Hospital approves new redistricting plan

The Muleshoe Area Hospital District Board of Directors on Thursday night approved a reapportionment plan for the hospital district's voting places.

The board made the decision, based on a recommendation from the hospital's Census Planning Committee. Composed of 13 people, the com-

mittee had a general consensus which favored Plan #5, out of seven proposals which were recommended by Daugherty and Associates of Amarillo, the legal firm which was hired to provide legal counsel to the hospital.

Under the plan which was approved Thursday night, two

hospital districts will be created that contain a majority population of Hispanics. The two minority majority districts were recommended because Hispanics make up 1/4 of the population in Bailey County and it will increase the potential of having representation on the hospital's five-member

The hospital was required to realign the districts in accordance with the Votin g Rights Act, following the 1990 cen-

In other business Thursday, the board approved a corrected audit report for the hospital and approved a an equipment maintenance insurance policy. irance will be used to cover technical medical equipment that the hospital needs serviced.

The board also gave hospital administrator Richard Muphy the go ahead to advertise for bids to seal coat the hospital parking lot.

Also on Thursday, the board

approved the reappointment of Dr. Homer Allgood, Dr. Mark McClanahan and Dr. Bruce Purdy to be active staff physicians.

Following an executive session, the hospital approved a Quality Assurance report and

Young harpist strums to a different beat

Talent is what many would use to describe her skill. But 15-year-old Sarah Watson of Muleshoe credits her special skills to another source.

Sarah is a freshman at MHS. She also plays the xylophone for the MHS band and is active in athletics.


