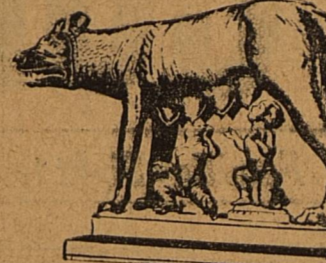

How ROME Was FOUNDED



A STATUE that stood for centuries on the Capitoline Hill of Rome, and a stamp Italy issued in 1929 in four values, illustrate one of the most famous myths in history—that of the founding of Rome. It is the story of Romulus and Remus, twin sons of Mars and the Vestal Silvia, who were cast away on the Tiber and were suckled back to health by a she-wolf. Eventually the twins became leaders of a shepherd tribe and founded the city of Rome at the spot where the wolf had suckled them.

Lent Puts Premium On Fish Dishes; Must Be Served Nicely

Editor's Note: Lent brings its own peculiar problems of meal planning for the housewife. Of course one article of food is first to come to mind at the mention of Lent and that is fish.

Mary E. Dague, NEA service staff writer, says of fish:

Somewhat lots of women hate to cook fish. I think one reason is that it's rather hard to dish up attractively. For this reason, I'm advocating baked fish, which goes straight from the oven to the dinner table in the same good-looking casserole in which it was cooked. Do that and choose a less fishy fish, such as halibut. Then see if you don't feel more kindly toward fish for dinner. A generous sprinkling of lemon juice before cooking alleviates the fish flavor, too.

A fruit cup, tomato juice cocktail or almost any vegetable juice cocktail makes a splendid beginning for a fish dinner. Spinach with lemon sauce is a good vegetable and cabbage salad is suitable, though crisp is my first choice when I can get it. Endive and romaine are good, too.

Baked Fish

One pound fillets of fish or fish steak, 1 cup sliced carrots, 1 cup diced celery, 1 small onion, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 2 tablespoons butter, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1 cup coarse stale bread crumbs, 4 tablespoons minced parsley, paprika.

Peel and slice onion and spread evenly in the bottom of a well-buttered shallow baking dish. Cut in sizes suitable for serving and sprinkle with lemon juice. Let stand ten minutes. Put diced vegetables over onion in baking dish and arrange fish over vegetables. Sprinkle with salt and pepper and cover with crumbs. Melt butter and pour over crumbs. Cover and bake forty-five minutes in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.). Ten minutes before serving remove cover, sprinkle with parsley and paprika and brown crumbs. Serve from baking dish.

If it's too much for the family, having fish and spinach in the same meal, you might substitute Harvard beets for the vegetable.

Harvard Beets

Two cups diced cooked beets, 2 tablespoons butter, 1 teaspoon cornstarch, 3 tablespoons sugar, 4 tablespoons lemon juice, 4 tablespoons vinegar, 1-4 teaspoon salt, few grains pepper.

Mix and sift sugar and cornstarch and add to butter which has been melted. Mix well and stir in lemon juice and vinegar. Cook and stir until sauce boils. Add beets, salt and pepper and let stand on the back of the range in a place that will keep the dish hot but not continuously cooking for thirty minutes. The sauce becomes a rich red and thickens as it stands.

