### Over 1100 Loans Are Issued by FRA

ARRILLO March 1. (Spl.)—
More than eleven hundred loans, totalling over forty thousand dollars, have been made through the regional office of the Resettlement Administration in its emergency crop protection program, stated Benjamin E. Mallary, director of the division of rural rehabilitation, today.

Emergency steps were started by Resettlement early in February when it was seen that quick action was necessary to prevent wind erosion from destroying wheat and other crops in areas in Texas and Oklahoma panhandle counties, southwestern Kansas, southeastern Colorado and New Mexico, comprising the new region.

Resettlement emergency grants are made only to farmers whose crops are now threatened by blowing and who have been unable to secure necessary funds from private or other federal lending agencies.

County committees working in conjunction with county commissioners, and policiants for emergency grants, who must sign statements that they been unable to secure aid from other sources, officials here stated.

County judges together with rural rehabilitation supervisors pass upon applicants referred to them by commissioners' courts and upon their recommendation grants are rushed through the regional office. It takes about a week to process an emergency grant and place the money in the hands of the applicant.


