Cow-ponies, kid-ponies and Shet-land ponies will get a chance at the Midland Fair race track Saturday afternoon, it was announced this morning by Roy Parks, chairman of the rodeo committee.

Three races were added to the program of rodeo events, as follows:

Stockholders' race, each entrant to be a stockholder in the Midland Fair, riding his own horse with stock saddle, distance one-fourth mile, prize \$15 Stetson hat to winner of first place. No prizes for place or show.

Kid-pony race, 300 yards, entrants to be under 15 years of age, riding own pony which must be 14 hands 2 inches or under; \$10 purse divided first \$5, second \$3 and third \$2.

The exhibitor of the reserve champion load of heifers will receive an eight foot Axtell windmill from the Axtell Co., Fort Worth.



### NEW OPENING FOR HITLER

Do not be surprised if the next momentous news from the tangle of European politics is an announcement that Tuesday Meeting Germany has militarily occupied the Rhineland.

A few years ago such a step would certainly have caused a war. Now it probably would not do so. For one thing, England is understood to have informed France that mere resumption of German military activity in the demilitarized zone would not be considered, in London, as an act of aggression.

For another, the French have finally completed their long chain of frontier forts; a German army on the Rhine would not be the direct menace that it would have been half a dozen years ago.

Nevertheless, such a move—reliably reported to be contemplated by the Hitler government-would increase the tension. It would be one more token of Hitler's determination to restore Germany to a position of full military preparedness in spite of treaty restrictions or international opposition.
