15 barrels per hour through a 20-64-inch choke and perforations between 2,577-586 feet. Testing continued.

The project is bottomed at 2,700 feet in lime.

Continental Oil Co. of Midland has filed application to drill its No. 8-C C. T. Harris, as a one location northeast steep to production in the World West (Strawn) field of Crockett County, 13 miles south of Texon.

The project will be drilled with rotary to 8,300 feet.

Location, on a 1,429-acre lease, is 660 feet from the south and 3,347 feet from the east lines of 1-BB-2-N. A. Miller survey.

P. T. A. Approves School Projects

Ozona P. T. A. met Monday at 7:30 p. m. in the new school cafeteria. At the business meeting, presided over by Mrs. Ele Hagelstein, the project committee, headed by Mrs. C. O. Walker, recommended that the group donate \$100 to the North Elementary library, \$250 for a spot light for the high school auditorium, and \$400 for a music system for the cafeteria dining room. The report was approved unanimously.

The room prize was awarded to Miss Adrienne Foote's fifth grade. Following the business session, the Firemen's Band presented a program. Coffee and pie were served from the cafeteria kitchen.

Negro Ranch Hand Indicted In Slaying Of Woman Companion

Raymond Henderson Phillips, 28 negro ranch worker, was indicted for murder with malice here Wednesday by a 112th district court grand jury in connection with the fatal shooting on October 1 of Mrs. Robbie Lou Roseman, 22, described by Phillips as his commonlaw wife.

Phillips brought the woman's body to the Crockett County hospital where she was pronounced dead on arrival. She had been shot once through the chest with a 22 rifle. Phillips first told Sheriff V. O. Earnest that he had found the woman mortally wounded in the back yard of their home on the John Dublin ranch, 29 miles north of Ozona. Later he changed his story and said that the shooting was accidental and still later, Sheriff Earnest said, confessed that he had shot the woman, but claimed in self defense.

Judge Jim C. Langdon told court attaches here Wednesday that it will probably be January before Phillips can be brought to trial.

Stanolind University Wildcat Recovers Show Hoover Tests Spotted

Stanolind Oil & Gas Co. No. 1-BY University of Texas, Crockett County wildcat in 10-50-University, 1 1/2 miles southeast of the Farmers (San Andres) field, 27 miles northwest of Ozona, logged shows of oil and gas on a drillstem test in the San Andres between 2,587-700 feet.

On the one hour and 45-minute test, gas surfaced in 45 minutes. Recovery was 200 feet of heavily oil and gas-cut mud and 200 feet of water and gas-cut mud.

The project was bottomed at 2,700 feet in lime, preparing to run casing.

Texita Oil Co. and W. L. Dugger Jr., five filed application to drill two location south steepouts to the Shannon (San Andres) field of Crockett County, 30 miles northwest of Ozona.

The projects, on a 120 - acre lease, will be drilled to 2,500 feet with rotary.

The No. 1-A. A. C. Hoover, is 1,320 feet from the north and 330 feet from the west lines of 17-1-GC&SF. Elevation is 2,510 feet.

The No. 2-A A. C. Hoover is 1,320 feet from the north and 1,263 feet from the west lines of 17-1-GC&SF.

Deep Crockett Wildcat Recovers Oil; Location For Test West Of Ozona

A deep Crockett wildcat recovered oil Monday and location was scheduled for a shallow wildcat.

A discovery has been indicated in Crockett County with the recovery of oil and shows of oil and gas on a drillstem test at Texas Pacific Coal & Oil Co. No. 1-M University, in 36-12-University, two miles west of the Weger (San Andres) field and 12 miles southwest of Big Lake.

On the 2 1/2-hour test in the Fusselman and Simpson between 9,370-9,579 feet, recovery was 1,200 feet of heavily oil and gas-cut mud and 1/2-pint of free oil. Flowing pressure was 400-600 pounds; 30-minute shut-in pressure, 2,900 pounds.

Operator drilled to 9,665 feet and then cored from 9,665-97 feet. Operator was trying to loosen a stuck drillpipe at the latest report.

Treboli Oil Co. and E. G. Rodman, Odessa, have filed application to drill a 2,000-foot cable tool wildcat, 14 miles west of Ozona. It will be drilled as the 1-D University.

Estimated elevation is 2,600 feet.

Location, on a 640-acre lease, is 530 feet from the north and 990 feet from the west lines of 10-31-University.

The prospector is three miles southeast of the Howard Draw field and 1/2-mile east of Humble & Continental No. 1-V University, 9,705-foot failure, plugged and abandoned Nov. 16, 1953. The San Andres was topped at 1,770 feet on elevation of 2,597 feet.

First Meals In New Cafeteria Served Tuesday

300 Students Eat In New Facility; More In Lower Grades

First meals from Ozona's new school cafeteria, one of the finest equipped of its kind in the state, were served to from 400 to 500 students of all grades at noon Tuesday when the cafeteria opened its doors for the first time.

In the cafeteria itself, approximately 250 students of the high school and junior high school filled through the serving chutes to receive trays bearing smothered steaks, mashed potatoes with cream gravy, green beans, lettuce and tomato salad, California plums apricot cobbler and fresh milk — all deliciously prepared by the crew of expert cooks assembled by Mrs. Gus Maxwell, cafeteria manager.

Panel trucks, with specially designed equipment, transported the steaming food to the North and South Elementary schools where other helpers served trays to the smaller children.

Even though all employees were new and the students unfamiliar with the procedure, the first day's serving went off without a hitch, and all students had time to eat and make it back to classes. The second day from ten to fifteen minutes was sliced off the serving time and Mrs. Maxwell predicts that as her crew gains experience, the students will be served almost as fast as they arrive.

