## Hungry Lions Meet Rocksprings Here Friday Night

### Will Green Ozonans Have Dropped First Three Starts

The Ozona Lions will play host to Rocksprings at Davidson Memorial Gym Friday night as they seek their first victory of the season. The Lions will be unreeled with Pete Hickman's B team tipping off at 7 p. m. and Coach J. Pelto's A squad starting at 8 p. m. The Lions opened their practice season last week by taking two games at the hands of Lakeview in Friday night and Big Lake in Ozona Saturday night. In the first contest the Lions put up a surprising defense and despite their inability to shoot made a close contest of it before dropping a 39 to 31 contest. Bobby Martinez, one of the two starting Lion starters led the attack with 9 points followed by the other letterman Johnny Ramirez with 6.

For the Lakeview Chief Gene led the scoring with 14 points followed by Robert Gordon with 10. The Lions trailed 16 to 11 at the end of the first quarter and then things slowed down a bit with the halftime score being 22 to 15. The Lions gained additional ground in the third quarter when they were outscored 6 to 6 but finished strong by outscoring the Chiefs 10 to 8 and at the point pulling within five points of the winner.

## Joe Murray, Old Time Crockett Cowboy, Dies; Funeral Here Today

Another of the old time cowboys of the West fell from their fast-fading ranks with the death here at noon Wednesday of Joe Murray, 68, who spent most of his adult life in the saddle as a ranch hand, mostly working for Crockett county ranchmen. Mr. Murray died in the Crockett county hospital which he entered Nov. 24.

Born Joseph Dean Murray in Cotulla, Texas, on July 19, 1887, he had been a resident of this county for close to a half century. Many of the present day ranch owners and operators recall Joe Murray as a top cowhand on their father's ranches and many of them received valued training in handling stock as youths from him. He was employed on the Clay Adams ranch at the time of his death.

Funeral services will be held at 3 o'clock this afternoon at the graveside in Cedar Hill Cemetery, with Cody Funeral Home in charge of arrangements. Services will be conducted by J. E. L. Harrison, minister of the Church of Christ in Sonora and formerly of Ozona, assisted by Jim Ferguson, minister of the Ozona Church of Christ.

## Shortage Of Men May Delay Patrol Station In Ozona

### Director Garrison Explains Situation In Letter to Senator

Prospects for the stationing of a Highway Patrol unit in Ozona are dim for anytime within the immediate future because of a shortage of manpower in the Department of Public Safety.

This information was relayed by State Senator Dorsey B. Harde-man in the form of a letter written by Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Department of Public Safety, in response to the Senator's request for such action, sought by local groups for several months.

Col. Garrison's letter, which explains the Department's situation, is as follows:

"This will acknowledge receipt of your communication of November 14th in regard to the telegram that you received from the Ozona Lions Club requesting a Highway Patrolman be stationed in Crockett County. We know that these good folks do need some Patrol assistance and we hope that sometime in the future it will be possible for us to comply with their request.

"At the present time, we do have a school of approximately 50 men in training but, on the other hand, we have nearly 70 vacancies in the Highway Patrol. In other words, the men in this school will be used primarily as replacements at the present stations where vacancies do exist.

"In January, we will begin another school but at the conclusion of that one, it will not be possible to make many new stations as we will still have vacancies.

"Senator, you may be assured that we will certainly keep these good folks' request in mind and when it is possible, we will see what we can do."

## Wolfcamp Discovery Indicated In Superior North Crockett Strike

A discovery has been indicated in Crockett and locations scheduled for a shallow wildcat.

A Wolfcamp discovery has been indicated with the flowing of gas and the recovery of oil on a straddle packer drillstem test between 6,638-70 feet at Superior Oil Co. No. 1-10 Shannon, in 10-BB-EF&RR, 20 miles southwest of Big Lake and 1 1/2 miles southeast of the Shannon (Strawn) field.

Gas surfaced in eight minutes on the three-hour test. Reversed out was unreported amount of heavily oil and gas-cut mud and 23 barrels of 37.4 gravity oil. Recovery below the sub was 174 feet of oil and gas-cut mud. Flowing pressure was 725-1,050, pounds; one-hour shut-in pressure, 1,500 pounds.

