
SHERIFF WARNED TO BE ON LOOKOUT FOR LINDBERGH BABY HERE

It has a Mississippi license and, when last seen, carried a man, a woman and a baby that fits the description of the Lindbergh child. The attorney general was frank to say authorities have positive belief the child is the one abducted."

"I have my doubts about the car," the sheriff here said, "but Midland county officers will cooperate by posting a strong lookout."
