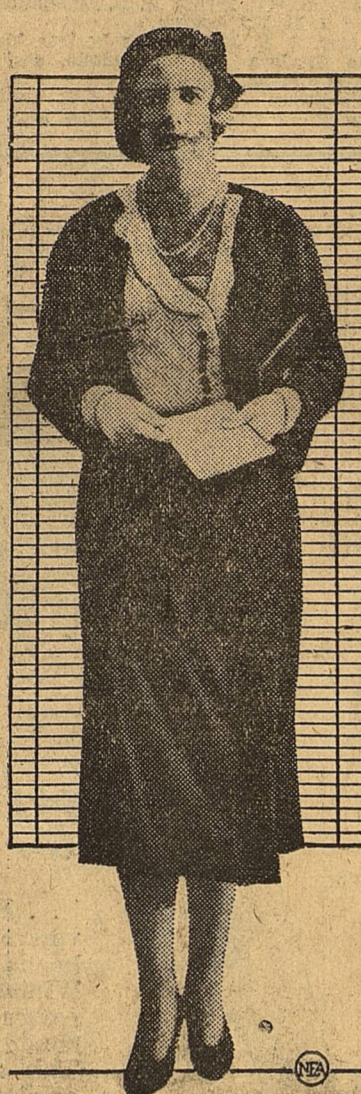

FOUR MEN DIE IN A BIG FIRE

Fifty Flee in Time To Escape Dallas Fire Hurts

DALLAS, March 22. (UP)—Four men were burned to death here about five o'clock this morning when a fire fanned by a strong wind swept the Elm Hotel. Four others were burned, one seriously. Fifty fled into near-freezing weather scantily clad.

The identified dead were: W. H. Bodenheimer, 50, Dallas; Grover Hobson, 60, Sherman; Frank Fisher, 40, Little Rock; Frank Granger, Chicago.

A fireman found the bodies of the men trapped in their rooms. The blaze was discovered by Mrs. H. R. Wood, proprietor, in the rear of the hotel, who sounded the alarm. Two business firms below were damaged.

This was the second blaze here this morning causing casualties. A few hours earlier two fire trucks collided answering a call and five firemen were injured. R. M. McCard was hurt most seriously, having back and hip injuries. That fire destroyed a two-story combination business and residence and forced occupants to jump from the second story to safety.

SHAWNEE, Okla., March 22. (UP)—Stanley Haskett, 62, farmer, and his wife Eva, 43, daughter, Julia, 17, and Donald, 5, perished in a fire which destroyed their farm home eight miles southeast of here at midnight. Hugh, 13, escaped.

Organization Urged By Several Young Business Men

Study of the possible organization of a junior chamber of commerce in Midland was assigned by action of the board of directors of the Midland chamber of commerce at their meeting Monday night to the executive committee composed of Marvin C. Ulmer, J. E. Hill, Geo. D. McCormick, and Ralph M. Barron, supplemented by Marion F. Peters, Homer Epley and T. Paul Barron.

A group of younger men attended the meeting Monday night and urged organization. Herbert Berry, Delo Douglas, and Earl Ray made brief statements of what they believed would be the value to the city and to the development of young business men through organization of the senior chamber must serve as secretary of junior chambers in all but major cities, and all who join a junior chamber must pay a membership fee, which goes into the general treasury. 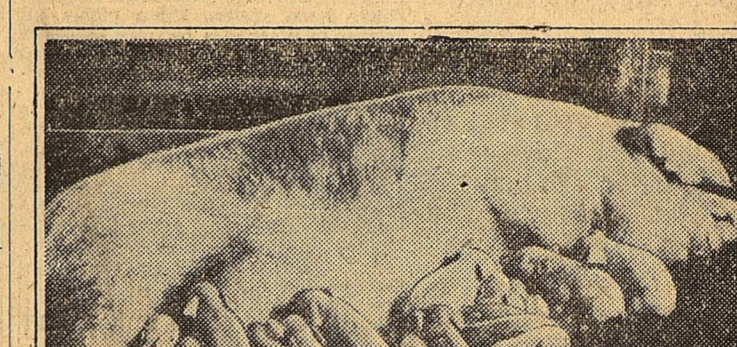

