## **GREEK REBELLION** QUELLED AFTER 3 KILLED, 37 HURT

ATHENS, Greece, August 6. (P)—A bloody one-day revolt that left three persons killed and thirty-seven

The 4,000 riotous strikers who earlier in the day sacked administrative offices at Candia, defying police and troops, dispersed peacefully and will be disarmed forthwith, the General informed the Government at Athens. Two warships, dispatched toward Crete with a squadron of bombing planes and troop reinforcements, were recalled.

An official casualty list said the wounded included six policemen and twenty laborers, but records reaching here said three strikers were killed

General Bakopoulis warned the strikers his men would fire unless they withdrew from the streets and when they refused, a frantic plea for troop reinforcements was sent to Athens.



#### FEEDER CATTLE PRICES GOING UP

Organizers of the Midland Fair, having in mind as the chief feature the attraction of northern buyers of feeder cattle, apparently siezed the proper year in which to begin the new \$30,000 venture.

The Hereford Journal of August 1 quotes leading livestock authorities as saying the best feeder cattle prices in years will be obtained by the producers this fall. One authority says the price will exceed last year's figures by \$2.50 to \$3 per hundredweight.

Two significant articles from the Journal follow:

Fewer cattle and calves will be slaughtered this fall than last when the drouth forced heavy marketings, according to the mid-summer beef cattle outlook report issued recently by the U.S. Bureau of Agricultural Economics. The reduction is expected to be chiefly in slaughter of calves and of the better grades of steers.

The bureau expects a larger number of cattle will be fed in the Cornbelt this fall and next winter in view of increased feed grain production. The result will be larger marketings of grain-fed cattle during the first half of 1936 compared with the corresponding period of 1935.

A much stronger consumer demand for beef and veal this year compared with last is reported, with indications of further improvement during coming months. This is based upon prospects for increased consumer incomes the remainder of this year and during

early 1936, and on reduced supplies of pork.

The bureau expects the demand for feeder cattle to be much stronger this fall than last because cattle finishers had good returns on cattle fed last winter and spring and there is prospect for increased supplies of feed in relation to the number of cattle and hogs available for feeding this year compared with last.

Cattle prices are expected to average much higher the remainder of this year than last year since slaughter supplies during the next five months will be somewhat smaller than in the corresponding period of 1934 and because of improved consumer demand. Higher prices for better grades of slaughter cattle are in prospect from now until late fall or early winter; prices of the lower grades may also advance, especially if there is a strong demand for cattle for feeding and restocking and restocking.

Prices of stocker and feeder cattle probably will average much

higher this fall than in five years past in view of current prices of slaughter cattle, says the bureau. The combined cost of feeder cattle and of finishing them for market next winter and spring, it is

cattle and of finishing them for market next winter and spring, it is stated, may be the highest price since the winter of 1930-31.

Looking further ahead, the bureau says that prices of the better grades of slaughter cattle during the first half of 1936 may average less than in the corresponding period of 1935, because of the probable increase in marketings of grain-fed cattle.

There may be about the same number of cattle on farms and ranches at the beginning of 1936 as there were at the beginning of 1935, but thereafter the bureau believes numbers will increase. Most of this increase for the next few years is expected to take place in states west of the Mississippi river where the number of cattle was sharply reduced in 1934. sharply reduced in 1934.

No material increase is in prospect in other areas, it is stated, unless reduced production of cash crops should result in increased production of hay and pasture.

That feeder cattle would sell this fall for an average of \$2.50 to \$3 per cwt. higher than they did a year ago, was the opinion expressed recently by L. M. Pexton of the Denver Union Stock Yards Co. in a radio talk. This opinion, he said, was based upon information gathered at the Denver stockyards, and was founded on the assumption that there would be a good corn crop throughout the cattle-feeding aren.

"This," said Mr. Pexton, "means an advance in feeder steer prices from an average of \$5 per cwt. last year to \$8 per cwt. this year. It is expected that good cows which brought \$3.50 last fall would bring \$5 to \$5.50 per cwt. this fall. The drop in the cattle market during the past 60 days of about \$2 per cwt. on the average, however, will militate against these prices for feeders if the corn

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





They are usually a combination of sugar, cream and color from fruit juices. The cream must be treated with a grease solvent, such as carbon tetrachloride. To erase the fruit juice, pour boiling water through the spot.








