## 450 Fly-In Guests Here For Airport **Dedication**, Show

#### Air Force Personnel. Civilian Flyers Attend Air Show

Guests began arriving by 8 a. m. Sunday at the Crockett County Airport and by noon planes were packed in all available parking places, with approximately 450 fly-in guests on hand for the noon barbecue dinner in their honor to kick off the air show and formal dedicationof the airport sponsored by the Ozona Squadron, Civil Air Patrol.

A mobile control tower from Goodfellow Air Force Base at San Angelo was set up at the port to direct traffic and the operators were about the busiest people on the site during the morning hours as visiting flyers converged on the airport.

Formal dedication of the airport took place at 1:30 p. m. with Col. R. R. Rohatsch of San Angelo coordinating the program for the Mrs. A. J. House of Yoakum, CAP and Major R. L. Holsomback Force participation.

Major Holsomback, principal speaker during the dedication program, complimented the people of Ozona on the fine facilities at the airport and praised Dick Henderson, who gave the land for the airport and installed many of the port's facilities, and the Commissioner's Court of Crockett County which took over the maintenance of the facilities after installing the 3,900-foot paved strip.

The air show and program drew a salute from a flight of B-25 bombers from Goodfellow AFB and one of the big planes was parked on the airport apron for public inspection. A helicopter from the San Angelo base was also flown in.
