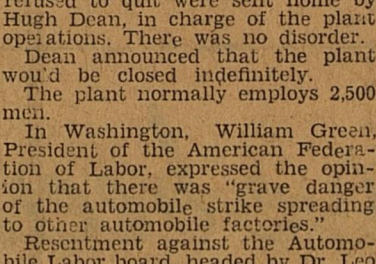

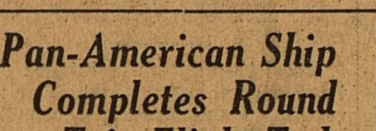

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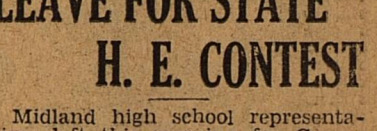

ONE GAINS, ANOTHER LOSES

The Fascist government in Germany is trying a new method of approach to the problem of caring for the aged. It is going to abolish old age pensions for all persons between 65 and 80 who are capable of doing any kind of light work.

Special shops will be set up in which these people can earn their own living—with work especially adapted to their physical powers.

Robert Ley, leader of the Nazi Labor Front, explains that "Germany cannot afford to waste energies," and that enforced rest is prejudicial to the interests of the old people themselves.

The chief objection to this attitude would seem to be that there is an infinitely greater waste of energy involved in the disemployment of young, able-bodied men than there is in the pensioning of the aged.

Until the unemployment problem is completely solved, it is futile to talk about conserving energy by putting the aged to work.

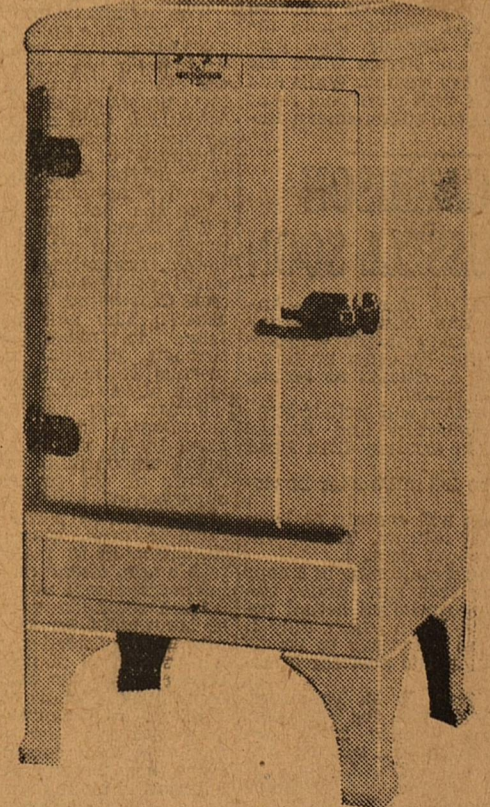

## Aimee Semple McPherson Thunders In China 'Cross the Sea And Orientals Furnish A Harvest of Souls, Dollars

SHANGHAI, April 22.—Aimee Semple McPherson has taken assumed Shanghai by storm, and the Sons of Han in this buzzing China Coast metropolis are following her around the highways and byways of the city in bug-eyed awe.

The Foursquare Gospel has been brought across the Pacific from famed Angelus Temple at Los Angeles, Sister Aimee carrying the torch, and it bids fair to set Shanghai afire.

Celestials are accustomed to foreign missionaries with conservative, orthodox creeds, and are for the most part indifferent to them. European and American residents of the International Settlement pay scant attention to the comings and goings of those who would save the souls of the Heathen Chinese.

But when Aimee landed on these shores, wicked Shanghai sat up and took careful notice. Since then the uproar has become a practical bedlam.

Changes Hymn to "Gathering in Chinese"

When the dynamic evangelist left her flock at Los Angeles in the tender care of Rhea Crawford Spiliva, the "Angel of Broadway," she set out on a world tour of Foursquare foreign missions, on which Angelus Temple spends about \$60,000 a year.

She didn't tarry long in Japan, but descended in a whirl of reformative fervor upon the Asiatic sink of iniquity, as Shanghai is known. She plans to gather in the sheaves (she leads a hymn now called "Gathering in the Chinese") in this city until she has won enough converts to satisfy her adoring local missionaries, and then she will go on to Hongkong, Manila, India, Africa, Europe, and wind up the world tour next summer.

