OVER 300 ROTARIANS EXPECTED

Drought Areas Of State Are Relieved By General Rains

DALLAS, May 4. (P.)—Drought stricken areas in Texas were relieved today as snow fell steadily over the panhandle and a cold rain over most of the remainder of the state. The snow extended as far south as Tahoka and sleet fell at Plainview, where the temperature dropped to freezing. Rain, hail, snow and sleet mingled over the south plains below Lubbock.

Open Range Days to Be Re-Enacted In Round-Up, Chuck Wagon Supper Scheduled for Rotarians Monday

Re-enacting the cattle round-ups of the open range days, before cowboys had the assistance of barbed wire fences and plank corrals, Rotarian Clarence Scharbauer and his crew of cowhands will provide Rotarians and Rotary Anns attending the district conference something different in entertainment Monday afternoon. Leaving Hotel Scharbauer at 4 p. m., the delegates will drive west on highway No. 1 to a point just beyond the airport. 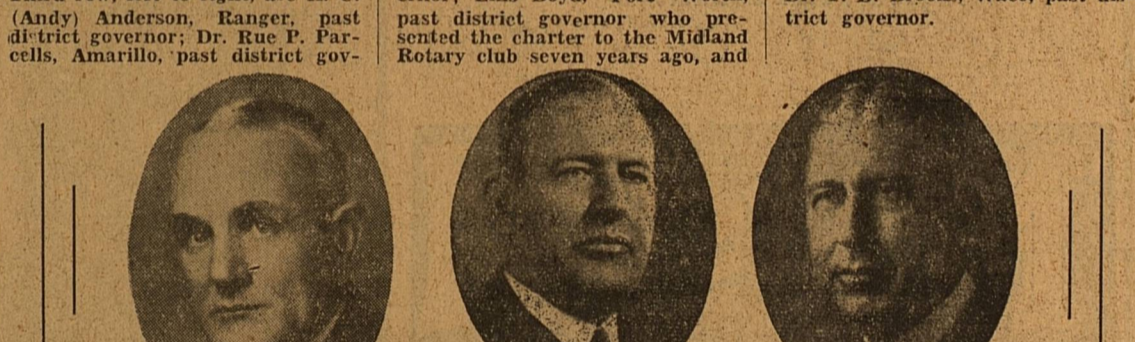

3-DAY CONFERENCE OPENS HERE TODAY

Room reservations, early arrivals and communications from the 60 clubs of the 41st district of Rotary International indicated late Saturday that the attendance at the annual conference which opens here today may reach a total of between 500 and 600 delegates. The district, which includes all the Panhandle, extends southeastward through Childress, Gainesville to Fort Worth and Arlington, thence south to Waco and Temple and back northwestward through San Saba and San Angelo to Midland, has a membership of approximately 2,600 Rotarians.

Despite inclement weather the second Midland Trades Day program was called a large success by all who attended it yesterday. Drizzling rain which fell for most of the day, caused the grand parade to be moved up from three thirty until two in the afternoon but all participants were on hand and officials were able to get this part of the program completed with a minimum of delay. Cowboys, judges of the meet, fairs, prize-winning horses and cattle lined up in formation and marched to Main street, two blocks north, two blocks west and back to the starting point. The large number of entries in the parade covered an entire two city blocks of the streets.

INVESTIGATION OF McDONALD IS PROPOSED SAT.

AUSTIN, May 4. (P.)—A resolution to investigate charges of irregularities in Agriculture Administration J. E. McDonald's administration of the jack and stallion racing fund was filed today with Speaker of the House Coke Stevenson by E. E. Hunter of Cleburne. The inquiry would be based on statements of George Simpson, state auditor, following a check of the fund, and on reports of the House Investigating Committee. The auditor's report was adopted as part of the resolution. McDonald told newspapermen that he had nothing to conceal and that every dollar was accounted for and that he welcomed any investigation that the House or anyone else might want to make.

