

Hospital approves new redistricting plan

The Muleshoe Area Hospital District Board of Directors on Thursday night approved a reapportionment plan for the hospital district's voting places.

The board made the decision, based on a recommendation from the hospital's Census Planning Committee. Composed of 13 people, the com-

mittee had a general consensus which favored Plan #5, out of seven proposals which were recommended by Daugherty and Associates of Amarillo, the legal firm which was hired to provide legal counsel to the hospital.

Under the plan which was approved Thursday night, two

hospital districts will be created that contain a majority population of Hispanics. The two minority majority districts were recommended because Hispanics make up 1/4 of the population in Bailey County and it will increase the potential of having representation on the hospital's five-member

board.

The hospital was required to realign the districts in accordance with the Voting Rights Act, following the 1990 census.

In other business Thursday, the board approved a corrected audit report for the hospital and approved an equipment

maintenance insurance policy. Insurance will be used to cover technical medical equipment that the hospital needs serviced.

The board also gave hospital administrator Richard Muphy the go ahead to advertise for bids to seal coat the hospital parking lot.

Also on Thursday, the board

approved the reappointment of Dr. Homer Allgood, Dr. Mark McClanahan and Dr. Bruce Purdy to be active staff physicians.

Following an executive session, the hospital approved a Quality Assurance report and

Young harpist strums to a different beat

Talent is what many would use to describe her skill. But 15-year-old Sarah Watson of Muleshoe credits her special skills to another source.

She does not play a clarinet, trombone or trumpet like many students at Muleshoe High School. Watson seems to favor the more exotic. She plays a harp.

"It is a God-given talent. I enjoy it a lot," Watson said.

Watson did not stumble upon the harp by accident though. She had an opportunity to hear nationally-known Christian harpist Greg Buchanan at a concert at First Baptist Church in Clovis in 1989. That is when she set her mind on learning to play the harp.

Her parents, Jim and Sandra Watson, have been supportive and encouraging towards Sarah's music lessons from the start. They enrolled her in harp lessons at Texas Tech University in Lubbock and gave her a harp of her own for Christmas last year.

"The harp was expensive but we found a way to get one," Sarah said. Her parents ordered the harp by mail from Chicago.

Sarah's instructor, Ynai Cai, has also given her a vote of high confidence.

"Sarah is a very sharp student and she picks up very fast," Ynai said. "The harp is a difficult instrument to

learn, not many people can learn to play the harp well. I wish she would become a professional harp performer."

Sarah said she doesn't find it difficult to play her harp now, after four years of lessons. Her harp is 5'6" in height, but she feels comfortable with her instrument.

"It was hard to coordinate my hands with the notes at first," Sarah said. "But I think I have progressed and I don't have the same level of difficulty. I am starting to get the feel for it so it is starting to feel natural."

Playing the harp has become second nature to Sarah now, that she wants to start playing the harp in public.

She recently performed at Marshall Junior High School in Clovis during intermission for a play. Sarah said she has also played at her church and has a recital coming up at Texas Tech on May 14.

Lust recognized by Angus Association

Tim Lust of Muleshoe has been recognized nationally by the American Angus Association for having one registered Angus cow included in the American Angus Association's 1994 Pathfinder Report.

Only 1,391 of the more than 25,000 members of the American Angus Association are represented in this year's report.

The Pathfinder Program identifies superior Angus cows based upon recorded performance traits that are economically important to efficient beef production. These traits include regular calving and heavy weaning weights.

All registered Angus cows that meet the strict Pathfinder standards are listed, along with their owners, in the Pathfinder Report, which is published

annually by the American Angus Association.

The 1994 Pathfinder Report lists 5,317 individual cows. It is published in the May issue of the Angus Journal.

The largest number of Pathfinder cows from a single herd this year is 80, and several hundred breeders have a single cow that qualifies for the exclusive listing.

