Lions did not take long to add their score. Following the kickoff, the Red Devils found themselves unable to move and Sikes with Jerry Jacobs ran with Bill Lewis' punt ten yards.

## Lion B Squad Drops Close 8-6 Decision To Rankin Reserves

The Ozona High School B team camped on the Rankin B team goal line Saturday morning but failed to move over into the promised land except on one occasion and dropped an 8 to 6 contest in Rankin Saturday morning.

Rankin took the opening kickoff and moved to the Ozona forty where they had to kick the only penetration of Ozona territory the Red Devils made, excluding a freak 80 yard touchdown run just after the half.

Following the first Rankin punt, the Lions began to steadily push the home team back for the biggest part of the second quarter the Red Devils B team played with their backs to the goal line.

Following the half, the Lion B kicked off and Jimmy Doran slammed the Rankin ball carrier down on the Rankin two yard line, but a first timer who was kicked off the squad last week broke through for 18 yards and a first down and on the very next play after being swarmed behind the line of scrimmage for what appeared to be a loss, broke out and ran 80 yards for the score. Actually a late Ozona tackler jarred the man free rather than his own efforts.

Ozona responded immediately as Bob Meinecke hit Don Powers with a short pass and the fleet half-back eluded three tacklers and ran 60 yards for the tying score.

The game was decided early in the fourth quarter when a Rankin kick rolled out of bounds on the Ozona two yard line. A fumble at the quarterback post delayed a pitchout and Tony Parker (Continued on Page Seven)

## Most General Of Fall Rains Covers County

### Cold Front Triggers Heavy Rains of From Inch to 3 1/2

A cold front which swept into this area Tuesday night triggered out the most general rainfall which this section has seen since the bountiful rains of Spring.

Most of Crockett county received moisture in varying amounts, mostly averaging around an inch but varying in different parts of the county from a half to a reported 3 1/2 inches on the north end of the B. B. Ingham ranch on the Pecos river at the top of Fort Lancaster hill.

The disturbance was accompanied by heavy thunderstorm activity. Bright flashes of lightning and heavy rolls of thunder beat an accompaniment to the rainfall in Ozona starting about 9 o'clock. A total of 1.44 inches of moisture was gauged here.

## OPEN HOUSE AT RADAR STATION SET FOR OCT. 19

### Visitors Welcomed at Ozona Installation During Day

Major Frank J. Radzaukas, Commander of the 732nd Aircraft Control and Warning Squadron at Ozona, Texas, stated that visitors will be welcome to an open house on 19 October, 1957.

Major Radzaukas' Ozona Station is one of seven in the 83rd Air Division, under the command of Brigadier General William P. Nuchols, where construction was recently completed. These stations are designed to augment the air defense system in the greater Southwest. Other new Texas units are: the 813th at Rockport; the 733rd, Eagle Pass; the 742nd, Zapata; the 813th, Lufkin and the 814th at Killeen. A seventh recently occupied AC&W site is the 812th at Lake Charles, Louisiana.

An additional Texas site, the 811th at Port Isabel, is scheduled for completion at a later date.

It will be some time, however, before the electronics, radio and other essential operational equipment is received and installed at the new facilities. It is anticipated that the equipment will begin arriving this summer, but it will be at least six months before the final delivery is made and the equipment tested, calibrated and the stations ready for operations use.

In the meantime, a small cadre of Air Force personnel is assigned to each of the units. These men will be responsible for maintaining the new facilities, receiving supplies and assisting in the installation of the technical equipment.

Future improvements for the new AC&W units include soil erosion work landscaping and family housing.

General Nuchols, whose area of air defense responsibility includes Oklahoma, Texas, Arkansas and Louisiana, said, "When the new radar squadrons become operational, our effective air defense radar coverage of Texas and the Gulf area and northern Mexico will be more than doubled."

"For the first time we will have 100 percent coverage of the southern approaches to the 33rd Air Division area of responsibility," he continued, "and we will have the capability to guide our fighters to pin point interception of any hostile aircraft at much greater distances from population centers and industrial-military targets than at any time in the past."

There are still a number of reserved seats scattered through the reserved sections of the stadium at Lions field which have not been sold, Supt. L. B. T. Sikes said this week.

Any fan who might wish to buy one of these reserved seats for the Sonora game, October 18, or for the Eldorado game, Oct. 25 may do so, the superintendent said. The seats will be sold as single admissions at the regular \$1 gate price, but having the reserved seats will assure the holder a seat when he arrives at the stadium, although late.

**Penalties and Fumbles Hand 20-13 Victory to Iraan Over Ozona Cubs**

Too many penalties at the wrong time, fumbles, and ineffective blocking in the forward line led to the downfall of the Ozona Cubs in a game in Iraan last Thursday night. This marked the second time in two years that the Cubs had been stopped in Iraan with a winning streak of twelve games. Final score Ozona 13, Iraan 20.

The Cubs outgained the Iraan boys three yards to one with a total of 133 yards to 61 for Iraan, made 10 first downs to five for Iraan and generally outplayed the boys from Iraan in every department including penalties and fumbles.

Twice the Cubs gave the ball to Iraan on fumbles, each of which resulted in touchdowns. The other score came as a result of a mix-up in a fourth down situation. The first fumble was at the end of the first punt of the game and gave the ball to Iraan on the Ozona 40 from which point they marched down field to score as the first quarter ended. The next Iraan touchdown was the result of a misunderstanding as to what down it was that the Braves took over on the Ozona 38. After one first down and three consecutive losses on line plays, a desperation pass connected for the second Iraan TD. The final Iraan score was a result of a recovered fumble on the Ozona 10. Three line plays later Iraan had their 20 points.

The Ozona Cubs earned their points the hard way, in each case having to go the length of the field to score. The most beautiful run of the night was turned in by Tony Parker when he went 76 yards to score without being touched only to have the ball brought back and Ozona assessed a penalty.

This run and penalty set the pattern for the night with the final score Iraan 20, Ozona 13.

The Cubs were playing without the services of two regulars who were home sick in bed. In addition to these two we had two or three with us who were not able to go at top speed because of illness.

Now is the time to take cuttings for coleus, pedicularis, philodendron and other tender plants for house plants this winter.

Plant calendulas, daisies, stocks, sweetpeas and other tender annuals for Spring bloom.

Ranunculus bulbs planted now will bloom in February.

Include fruiting trees and shrubs in every garden.

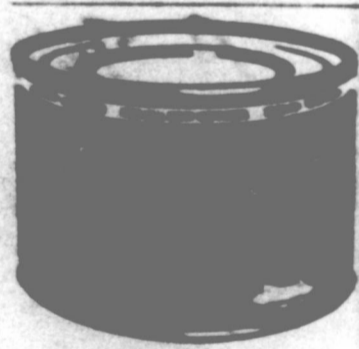
