Holiday Death Toll Is 201

12 PERSONS IN STATE LOSE LIVES IN ACCIDENTS

24 More Killed This Year Than Last July 4th

By Associated Press
The nation counted at least 201, including 12 in Texas, dead today with thousands more injured, as the cost of its celebration yesterday of the 159th birthday of the country.
The total accidental deaths yesterday compared with 177 recorded last year, fewest in six years and 483 killed in 1931, the costliest holiday on record.
The mid-west with 79 dead yesterday led all other sections of the country in fatalities.
An associated press survey showed

An associated press survey showed that two of the deaths were directly attributed to fireworks, automobiles killed 82 and 77 drowned.