Meanwhile Shanghai gasps as Sister Aimee plunges enthusiastically into a program of grand revival meetings. These are staged daily in the French Concession. She had no hesitation in choosing for her headquarters the large auditorium famed throughout the East as the center of that well-known Spanish game called Jai Alai, and the crowds that attend her meetings pass under the huge lighted sign that proclaims "The Fastest Game in the World"—"Faster than Ever." Shanghai is inclined to take the signs seriously today.

The Basque players were dubious at first about turning over their very remunerative building to an evangelist who might inveigh against the sins of gambling. For Shanghai gamblers have made Jai Alai a rich business—but Sister Aimee calmed their fears. Now the auditorium is

Sister Aimee believes that Shanghai is a very wicked port, but she feels it can be saved. She has taken a special interest in its infamous night life and has spent much of her time doing the sailor dives along the waterfront and observing the life of the Chinese, Japanese and Russian girls. She finds them very interesting.

So she shouted "Hallelujahs!" and "Amen!" continue to shake the walls of Shanghai's number one gambling establishment, and the converts trickle steadily in. And the big round Mexican silver dollars click into the collection box. The Paris of the East is gradually getting religion.

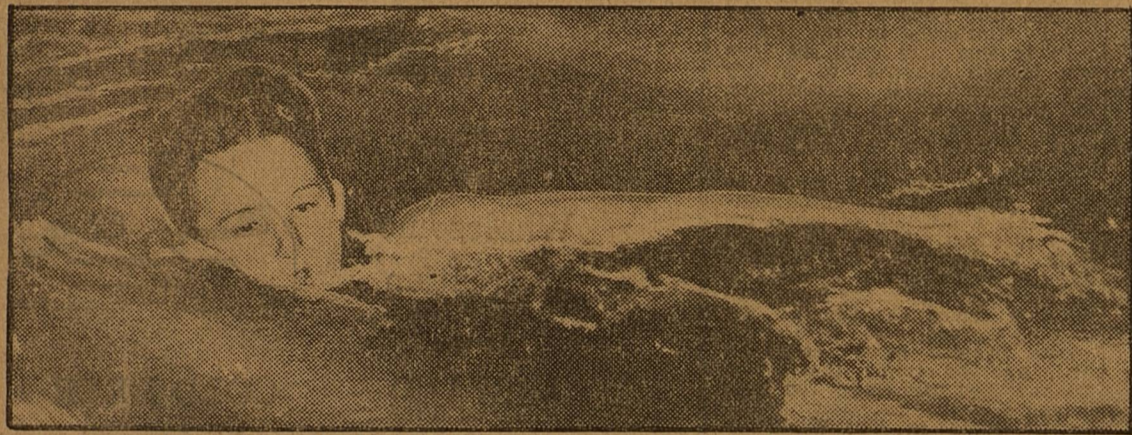
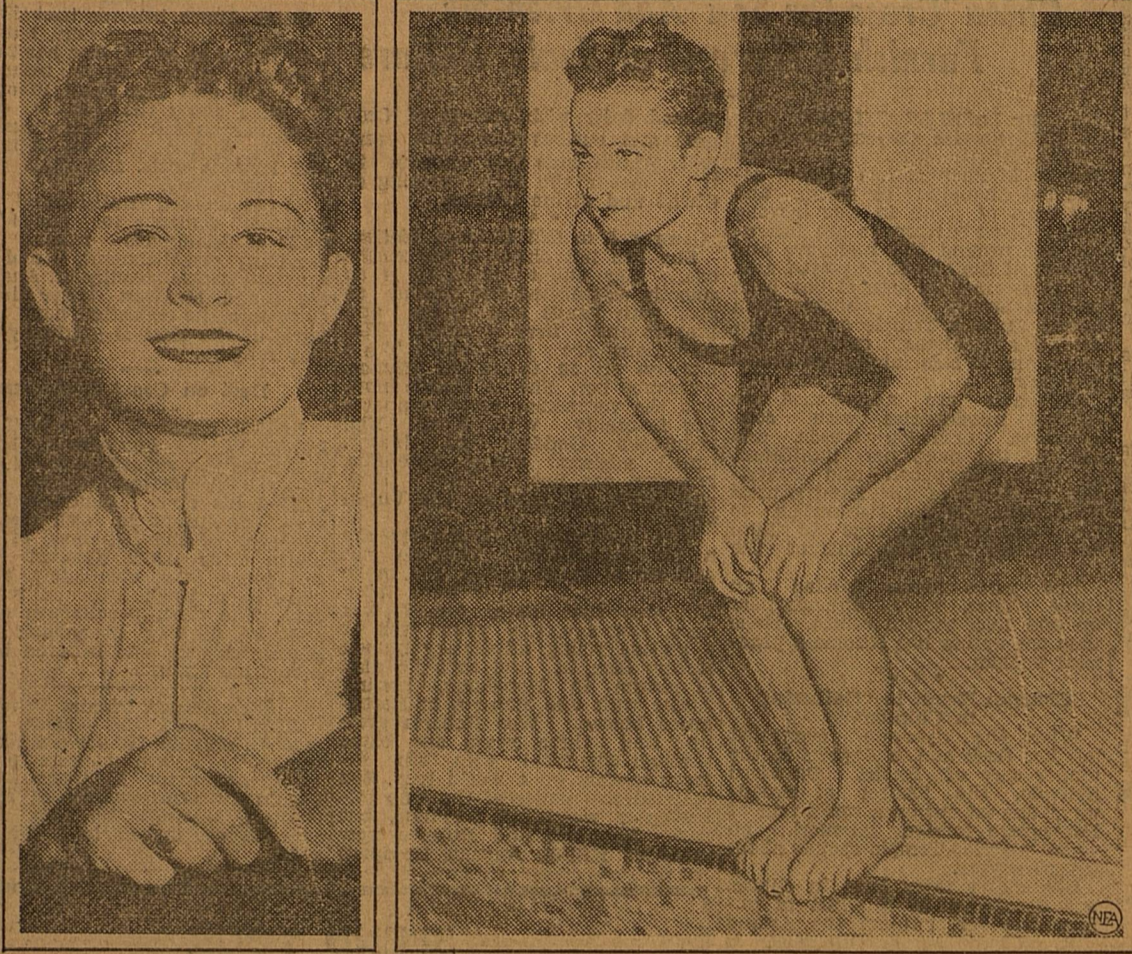