A report that the project had perforated opposite the Wolfcamp was in error.

Operator was preparing to take another straddle packer test.

M. D. Bryant of San Angelo will drill a 2,500-foot rotary wildcat, 20 miles northwest of Ozona and three miles south of the Farmers (San Andres) field. It will be the No. 1-6 University.

Operations are to begin immediately. Estimated elevation is 2,600 feet.

## Army Engineers Flood Control Hearing Dec. 14

### Ozona Courthouse Is Site Of Area Meet On Flood Problem

Plans were set here this week for the area meeting which has been called for 10 a. m. next Wednesday, Dec. 14, in the district courtroom here, by the Corps of Engineer, U. S. Army Fort Worth district office, for the purpose of discussing flood control measures in the Devil's River watershed.

The public hearing was ordered by the district engineer, Col. Harry C. Fischer of the Fort Worth office as a means of gathering information on public interest and ideas from the people in the affected area. The information will be used by the Corps in its preliminary examination of the watershed which was provided for in the last rivers and harbors bill passed by Congress. The bill provided an appropriation of \$75,000 for the preliminary survey.

Members of local flood control committees, the Commissioners Court and other interested individuals are invited to the meeting, as are representatives from other towns and areas in the watershed area. The engineers are seeking factual material bearing on the general plan of improvement desired and the economic justification of the undertaking.

So far as Ozona and this immediate area are concerned, the Soil Conservation Service survey now under way on the Johnson Draw watershed and the ultimate success of this plan of multiple dams which will offer 100 percent protection from flood on this wash is of primary present concern. This work has progressed to the point that local backers of the project are looking to the possibility of actual construction work to start sometime next summer if all obstacles are hurdled as expected. It will involve an early vote in this county on a \$200,000 bond issue to finance the local part in the flood control plan.

County Judge Houston Smith, who is confined to a San Angelo hospital recovering from major surgery, will not be able to attend the meeting but has named Commissioner Ralph Jones of Precinct 1 to act as chairman of the court at the meeting and to act in his stead in the hearing.

## Two Wildcats To Be Drilled On University Lands West Of Ozona

Scott Hammonds of Dallas will drill two 3,000-foot rotary wildcats in Crockett County.

The No. 1-CB University is 1,980 feet from the north and 660 feet from the west lines of 9-32-University, 14 1/2 miles southwest of Ozona. Elevation is 2,250 feet.

The No. 1-CA University is 660 feet from the north and west lines of 31-30-University, 17 miles west of Ozona. Elevation is 2,315 feet.

Superior Oil Co. has plugged back to 6,700 feet to test the Wolfcamp through perforations between 6,640-6,670 feet at its No. 1-10 Shannon, Crockett County wildcat in 10-BB-EL&RR, 20 miles southwest of Big Lake and 1 1/2 miles southeast of the Shannon (Strawn) field.

The project, bottomed at 8,615 feet, previously plugged back to test the Strawn, but without success.

The Weger field has been extended one location east on the north side with completion of Harper & Huffman No. 2 Margie Neal, is 2-Georgetown RR survey, 11 miles south of Big Lake.

The project was finalized for a daily pumping potential of 70.78 barrels of 31.8 gravity oil, plus 5 per cent water, with gas-oil ratio of 35-1.

Production was through perforations between 2,240-60 feet on total depth of 2,410 feet. Total plugged-back depth is 2,340 feet. Top of pay was picked at 2,230 feet on elevation of 2,588 feet. Pay section was fractured with 10,000 gallons.

County Judge Houston Smith, who is confined to a San Angelo hospital recovering from major surgery, will not be able to attend the meeting but has named Commissioner Ralph Jones of Precinct 1 to act as chairman of the court at the meeting and to act in his stead in the hearing.

## Two Wildcats To Be Drilled On University Lands West Of Ozona

Scott Hammonds of Dallas will drill two 3,000-foot rotary wildcats in Crockett County.

