Workers Threaten National Strike

CALL LEAGUE PLAN MORE THREAT THAN A PLEA FOR PEACE

Italian Journals in Attacks Upon Motive
DELAY DECISION
Desire Guarantees Before Accepting New Offer

Rome, Mar. 4 (AP)—Fascist newspapers today characterized the League of Nations appeal for peace as more like a threat than a sincere effort to halt the war. The papers branded the plea an effort to exert pressure on Italy at a moment when victory against the Ethiopians seems assured.

Well informed sources predicted that Italy would not reply with a direct yes or no to the peace plea, but would seek a definite statement on guarantees it would receive before halting hostilities.

Italy's northern army, continuing a series of major triumphs, today smashed the last complete Ethiopian army on the northern front.

A force of 30,000 Ethiopians under Ras Imru was routed after a three day battle on the western sector, along the Takazze river.

There the Ethiopians had attempted to block an Italian movement toward Lake Tana, headquarters of the Nile.

Fascists proceeded swiftly with mopping up operations in the Tembien area and in every direction the ground was littered with dead and wounded and abandoned arms.

The victory was described as complete, a one and the recent ones over three Ethiopian leaders—Ras Mulugeta, Kassa and Seyoum.

Driving forward, the fascists occupied four mountains—Andia, Endia, Mariani and Quorom.

Italian airplanes riddled with machine gun fire 4,000 Ethiopians who sought to flee from the sector and flew up and down the valley of Takazze to mop up any resistance.

GAINES WILDCAT IS REPORTED TO HAVE LIME TOP

Point Is Called at 4,300 Feet by Driller

The highlight among West Texas oil developments today is the report that one of the Permian Basin's most closely watched wildcat tests, W. T. Walsh and Harry Adams No. 1, Averitt in central Gaines County, has enticed solid limestone. Top of the "big lime" was called at 4,300 feet on driller's log, but the exact point will not be known until microscopic examination has been made of samples and tests is now drilling ahead below 4,320 feet.

The No. 1 Averitt has made rapid progress since cleaning up the last of a long series of fishing jobs caused by gas kicks. It is being drilled into a geophysical structure mapped by several crews about 3 miles northwest of the site in section 228, block G, W. T. R. R. survey.

In section 414, block G, C. C. S. D. & R. G. N. G. survey, 14 miles northwest of the Walsh and Adams test, Wahlenmaier, York and Harper No. 1 Dr. E. H. Jones is drilling hard lime at 5172 feet. 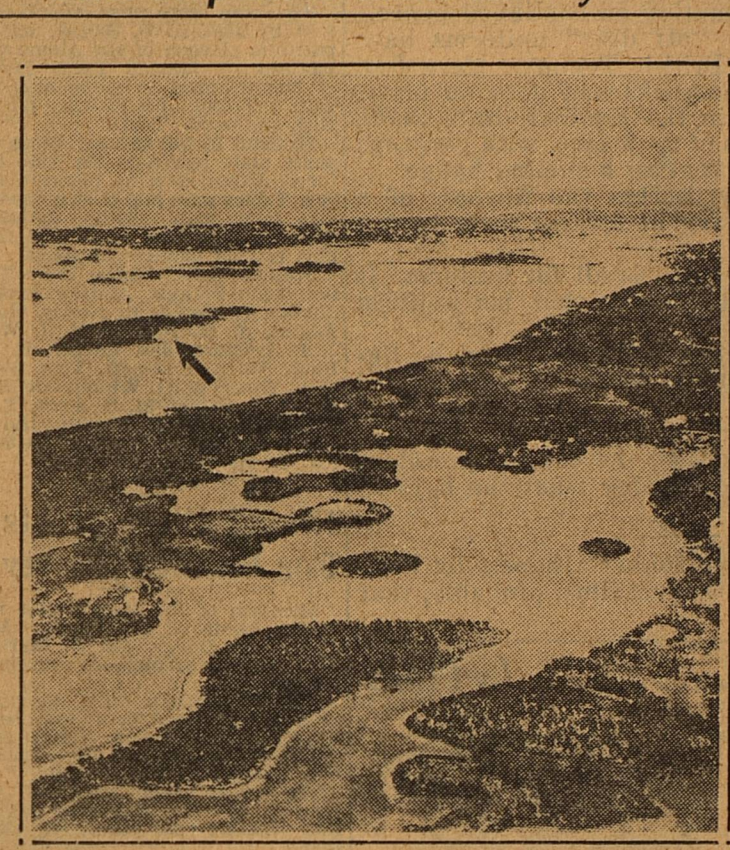

