Serious Cold Wave Nearing

CHILLING BLAST OFF ROCKIES IS DRIVING STORM

All Northern Points In State Feel Steel FLASH WARNINGS Livestock Owners Are Given Notice of Wave

A cold wave of serious proportions advanced on Texas today, driven by chilling blasts off the Rockies. The temperature at Amarillo was 30 at noon today and all northern points in the state felt the sting of the winter's first serious cold wave. Temperatures are due to fall sharply in all parts of the state tonight, particularly in the Panhandle. Livestock warnings have been flashed to residents of north and central West Texas in anticipation of the below freezing weather. Snow is expected to fall in the north tonight. Tuesday is predicted to be generally fair but the cold wave is not expected to abate to any large extent before Wednesday. Cold and drizzling rains are continuing in many portions of the state today but are expected to lessen soon.

MONUMENT WELLS ARE PRODUCERS

Barnsdall and Jeffers Each Get New Well

Large flush production from two wells in the Monument area in Lea county, New Mexico, was the principal oil news of the weekend in the Permian Basin.

Jeffers No. 1 Brit, southernmost test of the Monument area, and located in section 7-208-37e, on second drill stem test late Friday, gauged better than a barrel of oil per minute and is estimated to be a 2,000 barrel well naturally. In the next section to the west, Barnsdall No. 1 Cooper Sunday tested 100 barrels hourly natural through one inch choke on two and a half inch tubing. These are the two largest gauges before acidization of any wells in the newest of Lea county fields.

GAINES WILDCAT CASING IS SET

On the Texas side of the Basin, Walsh and Adams No. 1 Aberiti, Gaines county wildcat test northwest of Seminole, completed running eight inch casing to 2,812 feet where it was cemented and the operation is now shut down waiting on cement.

Results of shooting of Humble No. 6 R. S. Means, field well of northern Andrews county, as announced this morning are 12 barrels of oil hourly with the use of gas lift. Operators plan to deepen the well 25 feet.

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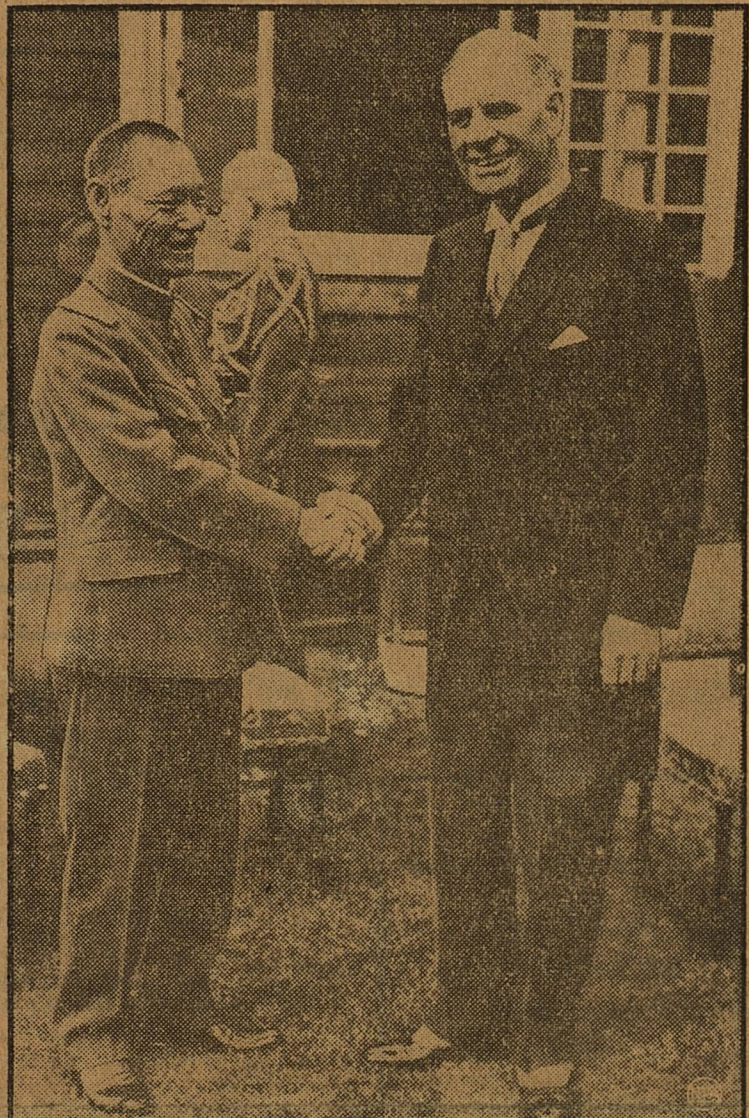

