Slowly rising temperatures were predicted for Illinois, Iowa, Missouri, Wisconsin and Minnesota. Duaning et al No. 1 Mrs. Clarence Scharbauer, the chief object of interest among wells being drilled in Ector county, was reported as preparing to drill ahead today after some delay while letting gas blow off. Italy sharply objected, and Uruguay said that the time had come for nations to take measures of defense against the policies emanating from Moscow.





World Speeds up in Control Race Of Oil, Vital to It's War Machines

Battle "Out in Open" As World Has Not Seen Before

The mad scramble for oil among the world's powers is out in the open as never before, as they seek to control sources of the huge supplies so vital to their war machines. In a series of three stories, of which this is the first, Willis Thornton, NEA Service and Reporter-Telegram staff correspondent, tells of recent developments in this frantic race and gives the background of the struggle that involves the greater part of the world.

You see the Italian army in Ethiopia turning back to mules, partly because it is so hard to get enough gas and oil to the fighting scene.


Italy well reveals the plight of any modern country without enough oil in its own territory to run its peace-time industries and automobiles, or to fight a war.

Other nations, notably the British, saw that 20 years ago. They started a race for the world's oil, a race which has continued since, and which has speeded up during the last two years.


Preliminary figures clearly indicate that the world production race in 1935 will show all records shattered with an output of 1,-610,000,000 barrels of crude. This represents an increase of about 6.8 per cent for the world over 1934.

PASTURE TESTS SHOW UNCULTIVATED LANDS RETURN PROFITS TO OWNERS

COLLEGE STATION, (P)—Pasture tests at the Tyler experiment station, says a statement from the Texas Agriculural Experiment station here, reveals that "uncultivated portions of East Texas farms may be made to yield neat incomes if they are converted into improved pastures and stocked with good quality beef cattle."

To study the effectiveness of East Texas pastures and to utilize the uncultivated lands on the Tyler station, the statement recites, 40 good grade Hereford steers were HERE FROM FORT WORTH Geo. McQueen, drilling contractor of Fort Worth, is the guest of a Midland hotel.

Which were cleared and have been mowed twice a year, Bermuda and carpet grass being the principal growth. The pasture provided approximately four acres for each animal and considerable hay was harvested when grazing fell behind growth.

From Nov. 21 to April 10 each year, the steers were fed two pounds of cake each daily and allowed some of the meadow hay in addition to the forage supplied by the pastures and fields on the station farms. The cost per head the first winter was \$5.90 and last winter \$12.80. Five pounds of cottonseed cake per head daily was given as supplemental feed from Aug 1 to Oct. 17 Jast year.