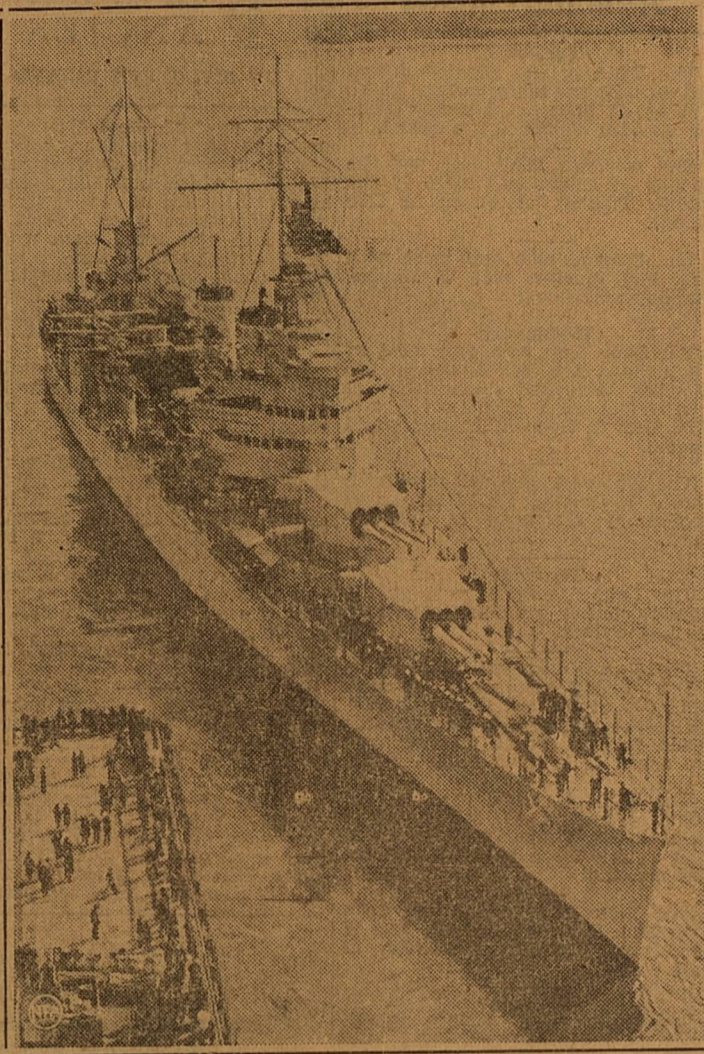

## Tops in Her 'Teens, and Bound for Berlin



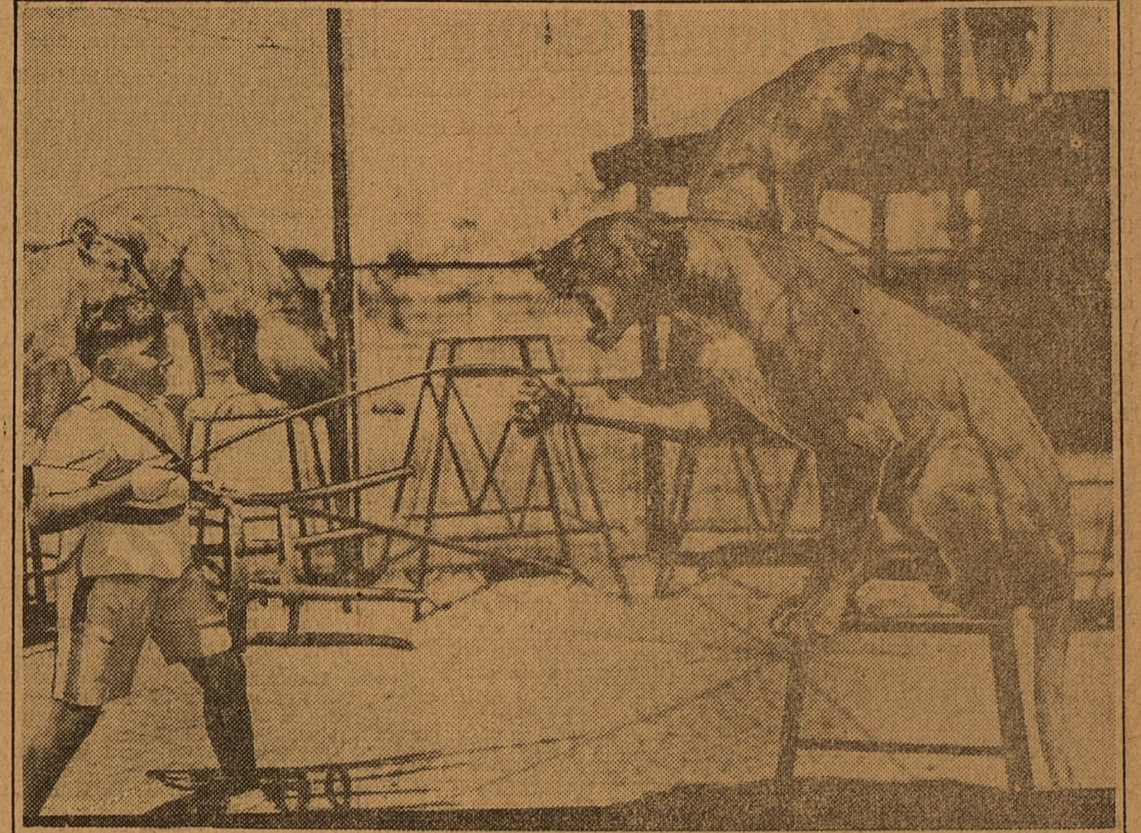

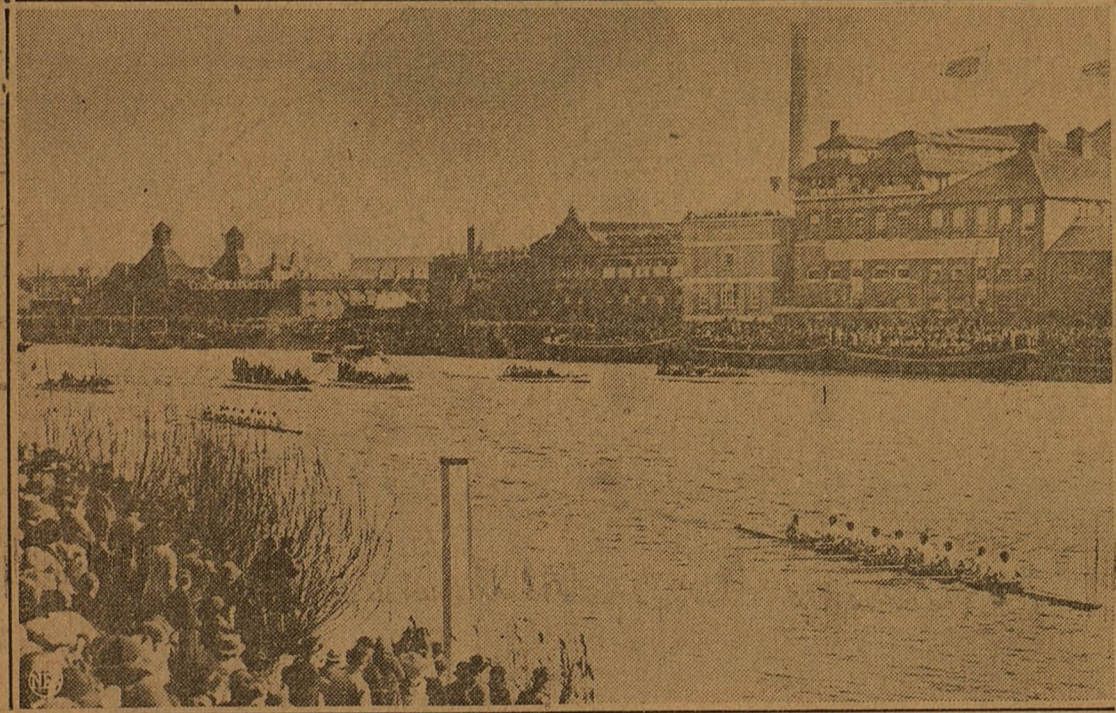

