# County Tax Rate Cut to 90c

## **BUDGET APPROVED** AT A MEETING OF **COMMISSIONERS**

Delinquent Taxes in County Greatly Diminished

Tax payers of Midland county to-ay were advised or further reduc-ion when the county commissioners'

ion when the county commissioners' ourt met, approved the budget and et the 1935 tax rate at 90 cents per aundred dollars valuation.

The rate marked a total reduction since 1932 of 60 cents. It was reduced in 1933 to \$1.10, in 1934 to \$1.00 and this morning to the 90 per cent rate for the current year.

Officials expressed thanks to ax buyers for substantial payments of telinquent and current taxes, making the reductions possible. They recalled that a plea was made at the ast tax paying season for as heavy ayments as possible in order to bold the rate to \$1.00. When payments of delinquent taxes exceeded the expectations of governing bodies, t was decided to increase the reduction.



Summer work in the garden consists largely in pruning. This term may often be applied to the operation of cutting off the faded flowers of annuals and cutting back the top growth of perennials which have finished blooming and which will give a fall crop of flowers if they are so treated. Pruning it is, and the purpose in general is the same as for all pruning.

Annual flowers will flower much longer if all faded flowers are cut off to prevent seed being formed. Also, when foliage becomes bedraggled and unsightly, many annual plants can be cut down severely, so they will grow again from the base. Alyssum can be trimmed with shears. Annual larkspur can be cut back, although better effects will be obtained if new seed is sown and new plants grown.