You Couldn't Make Money Without Earning It In Will Roger's Opinion

Will Rogers couldn't understand how anybody could make money without doing something to earn it. Eddie Cantor, close friend of Rogers on the stage and in real life, recalls an amusing incident in their friendship: "Early in 1929, when the stock market was doing such lovely things, I met Bill Rogers in Dirty Moore's Restaurant, on West 46th Street, in New York. At the time Bill was pinch-hitting for Fred Stone in Three Cheers, and I was playing in Whoopie. "Bill said, 'Eddie, what are you doing to the stock market that's making it go up?' "I answered, 'Bill, I'm buying bank stocks. I've got one that you must get in on.' "He insisted: 'Why, Bill, I'll make you more money, etc., etc.'—well, everybody must remember those promising speeches, Bill didn't say yes and he didn't say no, so the next day I bought some bank stocks in his name. Before the day was over it had gone up ten points. The following day it had risen eight more points. It went on like this for almost a week. The second week it dropped four points one day, and Bill was on the telephone. "What kind of a stock was that you bought me? It went down!' I laughed. FORT STOCKTON, Nov. 4. (UP)—Texas West of the Pecos has announced a section wide Centennial celebration, each of the towns presenting a local program, with the central exposition to be at Fort Davis.

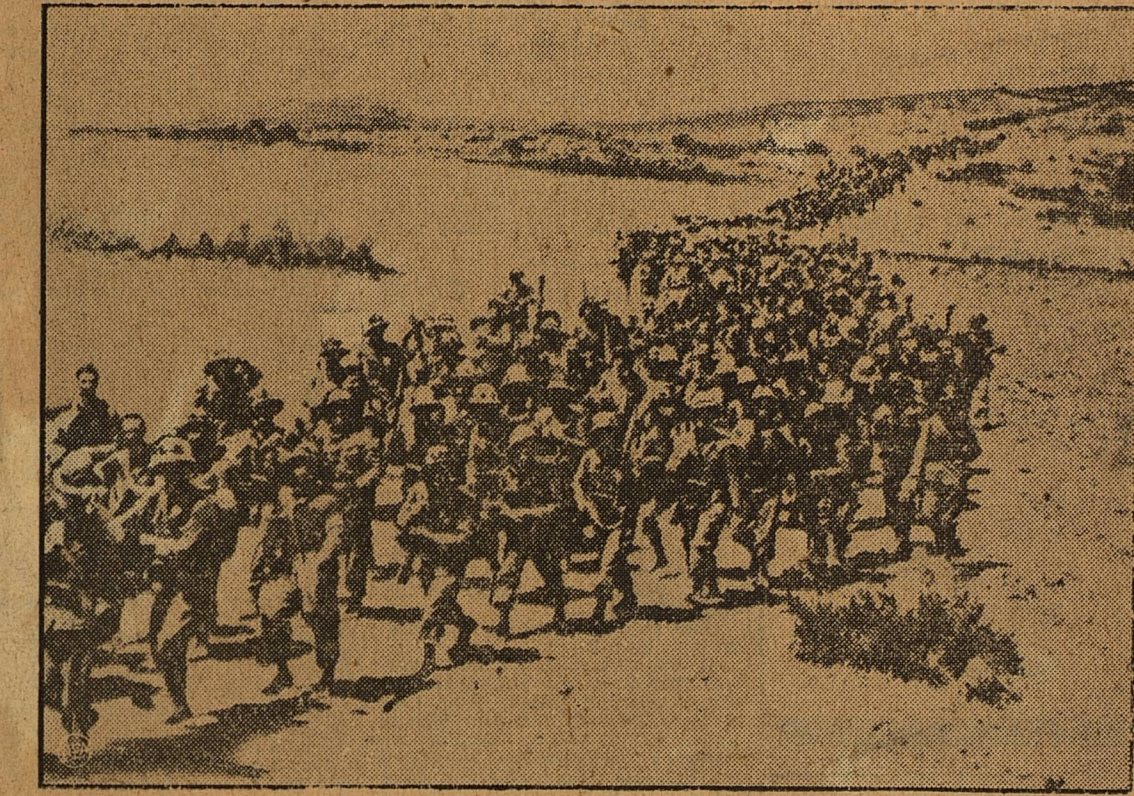
Fort Stockton, under leadership of the Lions club, is arranging a water carnival and anomaly in the country that is known throughout the world as an arid area. In the midst of this section where water is valued more than gold, there is a series of springs producing water so clear, clean in the swimming pool a newspaper can be read under seven feet of water. The spring that feeds the pool produces 35 million gallons daily, clearing the water out of the pool and re-supplying it every few minutes. In the entire United States, only one Florida spring produces more water than this Fort Stockton spring.

