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AMERICA GIVES YOUTH ITS OPPORTUNITY

Thousands of college graduates today have their diplomas and their education because the government interested itself in them. There will be more thousands next year.

That is the first answer of the National Youth Administration to the query, "What are you doing for American youth with that \$50,000,000 fund you were handed, to give it a boost?"

A hundred thousand young men and women were enabled to attend college during the year 1934-35 because the government paid them \$15 a month for work on or near the campuses of nearly 2000 colleges. This coming college year of 1935-36, some 250,000 will be so aided. The NYA has taken over and expanded the work started by the Federal Emergency Relief Administration last year.

This is the newest effort to answer the pressing problem of youth, a problem that is answered in Germany by labor camps, and in Italy by the army. The answer means a chance to work one's way through the college of one's choice, studying what one wishes. The chance is given only to those who could not otherwise attend.

The plan has been tried long enough to get some idea of how it works. The University of Minnesota, for instance, graded its federal-aid students and found that 72.2 per cent of them ranked excellent or superior, while 92.8 per cent were better than average. That would seem to show that the young men appreciate the opportunity being given them.

Note that for the time being, such young men and women are removed from competition for jobs with the unemployed. The work given them at college, assistantships, community work, surveys, library, nursing, community center direction, research of one kind and another, is generally work not competing with wage-earners. It is usually work that impoverished colleges would not be doing at all were it not for this youth program.

Unlimited good may be accomplished by this activity if it succeeds in creating leadership in the persons of men and women better equipped to face today's complex life. Seeds of citizenship yield a greater return if the crop is properly harvested than any other investment the government could make.