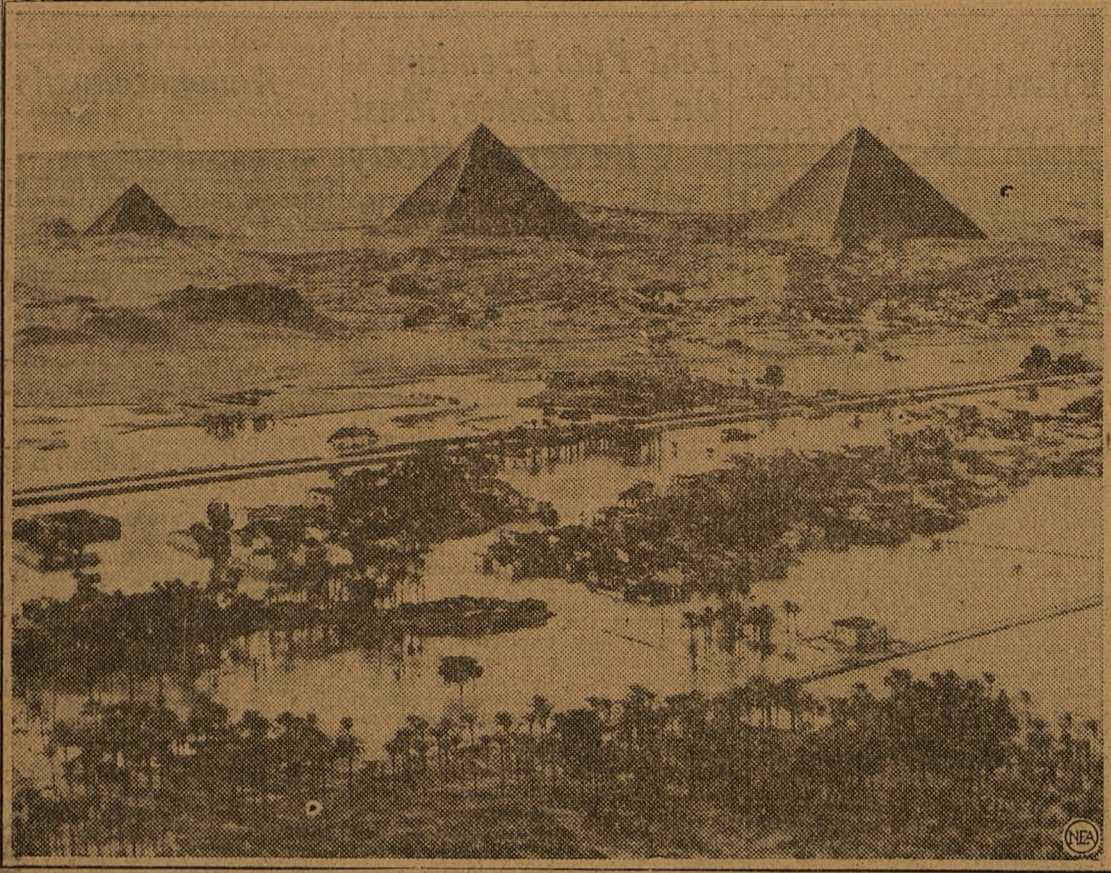

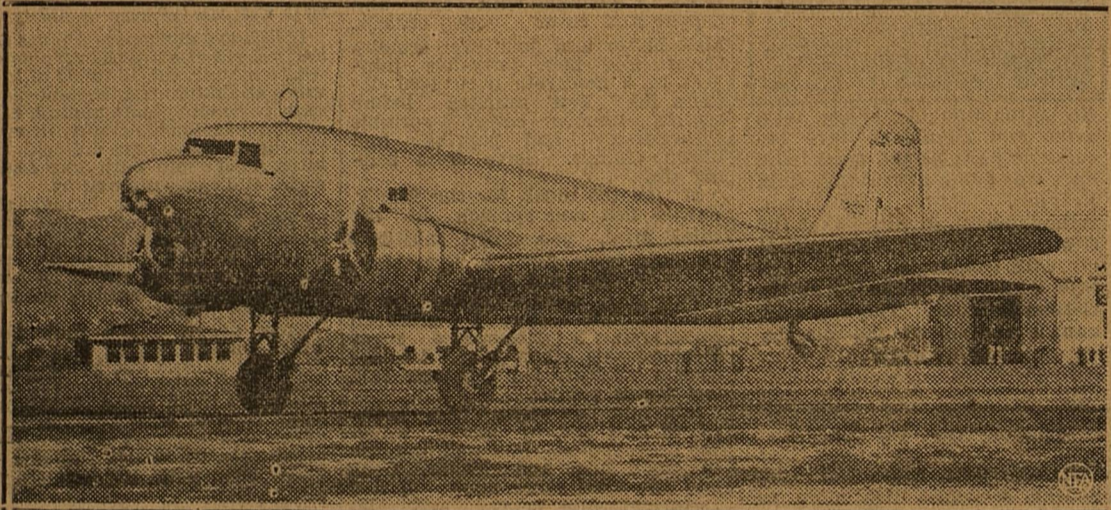

Pyramids See Nile Harnessed by Progress



This year, for the last time, the Great Pyramids of Egypt gaze down on a phenomenon which made possible their existence. A new canal, shown crossing the picture at center, will irrigate land in the Nile valley and end forever the annual flooding of the great river, a boon to Egyptians since ancient times. It was across these flood waters, in a bygone era, that 2,300,000 separate blocks of stone, averaging 2 1/2 tons, were transported from quarries near Cairo for use in building the Great Pyramid of Cheops.