Roosevelt Enters 4th Year in Office

President Faces Arduous Campaign With Confidence, Followers Reveal

WASHINGTON, Mar. 4 (AP)—President Roosevelt today entered the homestretch of his administration faced with the task of soon going before the nation to uphold in a campaign for reelection the New Deal policies that have made the country as "government conscious" as during the days of the Civil War.

The Chief Executive, facing the last nine months of his present term, has rounded out his program of social and economic legislation, some of which has been declared unconstitutional by the Supreme Court. Now he is prepared to fight to the last ditch for his return to the White House for another four years.

Mr. Roosevelt, however, faces the future with confidence, and close friends insist that he feels the voters will rally again behind his standard that first was waved for the "Forgotten Man" and then as his program took shape, the "New Deal."

All Building Service Employes Facing Walkout
RIOTS GENERAL
Manhattan Police in Sharp Clashes With Sympathizers

New York, Mar. 4 (AP)—A threat of a nation-wide strike of building service employes was added today to indications that the walkout of New York building workers might be extended to other fields.

Sharp clashes between police and 5,000 strike sympathizers preceded the general strike threat. Marching demonstrators smashed windows when a seven hour conference of strikers and representatives of the Realty Advisory Board ended with out action.

"No progress was made" was the comment of James J. Bambrick, president of the Building Service Employee's Union, as he strode out of city hall.

Intervention of the Federal Government was promised as Assistant Secretary of Labor Edward F. McGrady raced toward New York.

Failure of the conference left thousands of New Yorkers facing another night in unheated apartments, to which they had to climb many weary flights of steps.

WORST 'DUSTER' OF YEAR HITS TEXAS; EAST NEW MEXICO

"As Bad as '35" Said To Be Outlook In States

Albuquerque, Mar. 4 (AP)—The worst dust storm of 1936 struck eastern New Mexico today, and a heavy black pall hung over the plains region and the Pecos valley. The weather bureau has reported that the dust storm probably will be as severe as last year's in this section.

Rain, totaling one-tenth of an inch, fell in Midland Tuesday evening, but failed to help conditions because of its lightness.