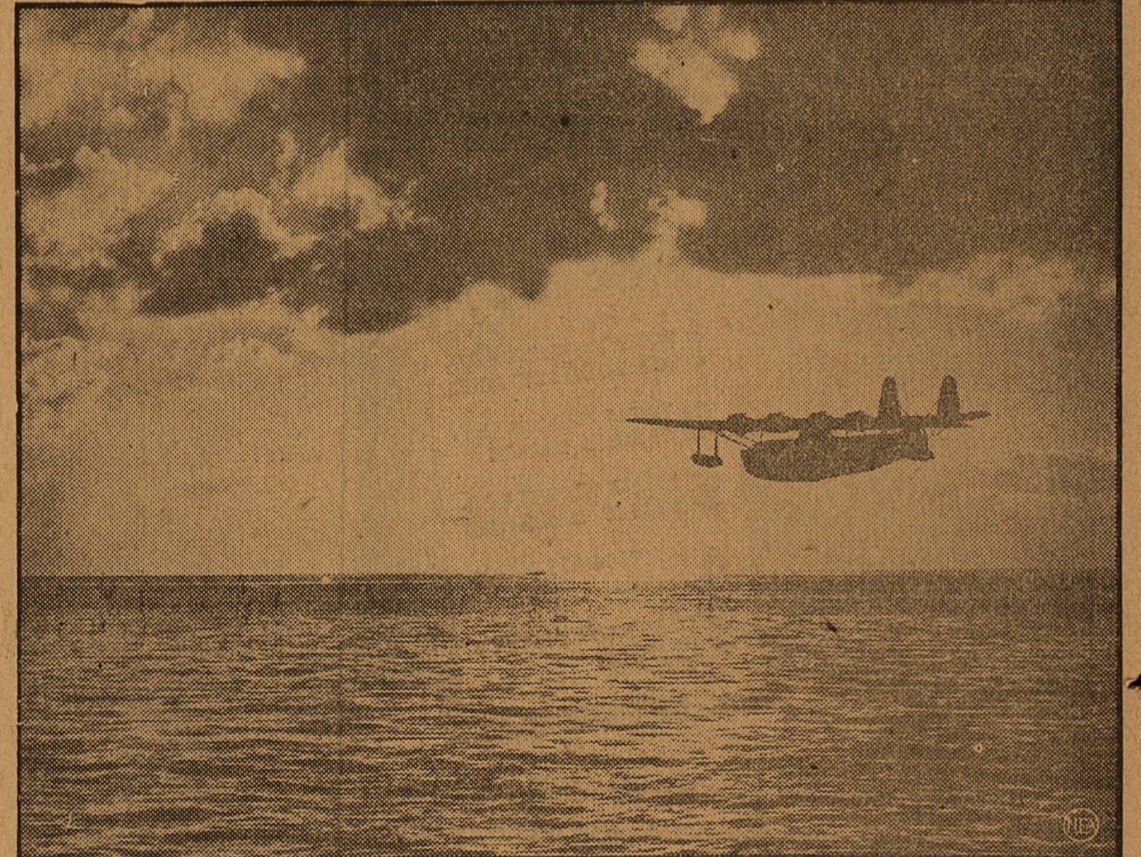

## Cambridge Rows to Twelfth Victory in Row Over Oxford



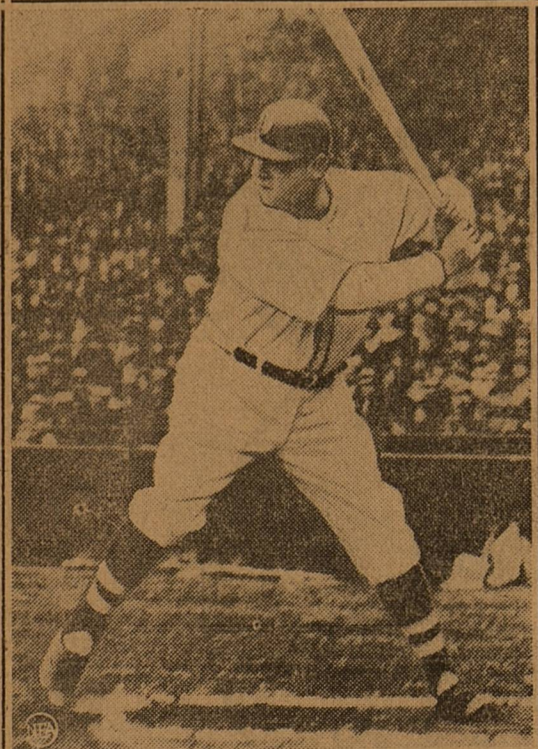

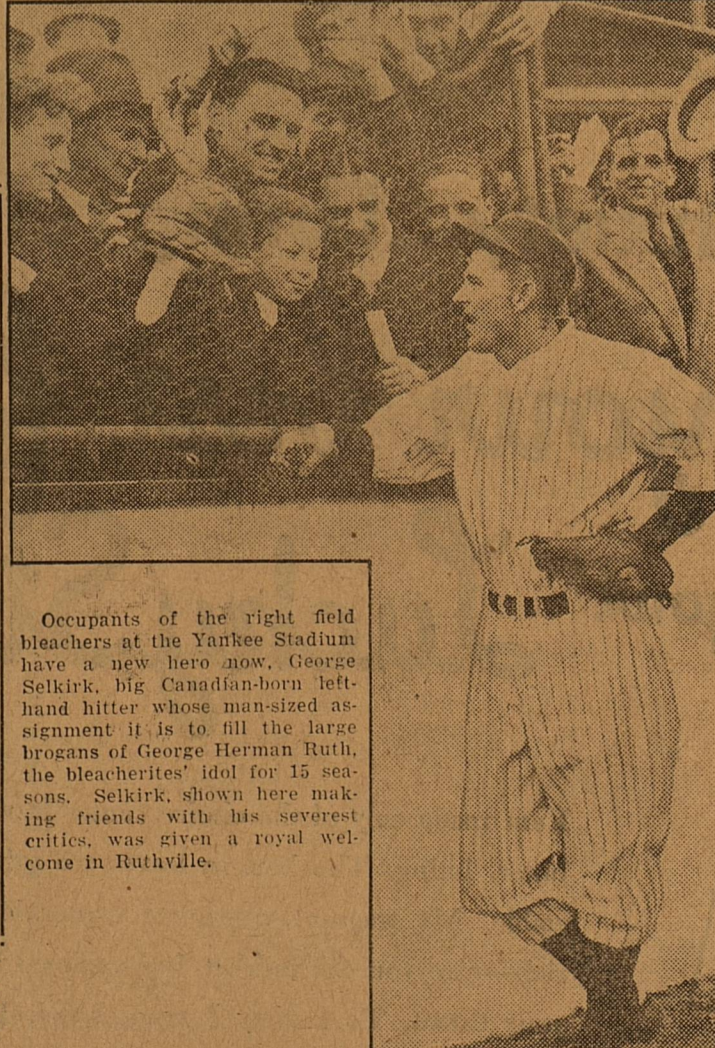