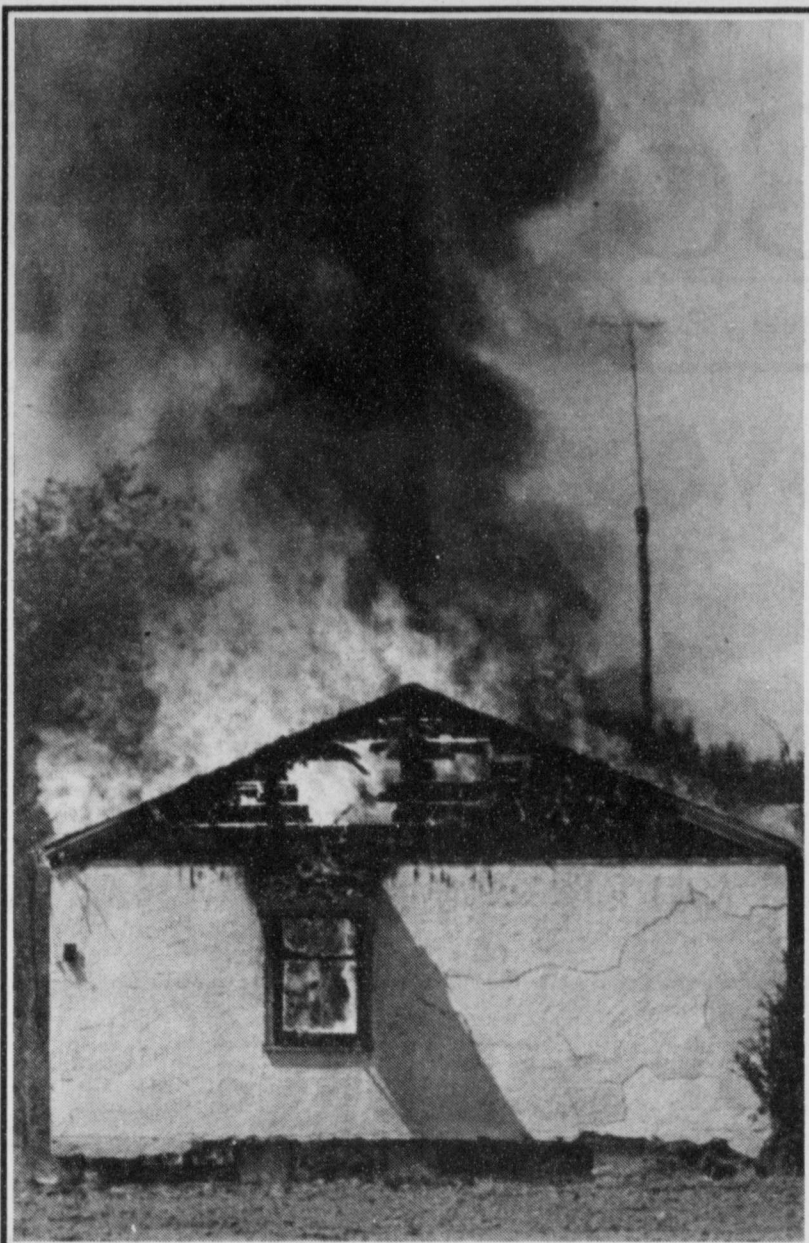

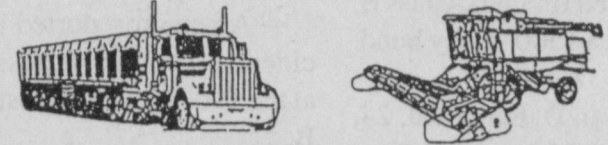

Somewhere between my fingers on the computer keyboard and the newspaper that landed in the vicinity of my driveway, the headline of last week's column changed. No problem. My brother writes a column for *The Amarillo Globe News*, and he never picks his own title; they do it at the newspaper; it's always as much a surprise to him as anyone else, and it usually works out fine.

A title change is no big deal unless it changes the meaning of what follows. I'll never forget the experience of a clergy friend in Amarillo who attended a seminar centering on the physical abuse some wives have endured. He simply commented that as bad as that is, some psychological abuse can be as bad or worse. A reporter picked up his quote, sort of, and ran it under a headline something like this: "Local Minister Adovates Wife-Beating."

By most Monday mornings I can barely remember the sermon topic of the morning before. Sundays come too regu-

larly. If you don't remember last week's column, believe me, I understand. I'd entitled it, "Ghandi and John." It compared Mahatma Ghandi's and the Apostle John's words regarding love and unity, words that were very similar even though Ghandi was a Hindu and John was a Christian.

But the title of the column came out, "Ghandi Was Example of a True Christian." That Ghandi was an example and a good one for Hindus and Christians alike, I affirm. Thankful that God is the judge, I fully agree with missionary E. Stanley Jones who said, "If Ghandi is not in heave, then heaven is the poorer for it."

But Ghandi was not a Christian -- "true," "false," or otherwise. He never claimed to be. And he would not feel particularly honored to be handed the title. If history is any judge, he was an amazingly fine man. But he was not a Christian.

A Christian is a person who places his faith and trust in Jesus Christ as the very Son of God and surrenders his life to Christ as lord of all. I know some exceptionally fine people who haven't done that. I wish they would. They are fine people and fine examples to Christians and non-Christians alike, but they are not Christians. They've never claimed to be, and we do them no favors by handing them a title they never desired, a title which then becomes meaningless.