The No. 1-CB University is 1,980 feet from the north and 660 feet from the west lines of 9-32-University, 14½ miles southwest of Ozona. Elevation is 2,250 feet.

The No. 1-CA University is 660 feet from the north and west lines of 31-30-University, 17 miles west of Ozona. Elevation is 2,315 feet.

Superior Oil Co. has plugged back to 6,700 feet to test the Wolfcamp through perforations between 6,640-6,670 feet at its No. 1-10 Shannon, Crockett County wildcat in 10-BB-EL&RR, 20 miles southwest of Big Lake and 1½ miles southeast of the Shannon (Strawn) field.

The project, bottomed at 8,615 feet, previously plugged back to test the Strawn, but without success.

The Weger field has been extended one location east on the north side with completion of Harper & Huffman No. 2 Maggie Neal, is 2-Georgetown RR survey, 11 miles south of Big Lake.

The project was finalized for a daily pumping potential of 70.78 barrels of 31.8 gravity oil, plus 5 per cent water, with gas-oil ratio of 35-1.

Production was through perforations between 2,240-60 feet on total depth of 2,410 feet. Total plugged-back depth is 2,340 feet. Top of pay was picked at 2,230 feet on elevation of 2,588 feet. Pay section was fractured with 10,000 gallons.

STANDING ON THEIR OWN FEET

The Holbrook, Arizona, Tribune-News—a paper which is published in a region where livestock is a major crop—recently ran a straight-talking editorial about the agricultural situation. It said: "Today we're tremendously thankful—that we live in a section... where Americans still attempt to stand on their feet and ask little from anyone in their efforts to make a living except to be left alone as much as possible."

"Our father went broke in the livestock business. We don't believe he was unusual in this country but he never blamed anyone for it in our hearings. It was 'just the times', and he died with a measure of pride and dignity we have already been proud of."

"Livestock business at present cannot be said to be encouraging, yet we have yet to hear anyone in our territory that wants the government to do something about it. And we hope they never will."

"The best way to solve surpluses of pork, wheat, cotton, potatoes, butter, or whatever, is to produce less—and quit asking the government to bail them out with tax money contributed by everyone, including themselves."

These may seem to be harsh words. Yet they are based in the granite of logic. Sooner or later, we will have to return to an agricultural economy based upon production for consumption, rather than for storage. Meanwhile, the livestock people deserve warm congratulations for their independence of spirit.

FHA Emergency Loan Program Is Extended

The Farmers Home Administration emergency loan program has been extended in Texas for the 1956 crop year, according to Walter T. McKay, the agency's State Director.

McKay stated that authorization for the extension was given by Secretary of Agriculture Benson in keeping with the Department of Agriculture's policy of continuing emergency assistance measures where necessary.

Under the extension of the program, loans will be made through December 31, 1956. Loans may be made in all counties in the State except in the 57 west Texas counties designated on September 15, 1955, for the Great Plains Special Credit Program.

During the fiscal year which ended June 30, 1955, emergency loans totaling more than \$33,000,000.00 were made to Texas farmers and ranchers. Considering the prolonged drought conditions, collections on these loans are very good, McKay stated.

To be eligible for an emergency loan, a farmer or rancher must be unable to obtain the credit he needs from any other source.

### New Postal Ruling Allows Letters To Be Mailed Inside Packages

With the peak of the Christmas mailing season just around the corner, Postmaster Floyd Hokit today called attention to a new combination mail service which he said many patrons of the Ozona Post Office should be interested in. The new service, he explained, allows the presence of a first class letter or other written message inside a package. All that's necessary is to note on the outside of the package that a letter is enclosed and put an additional stamp on the package.

Under the new service, letters or other single pieces of First or Third Class mail may be placed inside Fourth Class parcels or inside copies of publications mailed under Second Class mail entry. Letters or other single pieces of First Class mail may also be placed inside Third Class packages.

This means the familiar phrase, "we are sending under separate cover," is no longer necessary, the Postmaster said. In the past it has been possible to send a letter along with a package only by pasting

the letter on the outside of the package and affixing the necessary postage.

