## High Plains Area Grows More Cotton

A 1935 cotton crop of 3,275,000 bales of 500 pounds gross weight is forecast for Texas, based on completion as of October 1. The present forecast is 92,000 bales or 5.5 per cent below the forecast made on September 1, and compares with 3,406,000 bales produced in 1934 and 1,924,000 bales the 10-year average (1924-1933). The October 1, 1935, condition, at 60 per cent of normal, compares with 47 per cent a year ago and a 10-year average of 57 per cent. A condition of 60 per cent on October 1 indicates a lint yield of 142 pounds per acre. The yield in 1934 was 112 pounds per acre and the 10-year average yield is 144 pounds. The area remaining for harvest is estimated at 1,684,000 acres, which compares with 10,297,000 acres in 1934 and 11,488,000 acres in 1933. The forecast of yield and production is based upon the present condition of the crop. However, the final output of cotton will depend upon whether the various influences affecting the crop during the remainder of the season are more or less favorable than usual.

COLLEGE STATION, (AP)—A. D. Jones, chief of division of publications of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, in a bulletin upon the prosaic subject of butter, says that scientists have determined that yellow butter is better for humans than consume it.

A dairy cow receiving seven pounds of yellow corn and six pounds of heat dried alfalfa meal supplying 116,000 units of vitamin A daily reduced butterfat which decreased in vitamin A content from 32 units per gram when fresh off pasture to 12 units in eight weeks.

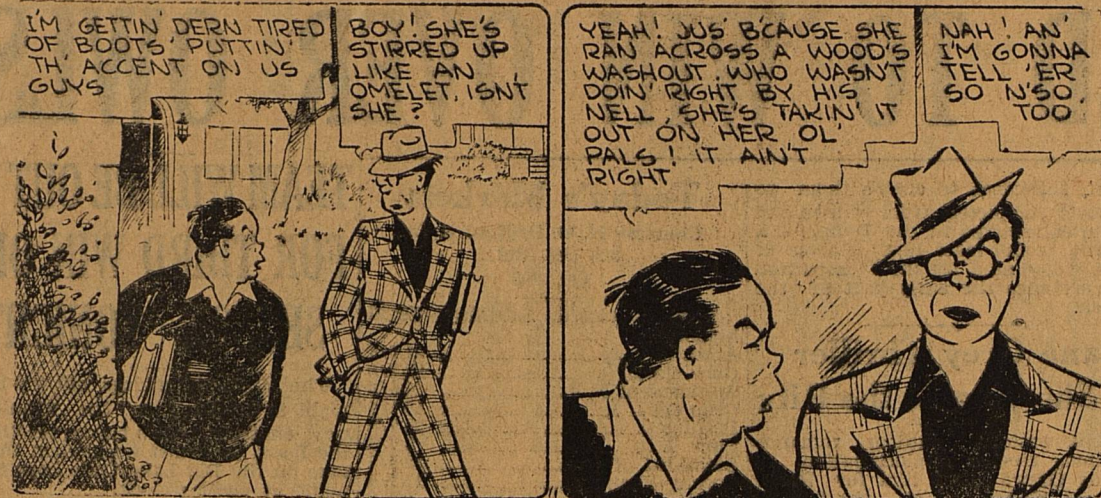


**Humor Mixed in Serious Work of Texas Lawmakers**

The Bulldogs now have won two games and have lost one but are expected to cop the game tonight to bring their season's average up to .750. The Owls have one of the lightest teams to be found anywhere in this section and it is believed that the Midland line will be able to make holes in the Owl line that will allow Midkiff and Wofford to go for several scores. The Midland line will outweigh that of the visitors at least 15 pounds per man and the backfield differences in weight is about the same. Collins, Midland fullback, will be out of the game due to a severe charley-horse and his place will probably be taken by Reed, who has been coming along fast in recent practices. The Owls boast four fast backfield men and a couple of pass-snatching ends but it will be a distinct upset if they can overcome the jareg Bulldog weight advantage and put over a win. Coach Baumgarten has been working the boys hard all week on pass defense and says that they are far better able now to stop an attack than last week, when they let Pecos complete two passes for touchdowns.

## Pecos County Oil Title Case Goes To Supreme Court

WASHINGTON, (U.P.)—The Supreme Court has been asked to determine title to oil and gas land in Pecos county, Texas, valued at \$100,000 because of its oil and gas rights. The case comes from the El Paso federal district court which ordered John H. Tyler, Eula B. Tyler and M. H. Reed to take no further steps to obtain title without its consent and the fifth circuit court of appeals approved that action. In 1928, the Tylers and Reed began proceedings with the state general land office seeking a determination of whether the land in question was vacant and belonging to the state so they could purchase title to the surface and then lease the land for oil and gas, as state agents, and become eligible to receive one-half of the bonus and royalty paid under the lease.

The Stanolind Oil and Gas Company of Delaware and the Shell Petroleum Corporation of Virginia asked the El Paso court to stop proceedings. The Texas attorney general found the land belonged to the state and the Tylers and Reed started proceedings in state court designed to acquire title. The state then followed with a suit in the Pecos county district court to oust the oil companies and about 100 others who claimed title from Texas to the disputed property. Tyler and the other claimants claimed the El Paso court was without jurisdiction to consider the cases brought by the oil companies. The court held against them.

## Hungry Boy Gets New Home

SPRINGFIELD, Mo. (U.P.)—Police took Gene Arnold, 10, away from his parents and sent him to an industrial home when they discovered he was allowed only a cup of coffee and a roll each day. Forty-seven hundred and seventy miles of thread have been spun out of a single pound of cotton.
