MEANS DOOM OF AAA; SECURITIES LIQUOR CONTROL

Roosevelt Says All Gov't Regulatory Power Gone

WASHINGTON, May 31, (P).—President Roosevelt said today that implications of the Supreme Court's decision on the NRA meant the end of the agricultural adjustment

ministration.

He said the decision last Monday drew a flat issue of taking away from the government all control over the national social and economic conditions.

HOLD CONFERENCE ON NRA DECISION

WASHINGTON, May 31, (P).—A mounting tabulation of price cuts and wage slashes was maintained Thursday at NRA headquarters, while President Roosevelt still felt for the public pulse before announcing what to do about NRA.

The chief executive went into the muddled situation with Donald Richberg, Secretary Perkins and members of the National Industrial Recovery Board at a two-hour conference which discussed remedies generally but reached no conclusions.

Leaving the President's office, Richberg, in apparent good humor, parried questions generally, but did disclose the compilation of code abandonments which his aids at NRA were tabulating.

The plan, he said, is to make this record public, as a specific example of the immediate results flowing from the Supreme Court's decision that NRA's code structure was unconstitutional and therefore void. The White House kept close check also on letters received. Of some 2,000 said Stephen T. Early, one of the White House secretaries, only three urged final abandonment of NRA, the remainder advocating its continuance in such form as the terms of the court opinion would

At the White House it was emphasized again that Gen. Hugh S. Johnson, first administrator of NRA, was but one of many whom the chief executive was consulting on ways and means of retaining the gains and purposes of the blue could agains.

Prominent in Washington's speculation on the situation also was the possibility that an amendment to the Constitution might be urged for the purpose of eliminanting the limitations of the fundamental law which caused NRA's downfall.

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

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MID

Section 1. The following terms as used in this ordinance are hereby defined as follows:

(a) "Gambling Device" shall mean any machine, instrument, device or thing used or operated, or which may be used or operated, for the purpose of gambling, or for playing any game of chance for money or any other article or thing of value.

any other article or thing of value.

(b) "Slot Machine" is defined to mean any machine, instrument, device or thing which is used or operated, or which may be used or operated, by the insertion of any coin, slug or token, and which, as a result of certain combinations of numbers, symbols, pictures or any other items, may entitle the player to any money, slugs, tokens, merchandise or any other article of value as a prize or reward resulting from the operation of such machine, instrument, device or thing, the player having no control over such prize or reward and no skill on his part being involved. The fact that such machine, instrument, device or thing may also vend merchandise shall be immaterial, and the vending of such merchandise in any manner shall not take such machine out of the foregoing definition of a "Slot Machine".

(c) "Marble Machine", shall mean,

(c) "Marble Machine", shall mean, and is hereby defined to mean, every coin-operated marble machine, marble table, or marble machine of any description, or any pin-ball machine, whether enumerated or not, and for the playing of which a fee is charged, regardless of whether such machine be used for the purpose of amusement, entertainment, or for vending commodities, merchandise, confections, or services of any kind, and which is operated by coins, slugs or which is operated by coins, slugs or tokens of any sort.

Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to set up for operation, operate, lease, exhibit, or distribute for the purpose of operation or exhibition, any gambling device or slot machine, as such terms are hereinabove defined.

Section 3. From every person, firm or corporation owning, managing, operating, exhibiting or leasing a marble machine or machines, as such term is herein defined, and for the operation of which a fee of 10 or more is charged, a license fee of ten (\$10.00) dollars a year shall be collected for each machine, which fee shall be paid on or before the 1st day of July each year, beginning with the current year, to any official or employee of the City of Midland, who may be authorized by the City Council of the said City to collect such fee or fees and issue appropriate license receipt therefor.

At shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to set up for operation, operate, exhibit, or distribute for the purpose of operation or exhibition, any marble machine, as such term is defined in this ordinance without first affixing or attaching thereto in a place plainly visible the license receipt covering such machine for the current year for which the same is being operated, exhibited, leased or distributed.

Section 5. No marble machine shall be permitted within 500 feet of any public school building or

grounds.

Section 6. Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance, upon conviction of such violation, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be fined in a sum not to exceed one hundred (\$100.00) dollars, and the unlawful operation or exhibition of each gambling device, slot machine or marble machine shall constitute a distinct and separate offense for each day that the same is so operated or exhibited.

The fact that the City has no way of controlling the use and operation of coin operated marble machines and other machines numerated above and is in need of such regulation creates a public necessity for the passage of this ordinance on its first reading and it is so ordained.