Question Legality Of Hobbs Election

HOBBS, N. M., March 28. (AP)—Whether or not Hobbs will adopt a city commission form of government as was voted in an election held Tuesday despite a district court restraining order seems to hinge on the legality of the Mayor's proclamation for the voting, legal opinion voiced here said.

The election had been called by Mayor L. W. Gay in a proclamation specifying that the required number of citizens had signed a petition asking the vote, but on a complaint of the town trustees, J. T. Collie, H. Parks, Mrs. A. Caylor, and W. A. Sabelman, a restraining order was granted last Friday at Lovington by District Judge Harry L. Patton of Clovis.

The complaint of the trustees had alleged that the election was called illegally without consulting the trustees, the proclamation was invalid because it was not signed by

the town clerk, and that some of the signatures on the petition asking the election were obtained through fraud.

Tuesday, however, citizens using improvised ballot boxes made from cardboard, and election judges of their own selection, cast 224 to 21 votes for the adoption of the commission form of government.

Smallest Printed Book

WILLIAMSTOWN, Mass. (AP)—What is believed the world's smallest printed book was presented to Chapin Library at Williams College recently by Hamilton Brooks Ward, 10. The volume, a copy of "The Rose Gardens," measures 5-16ths of an inch by 3-16ths of an inch.

An Irish scientist, Dr. James Drummond, has perfected an electric storage battery that will run a train at 35 miles an hour. The battery can be rapidly charged by a generator on the train.

Autos to Be Blessed

ROME, Italy. (AP)—In keeping with a custom of recent years, automobiles drawn up near the Colosseum will be blessed on the Feast of Saint Francesca Romana. Various articles belonging to the saint will be displayed in the House of the Oblates, which can be visited only on this occasion.

Suicides Over Hiccoughs

MANCHESTER, O. (AP)—Distracted by hiccoughs, which had kept him awake and in agony for five days, David McMullen, 59, a Spanish-American War veteran, killed himself here by firing a shotgun charge into his heart.

CORDOBA, Spain. (AP)—Juan Jose Aguilar Tejero, a watchmaker, claims to have built the smallest electric motor in the world. It weighs 20 centigrams and is composed of 30 pieces.

Negress, 106, Is Dead

HALIFAX, N. S. (AP)—Mrs. Mary Anne Giggie, daughter of a negro slave, who was believed to be the oldest woman in Canada, is dead here. The colored woman claimed she was 111 years old, and had records to prove that she had passed her 106th year. Old age pension inspectors who investigated her pension claim declared they were satisfied that she was at least 106.

Canned Salmon Prices Up

SAN FRANCISCO. (AP)—Sharp increases in canned salmon prices were forecast by packers here on the heels of the Bureau of Fisheries' order restricting operations to 50 per cent of mechanical capacity in Bristol Bay, Alaska. At present prices, available supply is expected to be far short of the present demand of 300,000 cases a month.

Too Costly to Use

IOWA CITY, Iowa. (AP)—Blending of 20 per cent alcohol with third-grade gasoline increases its anti-knock value to that of first-grade fuel, but the drawback is that it boosts the consumption and the price. University of Iowa researchers have found. Smooth engine performances resulted from tests by Theodore R. Thoren, mechanical engineering researcher, but the cost would aggregate about six cents a gallon more than first grade gasoline.

Indian Awarded Purple Heart

WETUMKA, Okla. (AP)—The War Department has presented the coveted "Purple Heart" medal of honor to Johnny John, full blood Creek Indian and World War veteran. He was cited for bravery and severe wounds sustained in the Meuse-Argonne battle of 1918.

"It pays to be consistent"