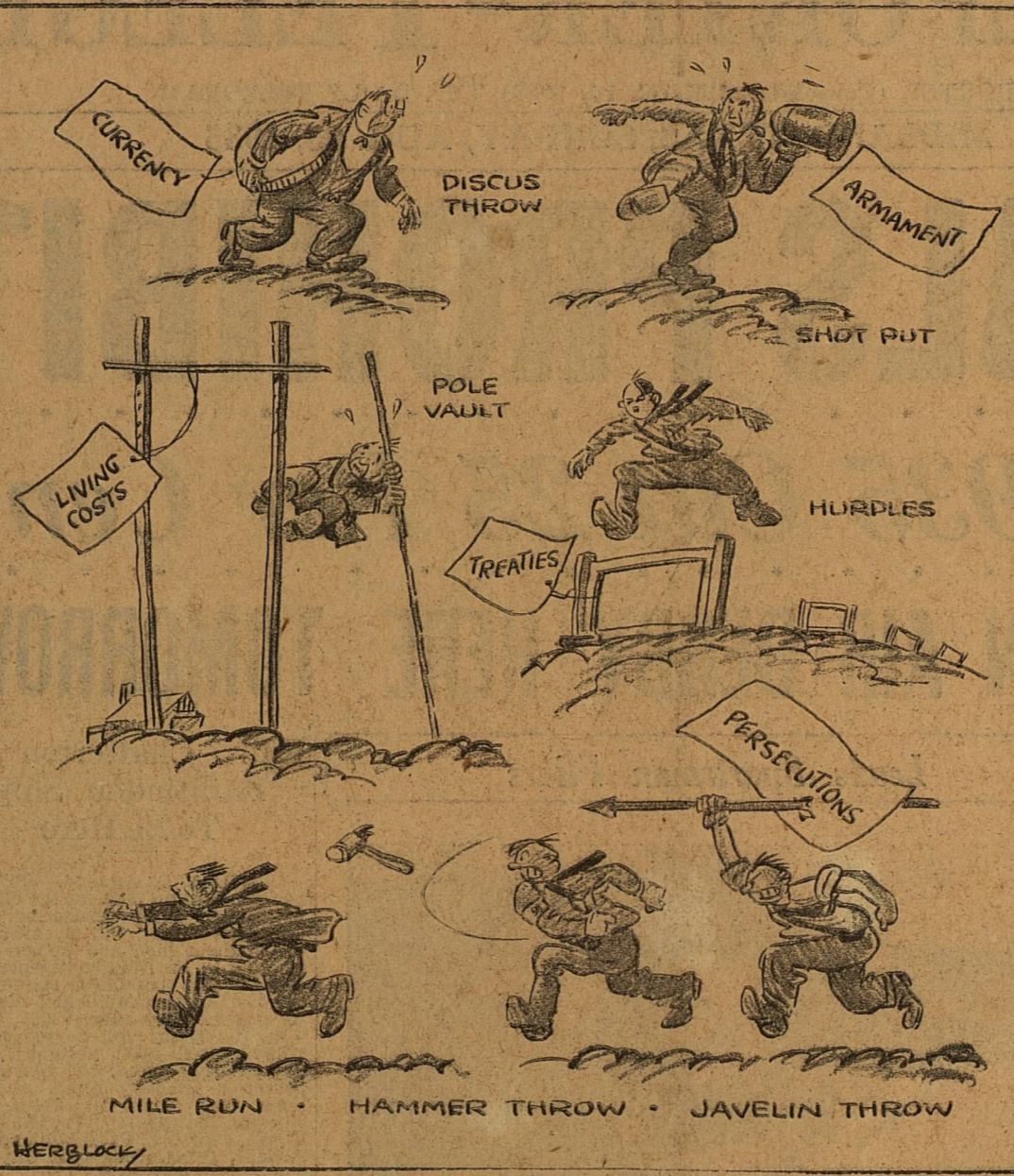

Bird Sanctuary on Green Island Found

HARLINGEN. (AP)—Green island, just off the coast of the lower Rio Grande valley, has been described by Alexander Sprunt Jr. of the National Association of Audubon Societies as one of the prettiest bird sanctuaries under his jurisdiction. Sprunt visited the valley sanctuary, more commonly known as Bird Island, this year.

Among other things he found black skimmers nesting on the island for the first time. It also was noticed that birds arrived earlier, departed and returned so that there will be nesting on the island probably later than usual. It is expected that birds with young will be found until September.

Attempt to Move RR Yards Is Being Made

EAGLE PASS, Aug. 22. (AP)—President Lazaro Cardenas, replying to a petition of Piedras Negras businessmen and the Municipal Council, telegraphed that he would do all in his power to have the Mexican National Railway shops moved back to Piedras Negras.

The railway shops were moved from Piedras Negras December 15, 1929, by order of President Plutarco Elias Calles, who gave no reason for his action. The machinery was dismantled and sent to other shops in Monclova, Monterrey and Gomez Palacios, leaving the huge shop buildings in Piedras Negras empty. The shops employed an average of 300 skilled workmen and sustained approximately 5,000 people.

