VIGOR IN A VETERAN

Advancing years do not seem to dull Herbert Hoover's keen zest for political battle. Indeed, it almost seems as if the former president had been rejuvenated since he left the White House. Certainly his speeches are taking on a new pungency and zest.
In his speech before the Ohio Society of New York, for instance, we find him making phrases that Hugh Johnson himself might have fathered. "Nests of Constitutional termites"; "More abundant life—without the bacon"; "The Quick Loans Corporation for Xylophones, Yachts, and Zithers"; the "Bluebeard's Cave" of inflation—these phrases give Mr. Hoover's speech a bite and a saltiness that are both surprising and welcome.

It is already apparent that Mr. Hoover is going to be asking the administration some embarrassing questions during the coming campaign. If he asks them with this kind-of zip and pepper, the campaign will take on an added liveliness.

FINAL STRAW

Bruno Hauptmann's lawyers have asked the United States Supreme Court to set aside their client's conviction; and among their arguments is the assertion that his trial was nothing less than a "circus".

There certainly is no denying that the Hauptmann trial did have enough odd features to make an old-fashioned believer in the dignity of the courts moan with dull pain. But if your memory of that occasion is good, you may recall that the defense itself was not entirely blameless.

After all, there is nothing in ordinary criminal court procedure which makes it incumbent on defense attorneys to consult with the press every night, telling what they will do tomorrow, explaining how and why the state's case has fallen flat, and announcing in intricate detail how they are going to get their client acquitted.

The Hauptmann trial was, in some respects, a circus indeed; but our recollection is that the prosecution was not solely at fault.

Cranberry's Virtues Neglected by Cook

The Pilgrim families who landed at Plymouth, Mass., were the first white persons to taste native American cranberries, which grew in profusion in the nearby swamps of Cape Cod.

Ignorance of vitamins and the human need for iron and iodine, the Indians nevertheless regarded the giving and life-prolonging qualities. And though rich in these elements, my family finds the luscious tartness sufficient excuse for eating cranberry confections.

Cranberry sauce and cranberry jelly are traditional with turkey, but you will find the taste of cranberry quite as delicious with roast pork and veal. Cranberry ice often takes the place of sauce or jelly at a formal dinner. Cranberry sherbet makes a splendid dessert after a heavy dinner, and cranberry tapioca pudding is an inexpensive dessert suitable for any simple dinner.

Cranberry Juice
One quart cranberries, 4 cups water, 1 cup sugar, 1 lemon. Cook berries and water for ten minutes. Strain through cheesecloth. Bring juice to the boiling point, sift in sugar and cook not more than three minutes. Just long enough to be sure the sugar is completely dissolved. Chill and add juice of lemon when ready to serve.

There is an uncooked cranberry relish that is delectable, too. Cranberry Relish
Two cups cranberries, 1 orange, 1 1/2 cups sugar. Put berries and orange through food chopper. Add sugar, stir well and let stand several hours before serving.

Cranberries are so easy to use that I like to serve them in as many ways as possible. They require no seeding or paring in preparation for cooking. After a thorough washing and looking over for soft fruit, they are ready.

One quart cranberries, 2 cups

Crossword puzzle grid with numbers 1-54.

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


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Preservation of the Residence Stressed

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Preservation of the neighborhood from deterioration and a decline in desirability as a residential unit requires four essential services to the home, according to the November Federal Home Loan Bank Review. In the fourth of a series of articles on neighborhood standards essential to safety of investment, these services, which the home must have and which it cannot supply for itself, are: the elementary school, small parks and playgrounds, local shops and a residential environment.

Such services are assured by observance of the following neighborhood requirements, as developed by the Regional Survey of New York and Its Environs, the Review says: 1. Size: To provide sufficient housing for the population for which one elementary school is ordinarily required, its area depends upon population density. 2. Boundaries: Arterial streets on all sides, sufficiently wide to take care of all through traffic and exclude it from the interior of the neighborhood. 3. Open Spaces: Small parks and recreation grounds, to meet the needs of the particular neighborhood. 4. Institution Sites: For the school and other institutions having service spheres coinciding with the limits of the unit, suitably grouped about a central point or common. 5. Local Shops: One or more adequate districts, laid out in the circumference of the unit, preferably at traffic junctions and adjacent to similar districts of adjoining neighborhoods. 6. Internal Street System: Each highway proportioned to its probable traffic load, and the street network designed to facilitate circulation within the unit and to discourage use by through traffic.
