

Deep down inside of him, every than (we're not so sure about every woman) is lazy and shiftless. We cion't want to work - for work's sake. We haven't been out of the trees long enough.

But the hard fact is we can no longer get a banana or a cocoanut by merely reaching for it. We have to work to eat. And since it has become the custom to wear clothes and live in houses and give our kids a better start than we had, it has also become the custom to work. What is called "ambition" is a liking for money, or things, or social standing or leadership among our fellows that is stronger than our dislike of work. Thus, when labor leaders raise the issue of a shorter work week, they are playing with human dynamite. And when they explain, as Walter Reuther has, that they are seeking not merely fewer hours of work but a still fatter pay env lope the lure is atomic! Less work at higher pay means less goods - at tremendously higher cost. And, as we know from sad experience, when goods are scarce, the competition is not to find buyers but to find things. to-sell-and prices go through the roof. If you think we have infla tion now, just hold your hat! John L. Lewis, who has always been a tough, bitter, no-holds-barted fighter for his mine-workers. and who has gotten his boys the highest pay-scale in Labor, has toldthem flatly: "If you want to stop eating so much and loaf more, we can get you the six-hour day." We've been thinking our days are pretty long too. It would seem like semi-retir ment for an editor to go to the 40 hour week.
