AMERICANS TO LEAVE ETHIOPIA

New Tax Laws to Raise Millions

CONGRESS COMM. WORKING TO PUT BILL IN SHAPE

No Agreement as to How Much Will Be Raised

WASHINGTON, July 6, (AP).—Tax laws that will raise \$350,000,000 to \$500,000,000 yearly were disclosed today as the aim of a leading congressional committee putting the President's program into bill form.

HI SCHOOL GIVEN 2 MORE CREDITS

Official notice from the State Department of Education has been received by Midland school authorities to the effect that Midland high school has been granted two additional units of affiliation with all colleges and universities of the Southern Association. The additional units are: Fourth unit in public school music, and second unit in band, making a total of four units in the former and two units in the latter, and a grand total of 41 units held by the local school. While the additional units were granted in response to application by local authorities and consequently were not a surprise to them, still the fact that they were granted on the recommendation of the State visitor and superintendent without the submission of material, was highly gratifying to the school and to those in charge of the courses.