This new combination service, which went into effect November 28, meets a genuine need, the Postmaster said. "It is one more improvement to add to the list of more than seventy procedural changes that the present postal management has adopted for the convenience of the public and for the improvement of the postal service."

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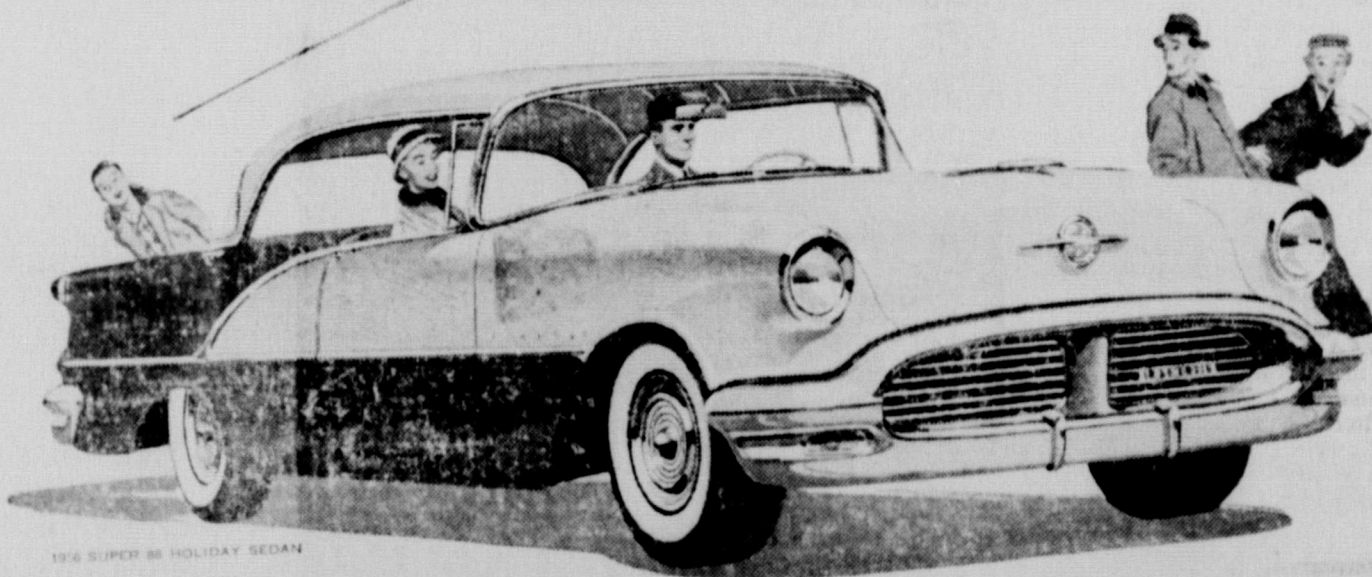