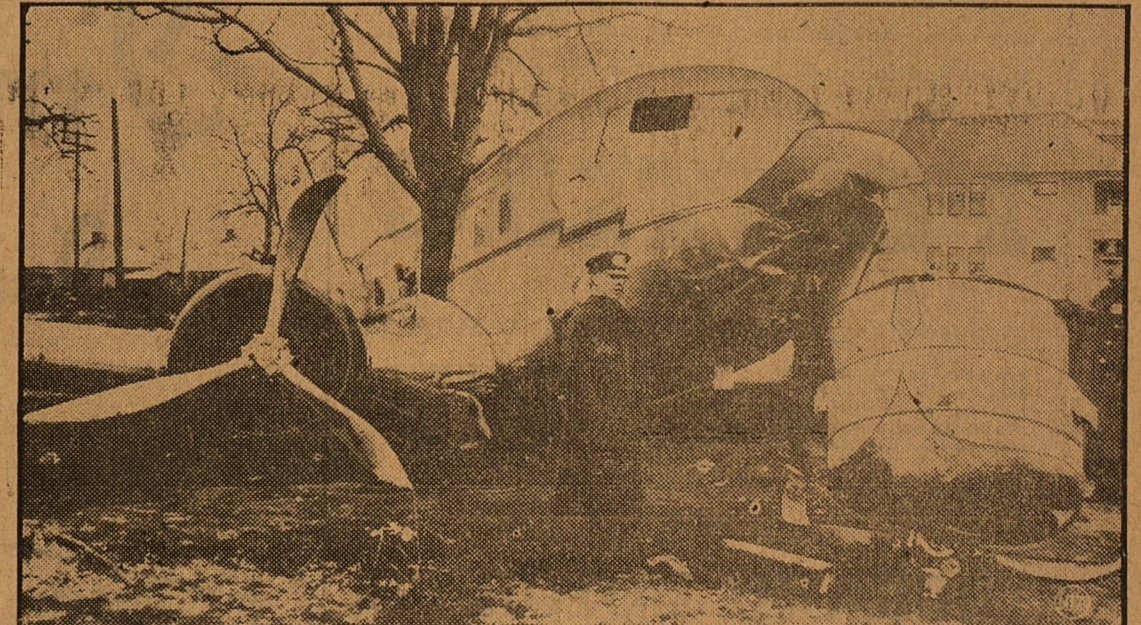

Huge Eagle Trapped

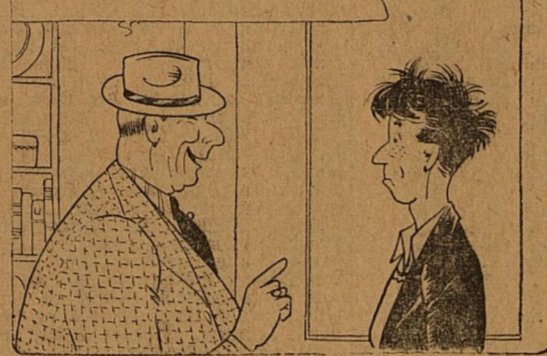

Nine Midland Boys Sign in CCC Service

AUSTIN, April 23.—Authority to enroll 4,986 Texas boys in citizens conservation camps in the eighth corps area was received here last week by Neal E. Guy, enrollment supervisor for Texas.