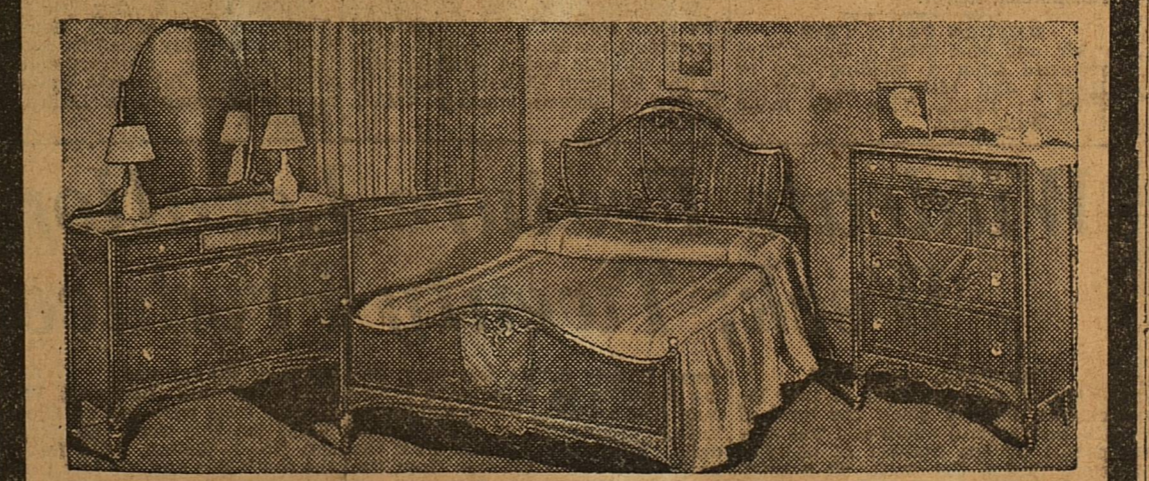
Living Cost Prices Outrun Wage Rises

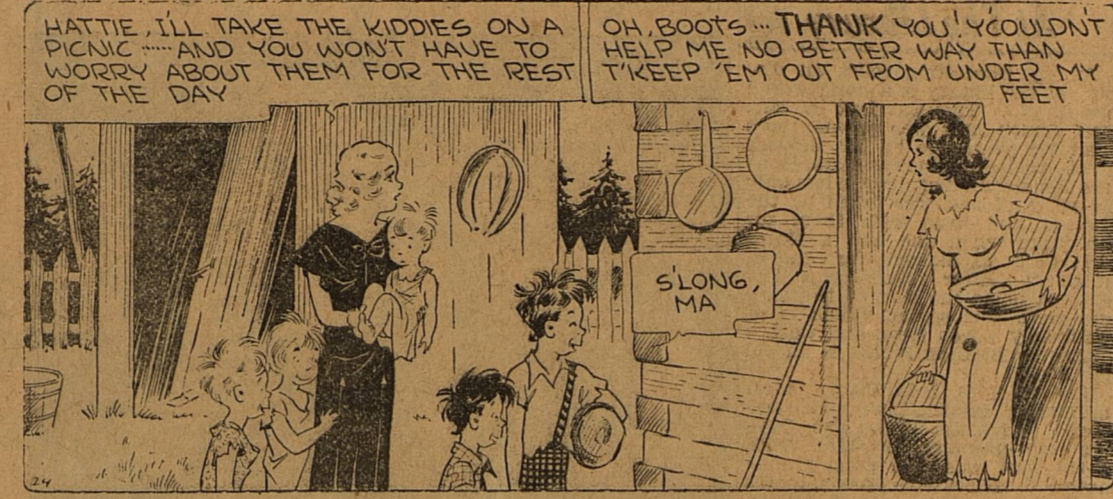

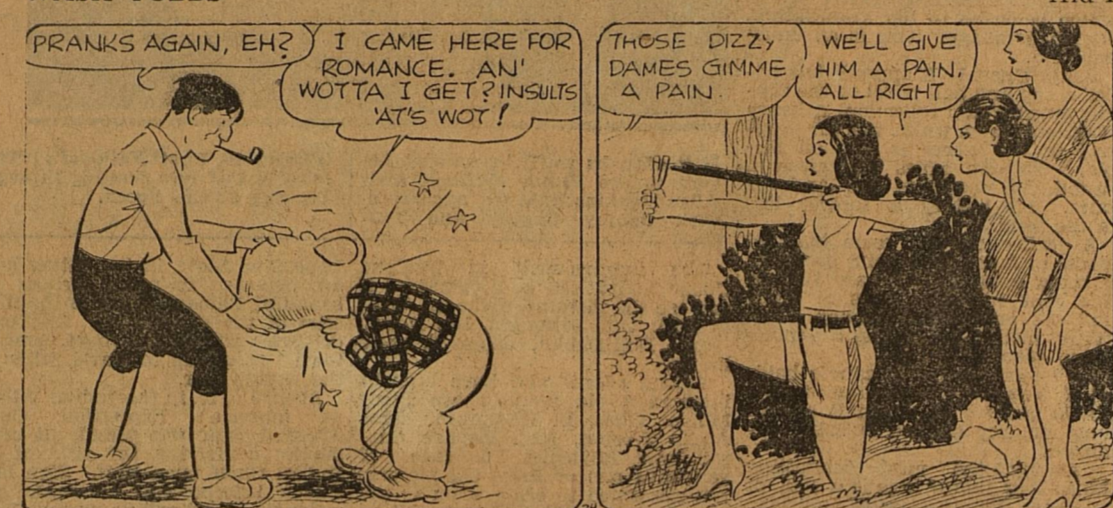

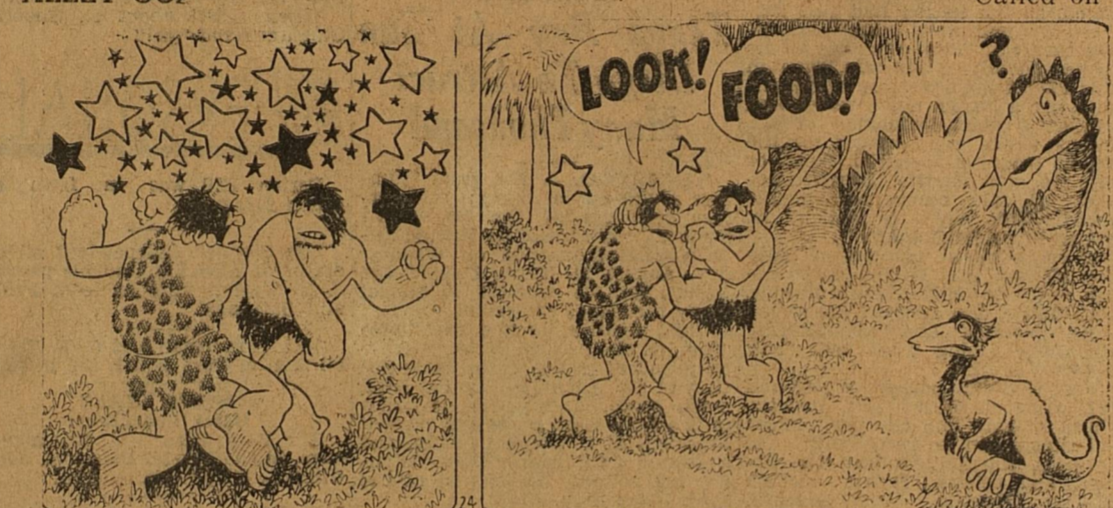

Among interesting relics on display at the library is a hand woven bed spread. This was lent by Mrs. Carl Smith and was woven more than 125 years ago by Mr. Smith's great-great-grandmother, Mrs. Hannah Pendleton. This lady, when only six years of age, was taken by the Indians and lived with them for ten years when she and a Negro girl were exchanged for Indian prisoners. After returning to her Virginia home she learned to weave and wove this spread which is of beautifully woven linen and wool. Lent by Bronson Smith, is an old pot hook.

Lent by Mrs. Erle Payne is an interesting Majolica plate which belonged to Martha Wills, Mrs. Payne's great-grandmother—Mrs. Wills, by the way, was also great-grandmother to Helen Wills Moody, tennis champion. Another item of interest lent by Mrs. Payne is an ABC plate with MOTHER HUBBARD on it, which belonged to her grandfather, Joseph Armitage. This is an unusual item.

Judge Chas. L. Klapproth has added a cap and ball pistol to the rapidly growing gun collection. A heavy Whelan watch which was the property of his father is also on display. Hayden Miles has given a rusted gun found in the Andrews sand. Its history is forever lost in the sand.

A collection of some hundred pieces of money, coin and currency, is being enjoyed by library visitors. Ten cent currency, coins of many nations, Confederate money, and "villa" money, are among the interesting pieces.

A "miner's lamp" a candle holder of wrought iron, equipped with simple gadgets by which it can be hung on any surface is being exhibited.

Among the most interesting things ever shown here is a copy of an Ulster County Gazette published in Kingston, New York, June 10, 1890. This old paper is black bordered, as the nation had just suffered the loss of its beloved George Washington. Two commodities no longer advertised for sale, even in this day of high pressure salesmanship, are a buxom negro wench and ashes. A good Dutchman of the colony warns every reader for the second time not to harbor, keep, or give credit to his wife. Sheriff notices of sale occupy considerable space. This paper is lent by its owner, Mr. B. F. Stanley.

