Confession Obtained After Patrolmen Make Arrest

SACRAMENTO, Calif., Feb. 7. (P). A murder suspect's 2000-mile automobile ride with the body of his alleged victim was disclosed at a police outpost on the California-Nevada border today and solved the disappearance of a Kalamazoo, Mich., trucking contractor.

Clarence Frechette, 25, driver of the machine, was reported by Capt. Josephe Blake, of the California highway patrol. He confessed he shot Robert Brown, his employer, at Howell, Mich., Jan. 29, and carried the body in the trunk of the machine for nine days.

Frechette became known as "the flying bandit" seven years ago when he was convicted of slugging his flying instructor, Harry W. Anderson, with a hammer during a flight from Pontiac, Mich. SACRAMENTO, Calif., Feb. 7. (A)



Bruno Richard Hauptmann's defense today pursued the hint of "framed" evidence with an expert witness, Dr. E. M. Hudson, New York physician and fingerprint man. who insisted in the face of the photographs and government reports that three incriminating nail holes in the Lindbergh kidnap ladder were not in existence when he examined it. Hudson clung to his testimony that "rail sixteen" part of the kidnap ladder that the state charges came from Hauptmann's attic—had only one square nail hole when he saw it March 13, 1932, thirty days after the Lindbergh baby was kidnaped and slain.

The rail, in evidence, has four nail holes which state experts and police said jibed with nail holes in joists in Hauptmann's attic.