In the cafeteria kitchen, Mrs. Paul Gibbs is meat cook, Mrs. Allie Armentrout, pastry cook, Mrs. Homer Good and Mrs. Charles Galbraith, vegetables and Mrs. G. E. Bingham, bread cook. In charge of serving at the South Elementary is Mrs. L. E. Carlman and at the North Elementary, Mrs. J. B. Cushing.

Woman Correspondent To United Nations Is Speaker In Meet Here

Miss Elizabeth Fox, publicity director at Southwestern University, Georgetown, and an accredited correspondent at the United Nations since its organization in 1945, spoke to a large audience of Ozona residents and out-of-town guests Wednesday morning in the fellowship hall of the Methodist Church. Miss Fox's talk was sponsored by the Woman's Society of Christian Service and she was introduced by the Society president, Mrs. S. M. Harvick.

Miss Fox recounted many of the humorous and educational experiences she has had while a correspondent at the U. N. from the 1945 Conference in San Francisco when the organization was born to its most recent sessions in New York which she has been attending, returning to Texas only last Monday.

The speaker explained the stated purpose of the U. N. to "prevent war and to build a better world for all peoples, through collective resistance to aggression and through fighting hunger, ignorance and discrimination." She stated that it is not a world government capable of imposing taxes on people of the United States and other nations, but she pointed out that the United States pays one-third of the annual U. N. budget of 47 million dollars.

A wool blanket, made at the woolen mill in Eldorado, was presented to Miss Fox by Mrs. Harvick, as a token of the Society's appreciation for her talk. Miss Fox also addressed the students of Ozona schools in the high school auditorium Wednesday morning.

Powerful Sonora Bronchos To Open Dist. Race Here

Ozona Lions Will Test Strength Of Defending Champions

The unbeaten Ozona Lions will open their 1955 district season at Lion Stadium Friday night when they meet the defending champions, the Sonora Bronchos. Kick-off time will be 7:30 p. m.

Sonora will open its third defense with a veteran team paced by the great George Johnson and will be rated as a three touchdown favorite over the Lions of Coach Fred Hickman.

One of the largest crowds in recent Ozona history is expected, and to provide additional seating the Ozona High school has borrowed some moveable bleachers from Sonora. Ozona school officials sent 500 adult and 200 student tickets to Sonora early in the week in order to better accommodate the expected ticket rush.

The Sonora team will boast a 19-pound to the man edge in the line but the backfields will be about equal in average size. Sonora's line will average about 178 pounds to the man while the Lions will tip the scales at about 159 pounds to the man.

Even though veteran football fans have long since forgotten about comparing scores it is worthy of mention that neither team has played an unusually rough schedule and that with mutual opponents there has been no decided difference in the results.

Against Rankin, Sonora was able to pile a big lead in the second half and win handily while Ozona had to score in the fourth period to break a tie and win. However, against Iraan Ozona ran up a 59 to 0 score where Sonora did not score until just before the half and finally wound up with a rather dull 26 to 0 win.

The 1954 and 1955 Ozona-Sonora contests resulted in one sided Sonora wins and with most of the 1954 Sonora team returning it is hard to figure an Ozona victory. Coach Fred Hickman's 1955 Lions have shown a strong offense and it is not expected that the Sonora defense, even with its size, will be able to completely stymie the Lions but on the other hand Coaches Hickman and Cleere have been using every method they know to bolster up the Ozona defense which sagged badly against Rankin and which has as yet not faced such a runner as Johnson.

The clash is expected to match two powerful offenses which can operate both on the ground and in the air. The Lions have been reluctant to pass this season but showed clearly that they can move in the air when it just took three plays to move 56 yards for the winning marker against the improving Rankin eleven.

Both squads will go into the contest in good physical condition with only minor injuries dotting the squads at present.

Crockett Fields Gain Three Extensions; Four New Projects Spotted

Crockett County fields gained three extenders and locations for four new tests.

The Farmers (San Andres) field has been extended one location south with completion of Slick Oil Co., Ltd. No. 2-A University, in 11-50-University, 18 miles north of Ozona.

It was completed for a daily flowing potential of 127.21 barrels of 31 gravity oil, with a trace of water, with gas-oil ratio 615-1.

The Farmers (San Andres) field has been extended one location east with completion of Hancock Oil Co. No. 1-B University, in 9-50-University, 8 1/2 miles southwest of Big Lake.

It was completed for a calculated, daily flowing potential of 161.4 barrels of 32.9 gravity oil, plus 2 per cent water, with gas-oil ratio 410-1.

The Wyatt field has been extended one location south and west with completion of Donald M. Oliver No. 6-A Todd, 20 miles northwest of Ozona.

It was completed for a daily pumping potential of 43.2 barrels of 30 gravity oil, no water, from open hole between 1,417 feet, where 7-inch casing was set, and 1,449

feet, the total depth. Pay section was fractured with an unreported amount.

Cities Service Oil Co. has filed application to drill the No. 2-D Shannon, 3/4-mile northwest of production in the World West (Strawn) field, 15 miles southwest of Big Lake.

It will be drilled to 8,400 feet with rotary. Estimated elevation is 2,830 feet. Operations were scheduled to begin Oct. 5.

Location, on a 640-acre lease, is 713 feet from the north and east lines of 20-Q-EL&RR.

Val-Carroll Oil Co., San Angelo, has filed application to drill the No. 2 J. S. Todd, one location west of production in the Todd (San Andres) field, 20 miles northwest of Ozona.

It will be drilled with cable tools to 2,000 feet. Elevation is 2,435

Location, on a 320-acre lease, is 990 feet from the south and 330 feet from the east lines of 6-WX-GC&SF.