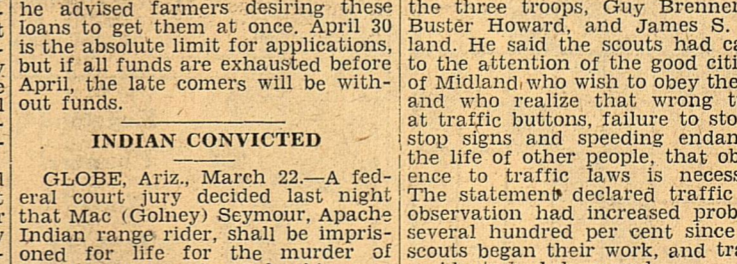

700 ARE INJURED BY BLAST

Central Alabama Is Hardest Hit; 149 Killed There

* ATLANTA, March 22. (UP)—Twenty widely separated communities in five states of the Old South counted 193 dead, and 700 injured today from storms of cyclonic violence late Monday and early today. The main storm struck central Alabama where the dead totalled 149, then dipped into Georgia, causing 28 deaths. Thirteen in Tennessee, one in South Carolina and two in Kentucky were killed. Guardsmen were on duty at Tuscaloosa and Northport, Alabama, to aid relief workers and prevent looting. The known dead reached 25 at Northport, Chilton county, 100 miles south east of Tuscaloosa reported 26 dead. Thorsdy, Plantersville, and Union Grove were virtually wiped out. Rescue parties were slowly making their way today through the debris-strewn countryside expecting to find more dead and injured in isolated rural communities.

Her husband and Miss Guly escaped with negligible injuries.

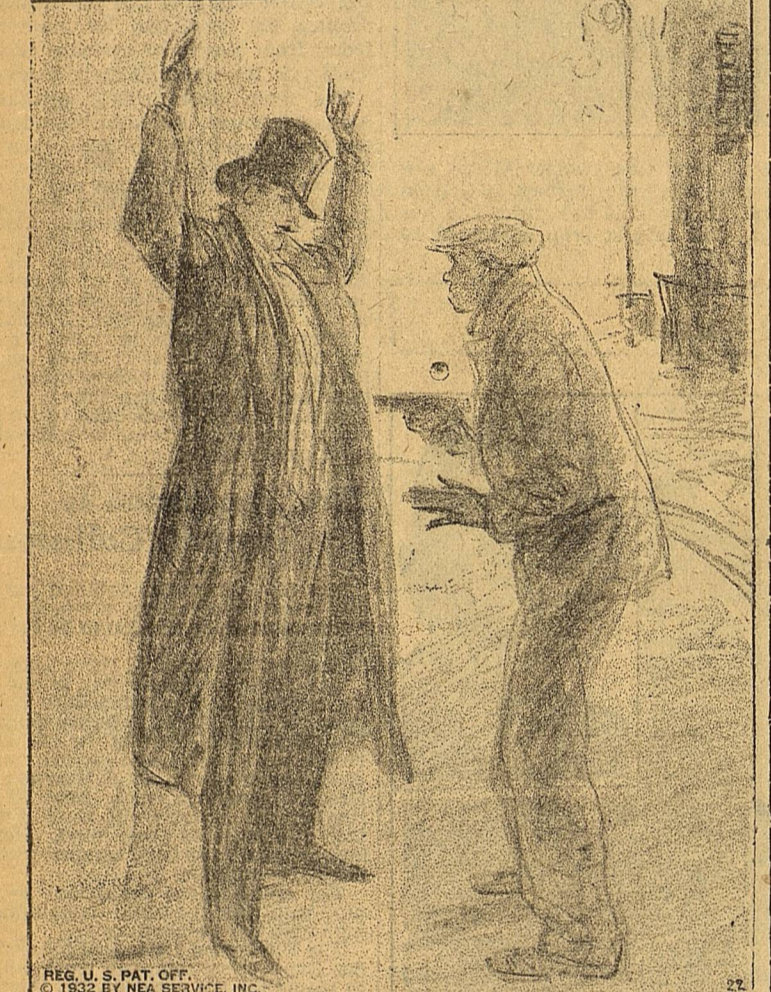
A WELCOME LOSS

Lohansen won his reputation as a trench builder during the days of the first war pictures in Hollywood. He consented to supervise a job of trench building for a director friend. He was so efficient that other jobs came to him and Hollywood got "Lohansen mind" whenever a war film was made.
