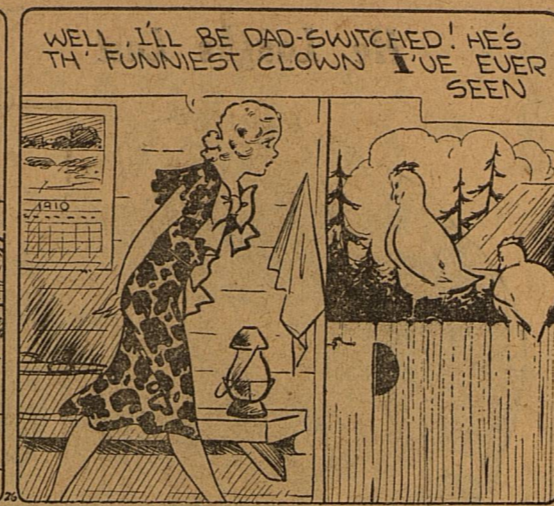
Working with Knight were Ed Wortman, Lee Boone, Victor Strain and Delmar Harris.

Except for a few broken windows nearby, damage was confined to the junkyard.

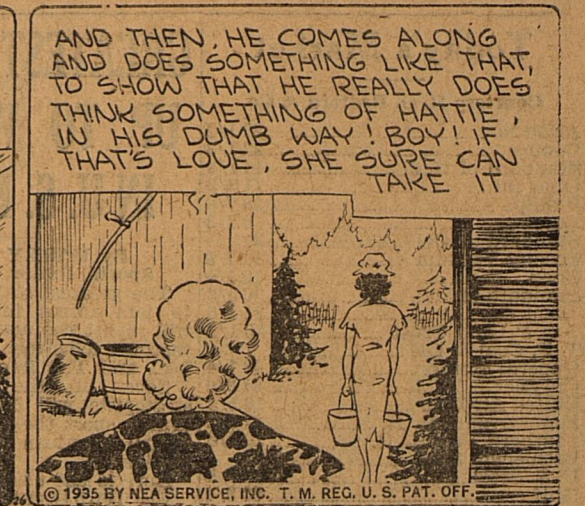

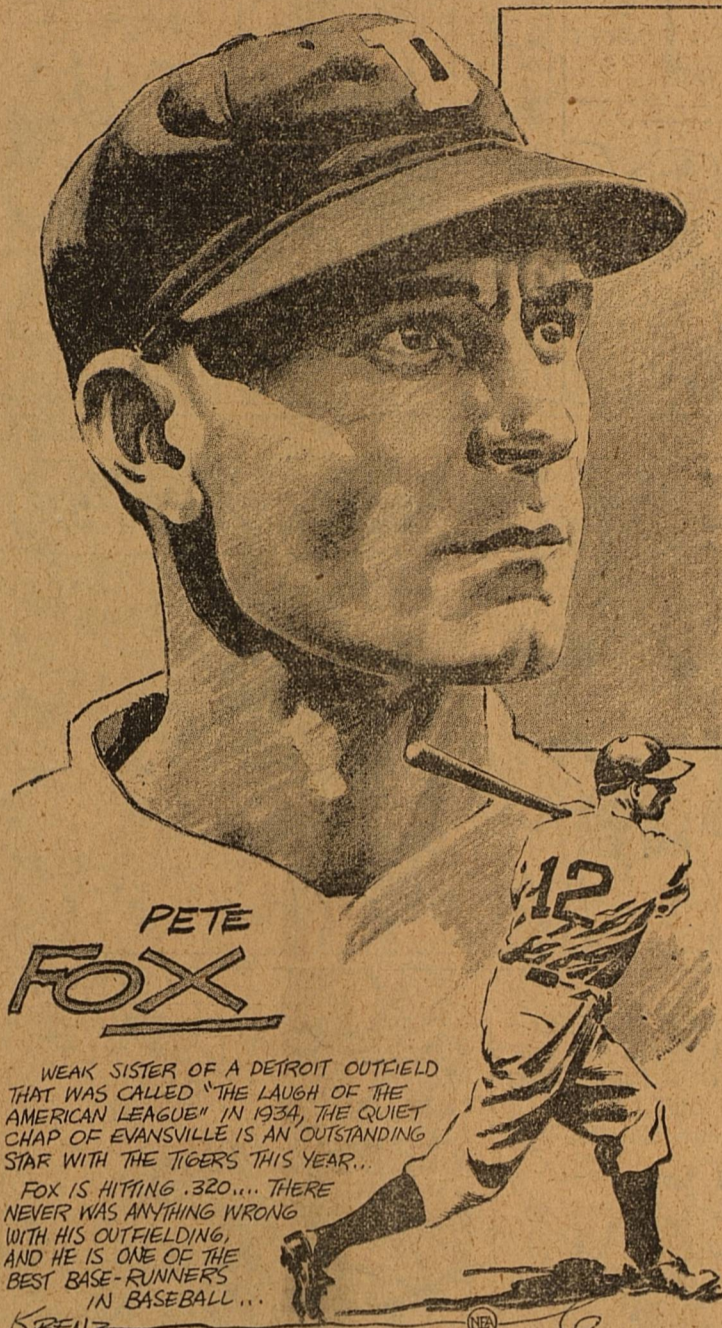

REDS' MEETING IN MOSCOW IS OBJECT OF STRONG PROTEST

MOSCOW, Aug. 26. (AP)—America's Ambassador to Russia, William Bullitt, Sunday delivered on behalf of the United States Government an emphatic protest against activities of the Communist International.