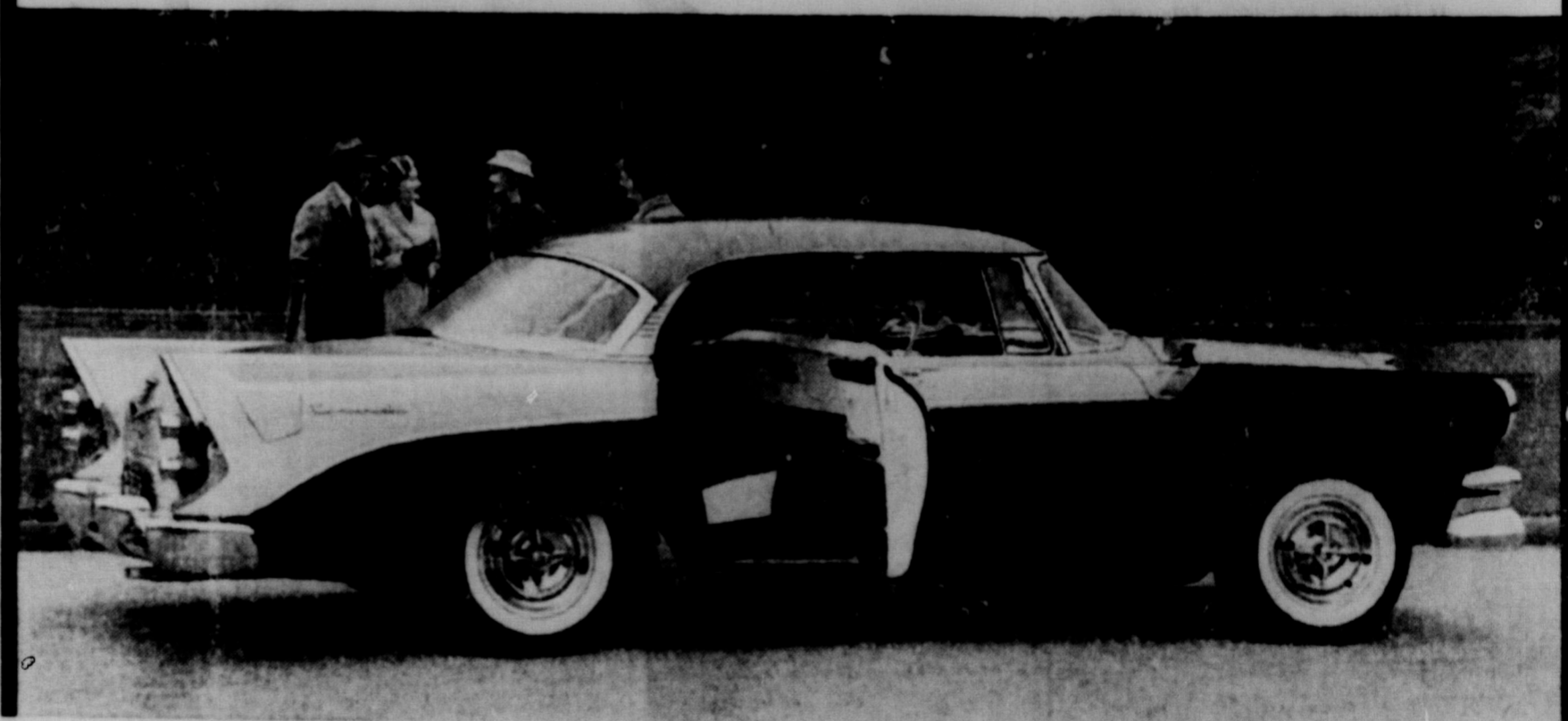

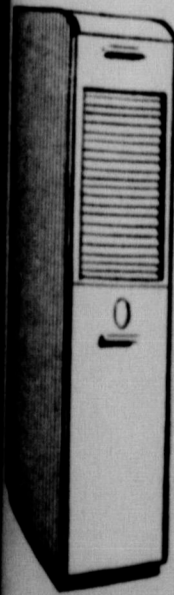

**Grayburg Discovery Opens New Field In Northern Crockett**

Crockett County gained a Grayburg discovery and an offset to it has logged good shows on a core in the same formation.

The discovery, Thompson-Powell-Derrick Drilling Co. et al of Abilene No. 1 Maggie S. Neal, in 66-BB-GC&SF, nine miles south of Big Lake, has been completed for a daily pumping potential of 98.68 barrels of 30.7 gravity oil.

Production was through perforations between 2,225-268 feet and 2,306-2,320 feet, which had been fractured with 20,000 gallons and 30,000 pounds of sand.

Operator has suggested the field be designated as the Maggie Neal field.

The same operator's No. 2 Neal, also in 66-BB-GC&SF, southwest offset to the discovery, recovered 34 feet of well-saturated, porous dolomite on a core between 2,233-83 feet. The upper section was tight, finely crystalline and bleeding oil.

Operator was preparing to core again.

Ohio Oil Co., Midland, has filed application to deepen to 8,000 feet at its No. 2 Half & Bivens, Crockett County wildcat in 60-1-4&GN, eight miles southeast of Iraan.

At latest report the project was drilling below 7,752 feet in dolomite.

On a 30-minute drillstem test between 7,595-695 feet, recovery was 500 feet of water blanket and 30 feet of mud.