Not only are the springs a natural attraction to Fort Stockton, but around this water supply much of the early history of West Texas centers. Indians, long before the white men heard of this continent, camped at this spring. It was known to all the wandering tribes to whom a water hole was a bonanza. Tradition goes that as early as 1535, only 44 years after Columbus discovered America, Cabeza De Vaca, with his two Spanish and one negro companion, in his seven year tour across Texas to the west-coast of Mexico, found the spring just in time to save the little band of men from death by thirst. More than 100 years later, another expedition, this time under the leadership of Juan Dominguez de Mendoza, pitched camp at the springs. Mendoza's expedition was the first to cross over what was later known as the Chihuahuah Trail, which passes through Fort Stockton.

All interests in extreme southern Florida were warned of a severe storm. Warnings flew from Titusville to Fort Myers early today before the hurricane turned. 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WOMAN ASSOCIATE OF SEVERAL GANGS FOUND MURDERED

Vivian Chase, Kidnap Suspect, Found in Kansas City

KANSAS CITY, Nov. 4. (P)—The body of a young woman identified as Vivian Chase, associate of gangsters and kidnaping suspect, was found Sunday in a motor car at the rear of a hospital here. She had been shot to death. Mrs. Chase, 34, was sought by the Department of Justice as a suspect in the kidnaping of August Luer, wealthy Alton, Ill., banker. Identification was made through fingerprints. The body was found slumped in the bottom of the car, a 1934 sedan. A bullet had pierced her body, entering at the back of her right shoulder and emerging from her left chest. Physicians said she had been dead about two hours when found. Police said the woman, former resident of an East St. Louis rooming house, probably was the country's ranking woman criminal. Reputed to be a former associate of Alvin Karpis, present public enemy No. 1, and the notorious Barker brothers, Mrs. Chase had been a fugitive since October, 1932, when she saved her way out of jail at Liberty, Mo., where she was held for robbery of the National Bank and Trust Company of North Kansas City. The car in which her body was found was stolen from Lamoni, Iowa, last Sept. 25. It carried stolen Missouri license plates.

FIRST RETURNS FAVOR MONARCHY RULE

ATHENS, Nov. 4. (P)—An overwhelming popular majority for return of King George II to the Greek throne he abdicated 12 years ago was indicated Sunday night in first unofficial returns from the plebiscite on restoration of the monarchy. Typical, apparently, of the general trend was this count from the village of Chalandri, near Athens: For the monarchy, 1,980, against 5. The newspaper Vradini said the vote for the monarchy likely would reach 90 per cent of the total cast. An Associated Press correspondent, visiting many voting booths in Athens, saw not a single red, or republican, ballot deposited. The polls closed at 5:30 p. m., after the dulllest kind of a day. Not a single disorder was reported and the calm was relieved only by occasional platoons of soldiers, marching to vote and singing as they went. The exact date for announcement of the official result was not known, but it was expected early in the week. It was a plebiscite for men only. Women were not allowed to vote. With the royalists predicting an overwhelming mandate for the return of King George, politicians wondered just what kind of a monarchy he would establish. Some thought it might lean toward fascism.



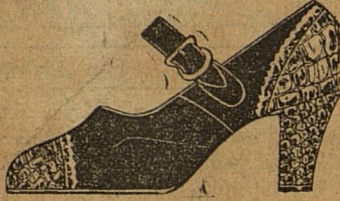