His blunt note to Vice-Commissar Krestinsky, in acting charge of foreign affairs, said these activities involved interference in the internal affairs of the United States, and called them a flagrant violation of the pledge made by Soviet Russia at the time it was recognized by America.

The American Government, he warned, anticipates the most serious consequences if the U.S.S.R. is unwilling or unable to take appropriate measures to prevent further acts in disregard of its pledge to prohibit activities in its territory aimed at changing the political or social order of the United States.

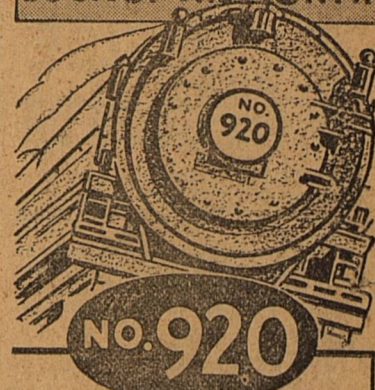
The note deemed it necessary to cite specific statements by delegates to the congress, at which some speakers indicated the eventual aim of the Communist party in the United States is establishment of a Soviet Government.

Postpones His Vacation. Bullitt delivered the protest early in the afternoon to the Vice-Commissar, who is acting in the place of Maxim Litvinoff, Commissar of Foreign Affairs, now at Geneva.

Soviet officials declined to comment on the protest, but it was expected that when a reply might be expected.

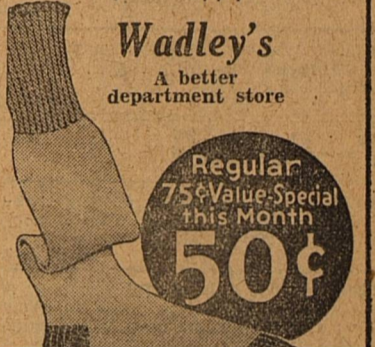
Ambassador Bullitt canceled his proposed vacation to the Black Sea when the Communist congress opened July 25 to study published accounts of the meeting at close hand. He dispatched regular reports to Washington during the twenty-seven days of the congress.

WHEN BIERMAN TALKS OTHER COACHES LISTEN

One of the finest halfbacks ever to wear the Maroon and Gold. Bierman captained the 1916 Minnesota team under the late and lamented Dr. Henry L. Williams which shared the Big Ten championship with Illinois.

Bierman made his bow as a mentor at a Butte preparatory school, where he also taught, and remained there until America entered the war, when he resigned to enter the United States Marine Corps. He left the service with a captain's commission.

Bierman served as head coach of the University of Montana in 1919-20, and in between assignments at Tulane, acted in a similar capacity for two years at Mississippi A. & M.

When Bernie Bierman starts talking at a meeting of coaches, everybody listens. Minnesota engages North Dakota State, Nebraska, Tulane, Northwestern, Purdue, Iowa, Michigan, and Wisconsin, giving Bernie ample opportunity to get a good line on the game as it is played in three sections other than the Big Ten, the fast circuit in which the Gophers play such an important role.

Jock Sutherland, of the University of Pittsburgh, needs no introduction to The Reporter-Telegram readers. He has written football for NEA Service, Inc., and this paper for three years, and is one of the most widely-known coaches in the nation.

His Panthers are always a power in the game. Annually they play the toughest schedule in the sport.

After being relieved of duty as Army mentor following the season of 1929, Jones was out of football until Huey Long, building up Louisiana State, called him in 1932.

Jones ran up a record of 18 games in which the Tigers were unbeaten, and was undefeated in Southeastern Conference play in three years, until Tulane, archrival of L. S. U., beat his squad, 13-12, last December.

It was that defeat that resulted in Jones' leaving L.S.U. An argument with Huey Long, in which the coach forbade the Kingfish to address his squad during halves, resulted in his resigning.

Shortly after, he was hired by the Sooners, and things look rosy for his charges in the Big Six battles this year.

His squad meets Colorado, New Mexico, Texas, Iowa State, Nebraska, Missouri, Kansas, Kansas State, and Oklahoma A. & M.

Bill Spaulding has been building a powerful team on the west coast that threatens to crash into the same class as Stanford, Southern California, and California this year.

His U. C. L. A. squad has an ambitious schedule lined up, and pits the team against the best talent on the Pacific.

Spaulding's Bruins meet Utah State, Oregon State, Stanford, Oregon, California, Southern Methodist, Hawaii, Loyola of Los Angeles, Idaho, and St. Mary's.

Jimmy Kitts, in his first year at Rice last season, established an enviable record. His squad lost only one tilt and tied another in an 11 game schedule, and generally was recognized as one of the strongest elevens in the southwest.

Kitts will write football in his section, a hot-bed of the gridiron pastime, and his schedule fully qualifies him as an authority.