Phone No. 60 For Conference

Installation of a Rotary Conference telephone at the chamber of commerce, to be used as headquarters office for the three day conference, was announced yesterday by John P. Howe, chairman of halls and meeting places. "Call No. 60 for any Rotary Conference business," Howe said. The telephone will not interfere with regular business of the chamber of commerce and will have someone representing the Rotary Conference on duty at all times. L. E. DEVELOPMENT OF FIELD WELLS OIL NEWS FOR WEEK

Field development again characterized the week's oil activity in West Texas, with nine counties sharing 17 new locations, all but two of which are on proven acreage, and ten completed wells yielding a net increase in potential of 4,853 barrels daily. As in previous weeks, principal activity was in Ward county, where sand production is being rapidly drilled up. One new scheduled operation is a wildcat in northern Dawson county, while the other will test unproven land in Winkler county, seeking production from the sand horizons which have occasioned a spurt in activity in Winkler recently. Fox, made the first reservations in a Midland hotel. There will be 25 of the Ft. Worth delegates. Temple is the farthest town in the state that will send a delegation to the conference.

Goldsmith, alto-saxophone, and Billy Kimrough, clarinet, won first in the solo contests. Judging of the bands is through award of "superior," instead of first, and the Midland band tied for that position, according to a telegram from Russell E. Shrader, director, to Superintendent W. W. Lackey Saturday afternoon. Fifty-five persons, including band members and patrons who took them to the contest, made the trip to Lubbock. The Midland band was in a street parade Saturday morning. Six members of the band played in a selected concert, with members taken from a number of bands, Friday night. 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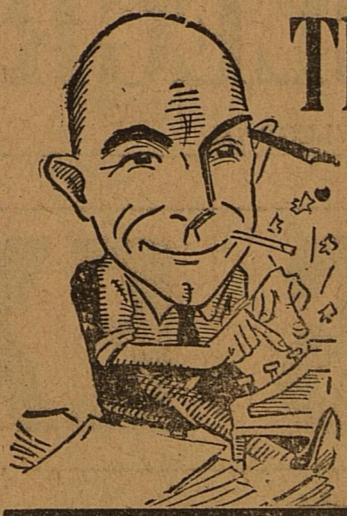

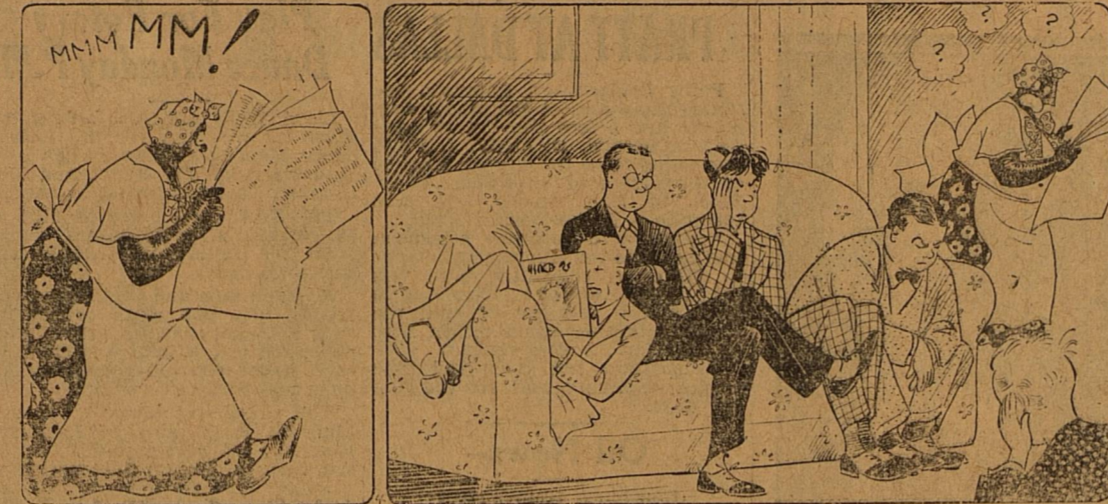
Gulls Return to Lakes
