

FHA Emergency Loan Program Is Extended

The Farmers Home Administrabeen extended in Texas for the 1956 crop year, according to Walter T. McKay, the agency's State

McKay stated that authorization for the extension was given by Secretary of Agriculture Benson in keeping with the Department of emergency assistance measures where necessary.

Under the extension of the pro-December 31, 1956. Loans may be made in all counties in the State except in the 57 west Texas counties designated on September 15, 1955, for the Great Plains Special Credit Program.

During the fiscal year which ended June 30, 1955, emergency loans totaling more than \$33,000, 000.00 were made to Texas farmers and ranchers. Considering the prolonged drought conditions, collections on these loans are very good, McKay stated.

To be eligible for an emergency loan a farmer or rancher must be unable to obtain the crerdit he needs from any other source.






