CZECHOSLOVAKIA ASSURES EDEN OF PERFECT ACCORD

Foreign Minister Gives Powers Support

P. R. A. H. A. CZECHOSLOVAKIA, April 4. (P.)—Captain Anthony Eden, British Lord Privy Seal, received assurance today from Dr. Eduard Benes, Czechoslovakian Foreign Minister, that Czechoslovakia remains in perfect accord with Great Britain concerning the safeguarding of the general peace and in the attachment to the policy of the League of Nations.

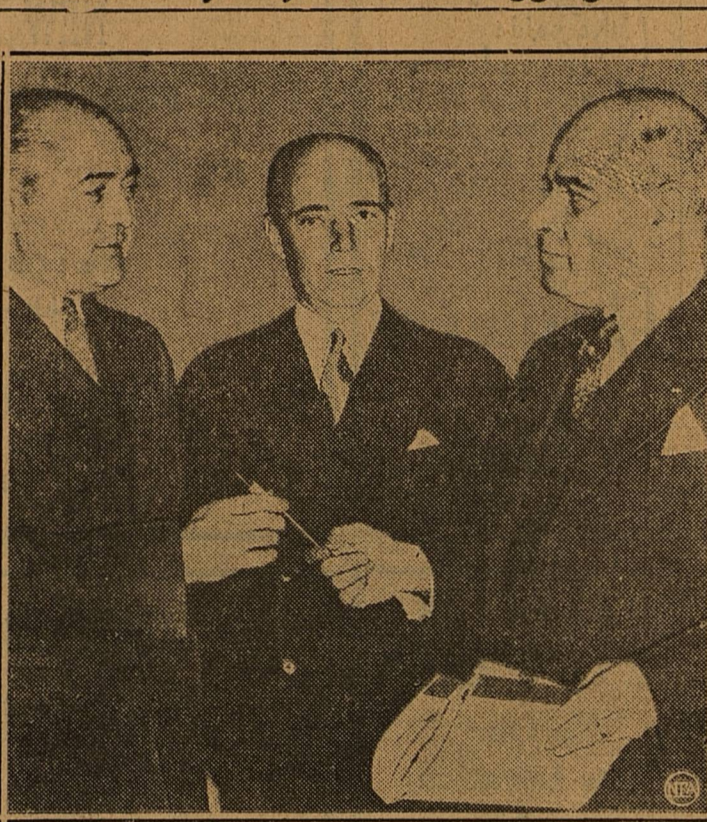
TWO MEN KILLED IN TRUCK CRASH

RECENT REVOLT IS LINKED TO IDEA OF KENT DUCHESS AS GREEK RULER

PARIS, April 4.—While the Duke and Duchess of Kent honeymoon in tropical America, influential Greeks—who form a large and important part of Paris' foreign population—are agog with the thought that the radiant Duchess, Marina, will reign in their sunny land as Queen some day.

That is the significance of the recent rebellion, they declare. And nothing, in their opinion, could be a happier result. All of Paris' Greeks consider Marina as their special princess. For Marina lived here most of her life. She went to school here, and she had Greek tutors. She went to the little Greek church, way off in the southern rim of the city behind the Montparnasse cemetery. She kept in constant touch with the Greek colony, patronized the seamstresses, hat-makers, and other workers from her native land.

"Native land" is more or less a misnomer for Princess Marina. Paris' Greeks still call the Duchess of Kent—hasn't a drop of Greek blood in her veins, although she was born in Athens her father, it is looked around Europe shopping for a king. The Danish and Danish princesses were in the running. The Duchess house remained.