A collection of pictures of early day Midland Midlanders is being added to daily. Many citizens, both native and adopted are seeing these pictures and "remembering when" of seeing what real "cow country" is like.

Fourth of July parades of 1908 and 1911 show decorated cars, buggies, chuck-wagons, and the like. Many old timers can be recognized; the Lynches, the Scharbauers, the Elkins, and others. Riders include Charlie Edwards, Tom Garrard, Dick Lee, Jack Hill and other "hands."

"Who doesn't remember some, at least, of the local atmosphere? The Elite Confectionery; the Liano Hotel mail cart; Old Caesar, the Everybody's delivery horse; the Midland Concert Band. These and other old timers are to be seen at the library on the first floor of the Court House.

Mrs. J. V. Stokes has lent a picture of General John B. Gordon and those Confederate veterans who were in Midland at the time of his speaking here many years ago. Of this group of some ten or twelve only one survives. Dr. Collum and Dr. Curtis, father of the late Dr. W. K. Curtis; E. M. Smart, A. B. Coleman's father; Uncle Henry McClintic; Matt Daugherty and others are in the picture.

The sand storm of 1894 was something "to write home about," as pictures of it prove. Incidentally one of these pictures shows Main street when it was a wagon road. A detail in it turned this same street into a river. Witness the photographs.

Pictures of the Midland Fairs are on display. Not too far back John Dublin and Fisher Pollard were bronc pealers if the pictures are to be believed.

Texas Day At San Diego To Attract Many Thousand

SAN DIEGO. — The great "summer round-up" of present and former residents of the Lone Star State at the California Pacific International Exposition on Wednesday, August 21—Texas Day at the world's fair—is expected to attract many thousands of persons.

Chief features of the day's program, as planned by Byron C. Guyer, president of the Texas State Society of San Diego, will be Pat Neff, crack orator and former governor of the Lone Star State and present President of Baylor University, and a record sized watermelon—weighing 100 pounds, the biggest of the 1935 Texas crop.

Neff will tell Texans and the world just where Texas stands today in universal affairs, and the watermelon will be awarded to the holder of a lucky number ticket. A special Texas Day program will start at the Organ Amphitheatre at 2:30 p. m. Besides speeches by Neff and other prominent Texans, cowboy dances and music will be presented.
