
START AGAINST RACKETEERING

The Department of Justice's famous manhunters are about to tackle the menace of the racketeer-the strongarm man who leaves tribute from legitimate business and labor organizations by threat of violence. However, as Director J. Edgar Hoover points out, too

much must not be expected of the "G men" in this field. They can act only where the racketeering has an interstate angle. Purely local rackets can be touched only by the local police force.

BROLLED GRAPEFRUIT makes a delicious appetizer or dessert. Cut grapefruit in halves and remove centers and seeds. Cut the fruit from the skin with a sharp knife. Add a teaspoon of butter and one of sugar to each center. Broil in hot oven until fruit turns a light colden brown.

CARROTS come to the table bak-ed in their skins, with plenty of but-ter and seasonings. You may serve lenon butter sauce with them, which is made by melting 3 table-spoons of butter to 1 tablespoon of lemon juice. Pour sauce over baked carrots just before serving. Select carrots that are uniform in size. Wash well and leave in their packets. Arrange in a well buttered glass baking dish, dot generously with butter and season. Bake in a hot oven until done.





"His delusions were insane delu-sions," Dr. Wooten testified. "He lived on a dream stage out of all proportion to his education and op-portunities. He felt his mission in the scientific world was similar to that of Jesus Christ in the spirit-ual."

By cross - examination, Hart, sought to show that Pierson was capable of conferring with his at-torneys and making a rational de-fense and that he remembered clear-ly details of the planning and exe-cution of the crime.

"Didn't he know it was against the law to kill his parents?" Hart asked, referring also to his attempts a concealment.

a concealment. "He didn't care," Dr. Wooten re-plied. "He was so dominated by impulses he didn't stop to consider. A good memory for details is a sym-tom of the defense." Pierson's elder sister, Mrs. Alice Thomas of Salina, Kan., likewise said Howard Pierson thought he was not the son of Justice and Mrs. Pierson.