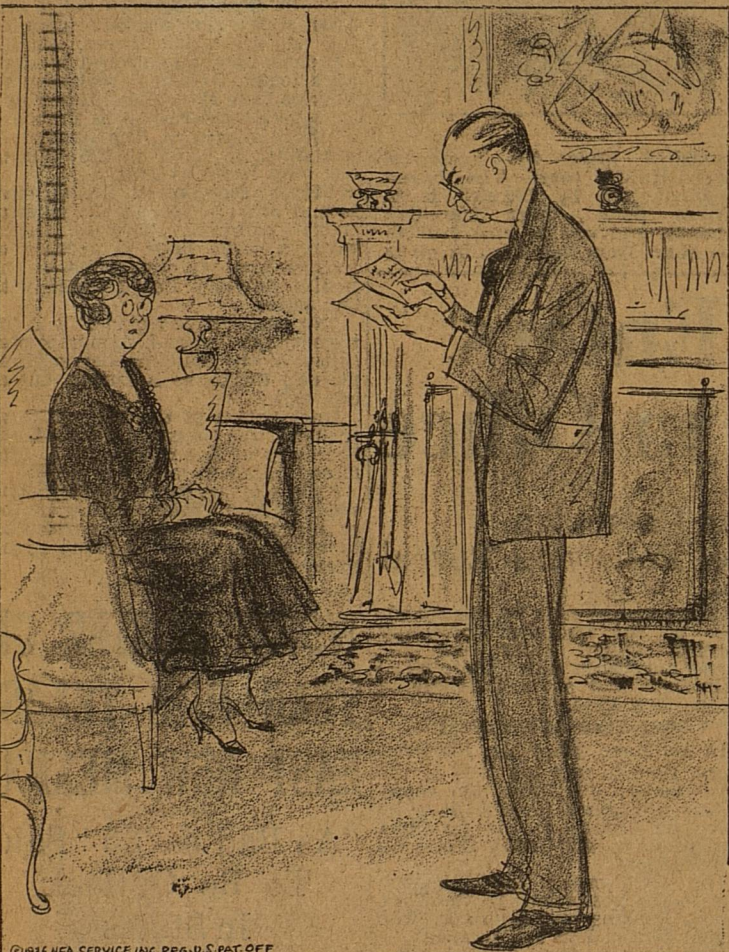
HARBINGER OF PEACE

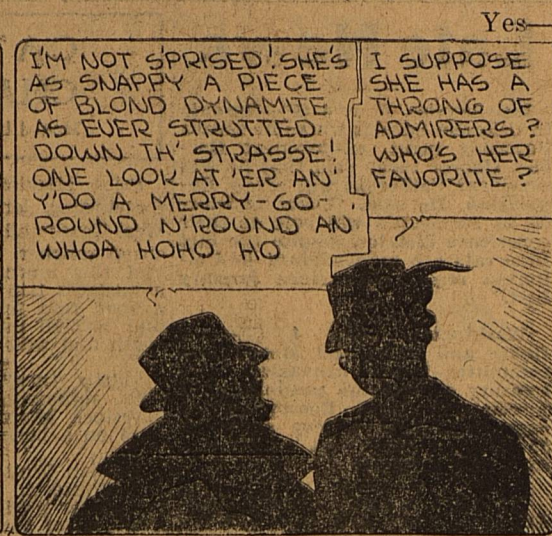

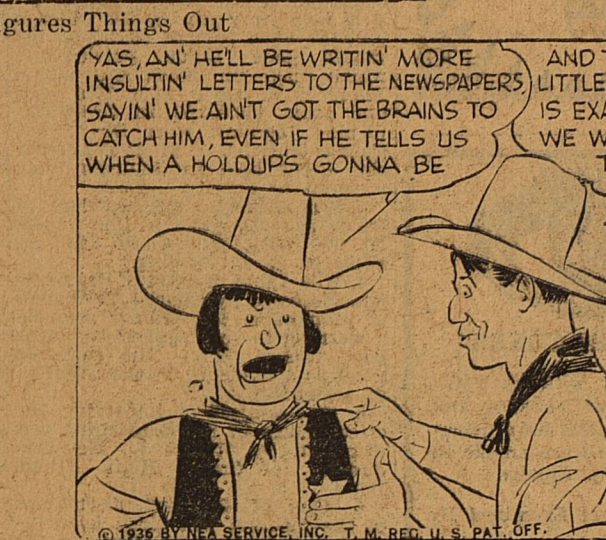

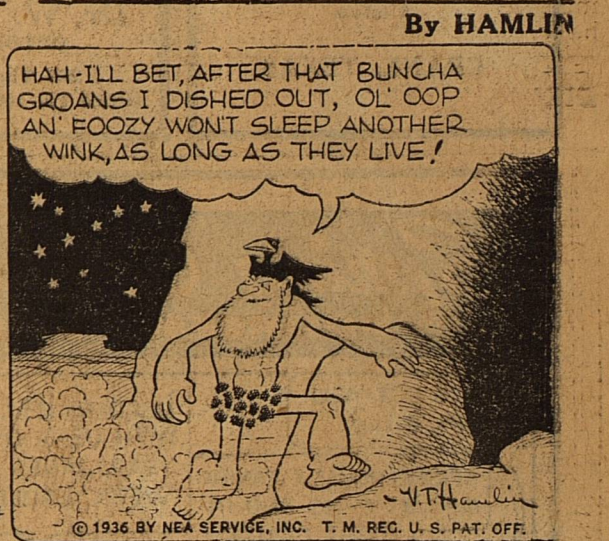

Divorces Up in Britain

State parks at Bastrop, Lockhart, Palmette (near Gonzales), Goliad, Lake Corpus Christi and Goose Island were assigned Fiedelke. Others under his supervision included Fort Parker, Cleburne, Mother Neff and Longhorn Cavern state parks.