County administrators were notified immediately to instruct boys selected to report to recruiting stations between April 17 and 23. Enrollment will be for a six months period as usual with an opportunity to re-enroll for an additional six months.

Nine boys from Midland county have enrolled in the CCC in accordance with the new provisions and are expected to be sent to camps in Arizona in the near future.

Effect of this new enrollment of boys will be to take approximately 5,000 Texas families off the relief rolls by June 1, at which time first checks will be received by beneficiaries of enrollees.

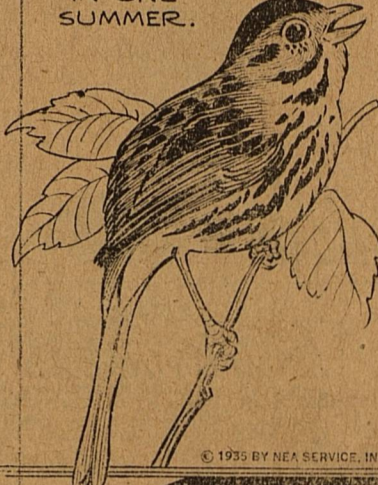
Guy said approximately 2,725 young men will be sent out of the state to camps in Arizona, New Mexico, Colorado and Wyoming. The remainder will go to the 53 camps in Texas.

Enrollment of these boys will again bring the quota of Texas young men in CCC camps to the maximum figure of slightly more than 14,000.

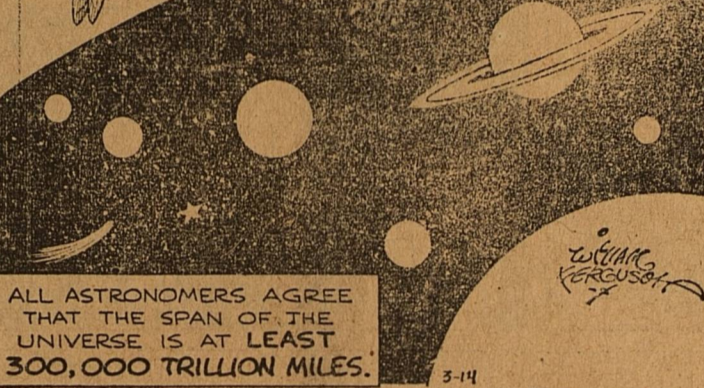

Price of Mohair Is Continuing to Rise

SAN ANGELO, April 23.—The spring mohair market in West Texas as continued its upward march when D. E. and Jack Hughes of Boston paid 21 cents for adult and 21 cents for kid hair, buying 31,000 pounds from M. G. Wooley of Sabinal. Meanwhile, speculators over the state are estimated to have bought another 100,000 pounds at the same price.

Offers of 21 and 31 cents a pound are known to have been refused for hair which a few weeks ago was selling at 16 and 26 cents. Just what the mohair is to be worth is being debated throughout West Texas. Some houses, including Bond-Baker of Roswell, N. M., are known to be holding their mohair. Others are offering it at 25 and 40 cents a pound and some conservatives predict a further rise of 5 to 10 cents.

It is estimated that the spring mohair output will not exceed 3,500,000 pounds in Texas, a low production for the state, while mill stocks are reported low in the East. There is said to be a considerable quantity of mohair being held on the ranches to see which warehouse gets the best price.

No losses of shorn goats have been reported because many ranchmen delayed shearing. The goats in many sections were so thin that owners held off shearing, fearing a light rain would cause their death. Shorn goat pelts are selling at 10 cents each while sheep pelts without wool are going at 20 cents.

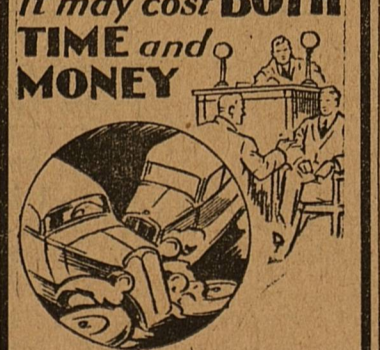
